HOUSE BILL NO. 768

1 AN ACT TO AMEND SECTIONS 37-144-1, 37-144-3, 37-144-5, 2 37-144-7, 37-144-9, 37-144-11, 37-144-13, 37-144-15, 37-144-17, 3 37-144-19 AND 37-144-21, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO EXPAND THE MISSISSIPPI RURAL PHYSICIANS SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM TO INCLUDE A LOAN 4 5 REPAYMENT PROGRAM FOR GRADUATES OF MEDICAL OR OSTEOPATHIC SCHOOL 6 WHO WISH TO RECEIVE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR REPAYMENT OF THEIR 7 STATE AND FEDERAL MEDICAL EDUCATION LOANS BY PRACTICING MEDICINE 8 IN RURAL OR MEDICALLY UNDERSERVED AREAS OF MISSISSIPPI; TO PROVIDE 9 THAT A PARTICIPANT IN THE LOAN REPAYMENT PROGRAM IS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR REPAYMENT OF THE PARTICIPANT'S 10 11 STATE OR FEDERAL MEDICAL EDUCATION LOANS IN THE AMOUNT OF NOT MORE 12 THAN \$30,000.00 FOR EACH YEAR THAT THE PARTICIPANT PRACTICES 13 MEDICINE IN A RURAL OR MEDICALLY UNDERSERVED AREA OF MISSISSIPPI, UP TO A MAXIMUM OF \$120,000.00 PER PARTICIPANT; TO PROVIDE THAT 14 ANY PARTICIPANT WHO RECEIVES FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE THROUGH THE LOAN 15 16 REPAYMENT PROGRAM WHO FAILS TO COMPLETE THE PERIOD OF PRACTICE IN 17 A RURAL OR MEDICALLY UNDERSERVED AREA OF MISSISSIPPI FOR WHICH THE 18 PARTICIPANT HAS OBLIGATED HIMSELF OR HERSELF SHALL BE LIABLE FOR 19 THE REPAYMENT OF ALL FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROVIDED TO THE 20 PARTICIPANT THROUGH THE PROGRAM, ALONG WITH OTHER PENALTIES THAT 21 MAY BE PRESCRIBED; TO PROVIDE THAT THE LOAN REPAYMENT PROGRAM SHALL BE FUNDED BY APPROPRIATION OF THE LEGISLATURE ONLY FROM THE 22 23 CORONAVIRUS STATE FISCAL RECOVERY FUND; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 24 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:

25 SECTION 1. Section 37-144-1, Mississippi Code of 1972, is

26 amended as follows:

27 37-144-1. (1) There is established the Mississippi Rural 28 Physicians Scholarship and Loan Repayment Program for the purpose

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29 of (a) identifying and recruiting qualified university and college 30 students from rural areas of the state for medical or osteopathic school matriculation; and (b) identifying and recruiting qualified 31 graduates of medical or osteopathic school who wish to receive 32 33 financial assistance for repayment of their state and federal 34 medical education loans by practicing medicine in rural or 35 medically underserved areas of Mississippi. 36 (2) (a) The scholarship program shall consist of three (3) distinct phases through which participants will progress, 37 38 including: 39 ( \* \* \*i) Undergraduate premedical education; 40 ( \* \* \*ii) Medical or osteopathic school and 41 residency; and 42 ( \* \* \*iii) Post-residency entry into medical 43 practice in a rural or underserved area of the State of 44 Mississippi. 45 The loan repayment program shall consist of the (b) participant practicing medicine in a rural or medically 46 47 underserved area of the State of Mississippi. Section 37-144-3, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 48 SECTION 2. 49 amended as follows: 50 37-144-3. (1) The Mississippi Rural Physicians Scholarship 51 and Loan Repayment Program shall be administered by a commission 52 to be known as the "Mississippi Rural Physicians Scholarship and

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53 Loan Repayment Commission." The commission shall be directed by a 54 board composed of the following members:

55 Two (2) generalist physicians appointed by and from (a) the membership of the Mississippi State Medical Association, the 56 57 term of which shall be three (3) years and may be reappointed for 58 one (1) additional term;

59 (b) One (1) generalist physician appointed by and from the membership of each of the following organizations, the term of 60 which shall be three (3) years and may be reappointed for one (1) 61 62 additional term:

Mississippi Academy of Family Physicians; 63 (i) (ii) Mississippi Chapter, American College of 64 65 Physicians;

66 (iii) Mississippi Chapter, American Academy of 67 Pediatrics;

68 (iv) Mississippi Chapter, American College of 69 OB-GYN;

70 Mississippi Medical and Surgical Association; (V) 71 (vi) Mississippi Osteopathic Association; 72 Two (2) designees of the Dean of the University of

73 Mississippi School of Medicine whose terms are at the discretion 74 of the dean, at least one (1) of whom is a member of the 75 University of Mississippi School of Medicine Admissions Committee; 76 Two (2) medical students, one (1) of whom shall be (d) selected yearly through a process developed by the Dean of the 77

School of Medicine in consultation with the Chairs of the Departments of Family Medicine, Internal Medicine, OB-GYN and Pediatrics, and one (1) of whom shall be nominated for a one-year term by the Mississippi Chapter of the Student National Medical Association and approved by the Dean of the University of Mississippi School of Medicine;

84 (e) A member of the Board of Trustees of State85 Institutions of Higher Learning;

86 (f) The Chair of the Department of Family Medicine at87 the University of Mississippi School of Medicine; and

88 (g) A licensed psychiatrist appointed by the89 Mississippi Chapter of the American Psychiatric Association.

90 (2) The premedical advisors from the accredited four-year 91 colleges and universities in the state and the directors or 92 designees of the primary care generalist training programs in the 93 State of Mississippi shall comprise an advisory committee to the 94 commission to assist the commission in its administration of the 95 Mississippi Rural Physicians Scholarship <u>and Loan Repayment</u> 96 Program.

97 (3) Vacancies on the commission must be filled in a manner 98 consistent with the original appointments.

99 (4) All appointments to the commission must be made no later 100 than September 1, 2019. After the members are appointed, the 101 Chair of the Department of Family Medicine shall set a date for 102 the organizational meeting that is mutually acceptable to the

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majority of the commission members. The organizational meeting 103 104 shall be for the purposes of organizing the commission and 105 establishing rules for transacting its business. A majority of 106 the members of the commission shall constitute a quorum at all commission meetings. An affirmative vote of a majority of the 107 108 members present and voting shall be required in the adoption of 109 rules, reports and in any other actions taken by the commission. At the organizational meeting, the commission shall elect a chair 110 111 and vice chair from the members appointed according to paragraphs (a) through (d) of subsection (1). The chair shall serve for a 112 113 term of two (2) years, upon the expiration of which the vice chair 114 shall assume the office of chair.

(5) After the organizational meeting, the commission shall hold no less than two (2) meetings annually.

117 (6) The commission may form an executive committee for the 118 purpose of transacting business that must be conducted before the 119 next regularly scheduled meeting of the commission. All actions 120 taken by the executive committee must be ratified by the 121 commission at its next regularly scheduled meeting.

122 (7) Members of the commission shall serve without 123 compensation but may be reimbursed, subject to the availability of 124 funding, for mileage and actual and necessary expenses incurred in 125 attending meetings of the commission.

126 (8) Funding for the establishment and continued operation of127 the program and commission shall be appropriated out of any money

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128 in the General Fund not already appropriated to the University of 129 Mississippi Medical Center.

130 SECTION 3. Section 37-144-5, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 131 amended as follows:

37-144-5. The Mississippi Rural Physicians Scholarship and
 Loan Repayment Commission shall have the following powers and
 duties:

(a) Developing the administrative policy for the
commission and the Mississippi Rural Physicians Scholarship and
Loan Repayment Program;

(b) Promulgating rules and regulations, with the advice
and consent of the University of Mississippi Medical Center,
pertaining to the implementation and operation of the Rural
Physicians Scholarship and Loan Repayment Program;

142 Developing and implementing strategies and (C) 143 activities for the identification and recruitment of students and 144 graduates of medical and osteopathic schools and for marketing the program and for the implementation of the program. In developing 145 146 these strategies, the board shall seek the input of various organizations and entities, including the Mississippi State 147 148 Medical Association, the Mississippi Academy of Family Physicians, 149 the Mississippi Chapters of the American College of Physicians, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American College of 150 OB-GYN, the Mississippi Medical and Surgical Association, the 151

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152 Mississippi Osteopathic Medicine Association and the American 153 Psychiatric Association;

(d) Establishing a budget, with the advice and consent of the University of Mississippi Medical Center, to support the activities of the program and periodically reviewing and if appropriate, revising, the scholarship and other stipends offered through the program;

(e) Advising the University of Mississippi Medical Center regarding hiring an executive director and support staff necessary for the commission's work. The commission shall nominate at least two (2) individuals to serve as executive director;

164 (f) Reviewing participants progress in the program and 165 mentoring students and physicians participating in the program;

166 (g) Developing and participating in programs that 167 provide initial practice support in collaboration with other 168 interested professional organizations;

(h) The commission shall have the authority through use of generally applicable definitions, to designate an area of the state as underserved or rural. The method by which these designations shall be made shall be contained in rules and regulations promulgated by the commission.

174 SECTION 4. Section 37-144-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 175 amended as follows:

(1) (a) The commission shall develop and 177 implement policies and procedures designed to recruit, identify and enroll undergraduate students who demonstrate necessary 178 179 interest, commitment, aptitude and academic achievement to pursue 180 careers as family physicians or other generalist physicians in 181 rural or medically underserved areas of Mississippi, and to develop and implement the programs designed to foster successful 182 183 entry of participants into medical school, completion of medical 184 school, enrollment into and completion of family medicine or other 185 generalist residency, and establishment and maintenance of a 186 career in family medicine or other generalist specialty in a rural 187 or underserved area of Mississippi.

(b) The commission shall develop and implement policies
and procedures designed to identify and recruit qualified
graduates of medical or osteopathic school who wish to receive
financial assistance for repayment of their state and federal
medical education loans by practicing medicine in rural or
medically underserved areas of Mississippi.

194 (2) The commission shall have the authority through use of 195 generally applicable definitions to designate an area of the state 196 as underserved or rural.

197 (3) The commission, in conjunction with the University of 198 Mississippi Medical Center, shall have the authority to provide 199 students selected for scholarship funding with faculty mentors and 200 other programs designed to enhance the students' likelihood of

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(4) Each applicant for admission to the program must submit
an application to the commission that conforms to requirements
established by the commission.

(5) In selecting participants for the <u>scholarship</u> program, the board may only accept an applicant if his or her academic record and other characteristics, if given consideration by the University of Mississippi School of Medicine Admissions Committee, would be considered credible and competitive.

(6) An applicant for the <u>scholarship</u> program <u>or loan</u>
 <u>repayment program</u> may be admitted only upon a majority vote of the
 members of the commission.

(7) Not less than fifteen (15) students will be admitted to
the Mississippi Rural Physicians Scholarship <u>and Loan Repayment</u>
Program each year, provided that there are fifteen (15) or more
qualified applicants for the program.

(8) Upon the funding of sixty-one (61) or more rural physicians scholarships by the Legislature and recognizing the importance of balancing the needs of comprehensive primary care along with a critical shortage of psychiatrists in Mississippi, the commission may grant an exception for fourth-year medical or

231 SECTION 5. Section 37-144-9, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 232 amended as follows:

233 37-144-9. (1) Participants must adhere to the policies and 234 practices as stipulated by the commission to continue in the 235 program.

236 (2) Students in the scholarship program may receive tuition 237 or other financial support that may be provided by the commission. 238 If a student in the scholarship program is admitted to and 239 completes medical or osteopathic school, any tuition or other 240 educational and living support provided to the student by the 241 commission will be forgiven. However, if the student is not 242 successful in being accepted into medical or osteopathic school within three (3) years of entry into the **\* \* \*** scholarship 243 244 program, or if the student otherwise breaches his or her agreement 245 with the commission, all financial assistance provided to the 246 student must be repaid according to policies adopted by the board. SECTION 6. Section 37-144-11, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 247

248 amended as follows:

37-144-11. (1) Students in the <u>scholarship</u> program may
apply to any medical or osteopathic school that is accredited by

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251 the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME) or the American 252 Osteopathic Association (AOA).

(2) Students in the <u>scholarship</u> program seeking admission to the University of Mississippi School of Medicine shall be eligible for a special admissions process pursuant to criteria established by the School of Medicine Admissions Committee which will include special consideration of the attributes of participation in the program.

259 In carrying out the admissions process developed for (3) 260 the **\* \* \*** scholarship program participants under this section, the 261 goal is for the program to work with the School of Medicine to 262 enhance the capability of participants to successfully enter and 263 complete medical school, train in family medicine or other 264 generalist primary care specialty and enter practice in rural or underserved areas in Mississippi. To the extent feasible, the 265 266 early admissions process should be completed before November 1 of 267 the year preceding a student's admission to medical school.

268 SECTION 7. Section 37-144-13, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 269 amended as follows:

270 37-144-13. (1) Subject to the availability of funding,
271 students in the <u>scholarship</u> program who successfully matriculate
272 to medical or osteopathic school are eligible for ongoing
273 financial support in accordance with policies and requirements of
274 the commission and in accordance with the applicable laws and
275 regulations. The number of students to be supported at the

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(2) Subject to the availability of funding, students enrolled at the University of Mississippi School of Medicine may receive tuition support, funding to assist with the cost of books and a living stipend, as prescribed by policy of the commission and in accordance with applicable regulations. Preferences for ongoing funding must be given to those students admitted to the University of Mississippi School of Medicine.

285 (3) For each year that a student in medical or osteopathic 286 school receives financial assistance, the student is obligated for one (1) year of practice as a primary care physician in a rural or 287 288 underserved area in Mississippi. Breach of the agreement at any 289 stage of training shall invoke the repayment of all financial 290 assistance provided to the student through the Mississippi Rural 291 Physicians Scholarship and Loan Repayment Program, including 292 assistance provided during undergraduate school, as well as in medical or osteopathic school, along with other penalties that may 293 294 be prescribed in policy by the commission.

295 SECTION 8. Section 37-144-15, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
296 amended as follows:

37-144-15. Medical and osteopathic students in the
 <u>scholarship</u> program must enter family medicine or other generalist
 residency programs according to their choice of specialty.
 Depending upon the availability of funds, students who

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308 **SECTION 9.** Section 37-144-17, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 309 amended as follows:

37-144-17. (1) Upon completion of residency, a participant 310 311 in the **\* \* \*** scholarship program must proceed to enter the 312 practice of medicine in a rural or medically underserved area in 313 Mississippi, as defined by the commission and consistent with generally acceptable designations. If an area experiences 314 315 significant changes in its medical or general community which are 316 not reflected by health professional shortage area (HPSA) or 317 medically underserved area (MUA) rural designation, the commission may receive testimony and, in its discretion, may qualify the area 318 319 as an underserved or rural area to allow the program participant 320 to fulfill his or her practice obligation.

321 (2) Upon entering the practice of medicine, a participant in
322 the <u>scholarship</u> program must serve in a health professional
323 shortage area (HPSA), medically underserved area (MUA), or rural
324 area otherwise approved for practice under subsection (1) of this
325 section for a number of years which corresponds to the number of

A participant in the scholarship 328 program who completes residency outside the State of Mississippi 329 who fails to enter the practice of medicine as required under this 330 section shall be deemed in breach of contract and shall be liable 331 for the immediate repayment of all financial assistance provided 332 to the participant through the Mississippi Rural Physicians 333 Scholarship and Loan Repayment Program, including assistance 334 provided during undergraduate school, as well as in medical or osteopathic school, along with other penalties that may be 335 336 prescribed in policy by the board. Any participant in the scholarship program who fails to complete the period of practice 337 338 for which he or she is obligated to provide services in a health professional shortage area (HPSA) or a medically underserved area 339 340 (MUA) in exchange for financial assistance received through the 341 Mississippi Rural Physicians Scholarship and Loan Repayment 342 Program shall be liable for the repayment of all financial assistance provided to the participant through the program, along 343 344 with other penalties that may be prescribed by the commission, an 345 amount which shall be reduced on a pro rata basis for actual years 346 of practice by the physician in the area designated by the 347 commission.

348 (3) A participant in the loan repayment program is eligible
 349 to receive financial assistance from the commission for repayment
 350 of the participant's state or federal medical education loans in

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351 the amount of not more than Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) 352 for each year that the participant practices medicine in a rural 353 or medically underserved area of Mississippi as described in 354 subsections (1) and (2) of this section, up to a maximum of One 355 Hundred Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$120,000.00) per participant. 356 Any participant who receives financial assistance through the loan 357 repayment program who fails to complete the period of practice in 358 a rural or medically underserved area of Mississippi for which the 359 participant has obligated himself or herself by contract with the 360 commission shall be liable for the repayment of all financial 361 assistance provided to the participant through the program, along 362 with other penalties that may be prescribed by the commission, an 363 amount which shall be reduced on a pro rata basis for actual years of practice by the physician in the area designated by the 364 365 commission. The loan repayment program shall be funded by 366 appropriation of the Legislature only from the Coronavirus State 367 Fiscal Recovery Fund, not to exceed a total of Three Million 368 Dollars (\$3,000,000.00) for the program. 369 SECTION 10. Section 37-144-19, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 370 amended as follows:

371 37-144-19. The Mississippi Rural Physicians Scholarship <u>and</u>
372 <u>Loan Repayment</u> Program, acting through the commission, shall make
373 every effort to establish an initial practice entry support system
374 for participants in the <u>scholarship</u> program.

380 administrative authority over any program administered by any
381 college, university, medical school or residency program in this
382 state or any other program established by state law.

383 **SECTION 12.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 384 and after July 1, 2022.
