1 2 3	AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE SUPPORT AND MAINTENANCE OF THE DEPARTMENT OF MARINE RESOURCES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2023.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
5	SECTION 1. The following sum, or so much thereof as may be
6	necessary, is appropriated out of any money in the State General
7	Fund not otherwise appropriated, for the support and maintenance
8	of the Department of Marine Resources for the fiscal year
9	beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023
10	\$ 2,715,364.00.
11	SECTION 2. The following sum, or so much thereof as may be
12	necessary, is appropriated out of any money in any special fund in
13	the State Treasury to the credit of the Department of Marine
14	Resources for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and ending
15	June 30, 2023\$ 118,827,144.00.
16	Of the funds appropriated in this section, Three Million
17	Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$3,050,000.00) is derived from the state
18	excise taxes upon gasoline, oil and other petroleum products.

19 **SECTION 3.** Of the funds appropriated under the provisions of

20 this act, the following positions are authorized:

Permanent: 103

23 Time-Limited: 74

24 Each Marine Conservation Officer and Supervisor shall be

25 furnished an allowance for uniforms not to exceed Six Hundred

26 Dollars (\$600.00) per annum.

27 With the funds herein appropriated, it shall be the agency's

28 responsibility to make certain that funds required for Personal

29 Services for Fiscal Year 2024 do not exceed Fiscal Year 2023 funds

30 appropriated for that purpose unless programs or positions are

31 added to the agency's Fiscal Year 2023 budget by the Mississippi

32 Legislature. The Legislature shall determine the agency's

33 personal services appropriation, which shall be published by the

34 State Personnel Board. Additionally, the State Personnel Board

35 shall determine and publish the projected annualized payroll costs

36 based on current employees. It shall be the responsibility of the

37 agency head to ensure that actual personnel expenditures for

38 Fiscal Year 2023 do not exceed the data provided by the

39 Legislative Budget Office. If the agency's Fiscal Year 2023

40 projected cost exceeds the annualized costs, no salary actions

41 shall be processed by the State Personnel Board with the exception

42 of new hires that are determined to be essential for the agency.

43	Any transfers or escalations shall be made in accordance with
44	the terms, conditions and procedures established by law or
45	allowable under the terms set forth within this act. The State
46	Personnel Board shall not escalate positions without written
47	approval from the Department of Finance and Administration. The
48	Department of Finance and Administration shall not provide written
49	approval to escalate any funds for salaries and/or positions
50	without proof of availability of new or additional funds above the
51	appropriated level.

- No general funds authorized to be expended herein shall be used to replace federal funds and/or other special funds which are being used for salaries authorized under the provisions of this act and which are withdrawn and no longer available.
- None of the funds herein appropriated shall be used in violation of Internal Revenue Service's Publication 15-A relating to the reporting of income paid to contract employees, as interpreted by the Office of the State Auditor.
- Funds have been appropriated herein for the purpose of
 funding Project SEC2 minimum salaries for all employees covered
 under the Colonel Guy Groff/Neville Kenning Variable Compensation
 Plan. It shall be the agency's responsibility to ensure that the
 funds are used to increase all employees' salaries up to the
 minimum level as determined by the State Personnel Board.
- 66 **SECTION 4.** It is the intention of the Legislature that the
 67 Department of Marine Resources shall maintain complete accounting

department shall place any special trust funds appropriated to the
department in a special trust fund and the interest earned on the
principal shall be credited to the special trust fund. Monies in
the fund at the end of the fiscal year shall be retained in the
special trust fund for use in the next succeeding fiscal year.

The department may use the interest earned on the fund to pay

SECTION 7. It is the intention of the Legislature that the Department of Marine Resources has the authorization to move tidelands funds between approved projects upon request from entity and proper completion of Form TTF-6 documentation.

SECTION 8. It is the intention of the Legislature for the Department of Marine Resources and the Department of Environmental Quality to continue with any agency partnerships, including grant agreements, that provide environmental projects to restore

196	whenever two (2) or more bids are received by this agency for the
197	purchase of commodities or equipment, and whenever all things

201	the Mississippi Industries for the Blind whenever purchases are

346	SECTION 11. It is the intent of the Legislature that the
347	Department of Marine Resources shall have the authority to expend
348	funds in an amount not to exceed Seventeen Million Dollars
349	(\$17,000,000.00) from funds for the Gulf of Mexico Energy Security
350	Act (GOMESA) that may become available to the agency in fiscal
351	year 2023 in accordance with the rules and regulations of the
352	Department of Finance and Administration in a manner consistent
353	with the escalation of federal funds.
354	SECTION 12. It is the intention of the Legislature that none
355	of the funds provided herein shall be used to pay certain
356	utilities for state furnished housing for any employees. Such
357	utilities shall include electricity, natural gas, butane, propane,
358	cable and phone services. Where actual cost cannot be determined,
359	the agency shall be required to provide meters to be in compliance
360	with legislative intent. Such state furnished housing shall
361	include single-family and multi-family residences but shall not
362	include any dormitory residences. Allowances for such utilities
363	shall be prohibited.
364	SECTION 13. It is the intention of the Legislature that the
365	funds herein appropriated shall be expended in compliance with
366	Section 27-104-25, Mississippi Code of 1972, that no state agency
367	shall incur obligations or indebtedness in excess of their

appropriation and that the responsible officers, either personally or upon their official bonds, shall be held responsible for actions contrary to this provision.

371 **SECTION 14.** With the funds appropriated herein, the
372 Department of Marine Resources is authorized to make payment for
373 expenses incurred during Fiscal Year 2020 and Fiscal Year 2021 as
374 follows:

The money herein appropriated shall be paid by the State Treasurer out of any money in the State Treasury to the credit of the proper fund or funds as set forth in this act, upon warrants issued by the State Fiscal Officer; and the State Fiscal Officer shall issue his warrants upon requisitions signed by the proper person, officer or officers, in the manner provided by law.

387 **SECTION 16.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 388 and after July 1, 2022.

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
