## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 72

- A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION COMMENDING THE ESTEEMED LEGAL AND JUDICIAL CAREER AND PUBLIC SERVICE OF THE HONORABLE JUDGE TOMIE TURNER GREEN AND CONGRATULATING HER UPON THE OCCASION OF HER RETIREMENT.
- 5 WHEREAS, after nearly 23 years of dedicated and zealous
- 6 service as a barrister, arbiter and magistrate of the law, the
- 7 Honorable Tomie Turner Green will retire her tribunal robe to the
- 8 closet and silence her gavel of justice, after having first begun
- 9 her prestigious career as a learned attorney and brilliant judge
- 10 in 1999; and
- 11 WHEREAS, the oldest of four children born to David and Lizzie
- 12 McPherson Turner, Judge Green was educated in the Jackson Public
- 13 Schools, and after completing the 11th grade, she enrolled at
- 14 Tougaloo College, where she earned her bachelor of arts degree,
- 15 and continued her education at Jackson State University, where she
- 16 earned a master of science degree, and finally, Mississippi
- 17 College School of Law, where she earned her Doctor of
- 18 Jurisprudence; and

19	WHEREAS, Judge Green continued to study law and practical
20	application of the legal principles she had learned through
21	post-doctorate training, including the study of advanced trial
22	advocacy skills and techniques at the National Institute of Trial
23	Advocacy and the National College of Advocacy, and in April 1999,
24	she completed judicial certification at the National Judicial
25	College at the University of Nevada at Reno; and
26	WHEREAS, before assuming her seat on the bench, Judge Green
27	practiced law for 15 years and not only served as an adjunct law
28	professor at the Mississippi College School of Law, where she
29	taught law students procedures for successful litigation and trial
30	court practice, but also as a partner in the law firm of Walker,
31	Walker and Green of Jackson, Mississippi, as an Assistant District
32	Attorney for Hinds and Yazoo Counties, and as a judicial clerk for
33	U.S. District Court Judge Henry T. Wingate, the first federal
34	judge in the State of Mississippi; and
35	WHEREAS, from 1992 until 1999, Judge Green served as a member
36	of the Mississippi House of Representatives, where she was
37	appointed as vice-chair of the Ethics Committee and as sub-chair
38	of the Judiciary A Committee and also served on the Elections,
39	Insurance, Managed Health Care, Local and Private Legislation,
40	Constitution and Investigation of State Offices committees; and
41	WHEREAS, during her tenure in the Mississippi Legislature,
42	Judge Green had a record of supporting efforts to bring honor and

43	efficiency to the judiciary, she wrote laws that created the
44	Administrative Office of the Court, the Mississippi Court of
45	Appeals and the Mississippi Torts Claim Board, and she promoted
46	training, certification and increased benefits for court
47	personnel, and her efforts to ensure diversity, fairness and
48	justice in Mississippi's courts further substantiate her
49	dedication, commitment and legacy of service to the community; and
50	WHEREAS, on January 4, 1999, Judge Green took the oath of
51	office to become the first woman elected to the Hinds County
52	Circuit bench, and after 10 years of dedicated service, she became
53	Senior Circuit Court Judge of the Seventh Circuit Court District
54	(Hinds County) of Mississippi, making her the first African
55	American and the first woman to hold the position; and
56	WHEREAS, as a senior judge, Judge Green, who has remained
57	unopposed at the ballot box for five consecutive terms, equipped
58	all four circuit courtrooms with computer-integrated technology,
59	worked with the Mississippi Supreme Court to create online
60	electronic filing in the Hinds County circuit court, and initiated
61	video/remote arraignment in the district, which allows
62	communications with jail detainees through the Internet; and
63	WHEREAS, Judge Green has never avoided difficult or
64	controversial cases and continues her efforts to increase
65	accessibility, efficiency and public safety in the circuit court
66	through the review of court rules, the increased monitoring of
67	pretrial indictees, more timely indictment and disposition of

- 68 criminal cases, the expansion of the circuit drug court,
- 69 development of veterans, mental health/behavioral health programs,
- 70 increased judicial security on and off court premises, more
- 71 timely disposition of civil matters through alternative dispute
- 72 resolution, the broader use of digital and teleconferencing, and
- 73 Internet streaming and/or closed circuit television for selected
- 74 civil and criminal proceedings; and
- 75 WHEREAS, additionally, Judge Green has served two terms on
- 76 the Supreme Court's Advisory Committee on Rules and has served on
- 77 the Supreme Court's Committee on Media and the Courts, and on July
- 78 1, 2003, media coverage in Mississippi's courtrooms became a
- 79 reality when the first locally televised case in Mississippi
- 80 originated in Judge Green's courtroom; and
- 81 WHEREAS, on November 10, 2003, Judge Green, along with Court
- 82 TV and local ABC, NBC and CBS affiliates televised a multi-million
- 83 dollar negligence case tried before the court and a Hinds County
- 84 jury, marking the first time that Court TV or local networks had
- 85 broadcasted full coverage of an entire trial in the State of
- 86 Mississippi, and in November 2006, full media coverage of a second
- 87 controversial criminal case was broadcasted from Judge Green's
- 88 court by local networks and Court TV; and
- 89 WHEREAS, as a result of her academic excellence,
- 90 professionalism, integrity, dedication and commitment to community
- 91 service in her personal, political and professional life, Judge
- 92 Green has received numerous honors and awards; and

93	WHEREAS, Judge Green is or has been a member of the Magnolia
94	Bar Association, Mississippi Bar Association, the National Bar
95	Association, the American Bar Association, the Federal Bar
96	Association, the Hinds County Bar Association and the Phi Alpha
97	Delta Legal Fraternity, and her prestigious memberships include
98	Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc., Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society, the
99	NAACP, the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), the
100	National Association of Black Legislators, Mississippi League of
101	Women Voters, American Association of University Women and Central
102	Mississippi Coalition of 100 Black Women, and she is currently a
103	member of the St. Peter Missionary Baptist Church of Jackson,
104	Mississippi; and
105	WHEREAS, throughout her career, Judge Green received
106	unwavering support from her late husband, Cornelious, as well as
107	her daughter, Dr. Nikisha Ware, who is married to Dr. David Ware,
108	her son, Synarus Green, and her two grandsons, Solomon Ware and
109	Asa Ware; and
110	WHEREAS, it is the policy of this Legislature to commend the
111	remarkable career and public service of such an equally
112	remarkable, talented, fair and knowledgeable individual as Judge
113	Tomie Turner Green, who has dedicated her life to promoting and
114	upholding the pristine principals of justice and providing
115	intellectual interpretation of the laws of the State of
116	Mississippi to maximize the benefits and protection of its
117	citizens:

118	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF
119	REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, THE SENATE CONCURRING
120	THEREIN, That we do hereby commend the esteemed legal and judicial
121	career and public service of the Honorable Judge Tomie Turner
122	Green, congratulate her upon the occasion of her retirement and
123	extend warmest wishes for continued success in all of her future
124	endeavors.
