HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 80

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION COMMENDING CHICKASAW COUNTY,
 MISSISSIPPI, NATIVE, THE LEGENDARY AND RENOWNED SINGER-SONGWRITER
 MRS. BOBBIE GENTRY FOR HER MUSICAL ARTISTRY AND EXTRAORDINARY
 TALENT.

5 WHEREAS, "Chickasaw County child, Is gonna be ok, Chickasaw County child, You gonna be somebody someday" sang the Chickasaw 6 7 County, Mississippi, child who grew up to be somebody, the 8 legendary and renowned singer-songwriter Mrs. Bobbie Gentry; and 9 WHEREAS, Bobbie Gentry, born Roberta Lee Streeter on July 27, 10 1942, on a little farm outside the Village of Woodland in Chickasaw County, is a retired, legendary musical artist who used 11 12 her talents as a songwriter and singer during her time as one of 13 the first female musicians who wrote, produced and even published 14 her own music; and WHEREAS, she is remembered for her Southern themed narrative 15 songs including her classic recordings "Fancy," a hit for Bobbie 16

17 in 1969 and later famously covered by Reba McEntire in 1990, and 18 her 1967 debut single "Ode To Billie Joe" which became a U.S.

19 number one hit and a worldwide sensation, and was later adapted 20 into a movie in 1976; and

21 WHEREAS, Mrs. Gentry released seven albums on Capitol 22 Records including her defining works "Patchwork," "The Delta 23 Sweete" and "Ode to Billie Joe," before her self-imposed 24 retirement, and she also had a successful partnership with Glen 25 Campbell with whom she recorded an album of duets; and

26 WHEREAS, her native Mississippi roots are found in many of 27 her most popular songs: "Ode to Billie Joe," "Mississippi Delta," 28 "Parchman Farm," "Chickasaw County Girl" and "Okolona River 29 Bottom," among others; and

30 WHEREAS, years ahead of her time, Bobbie was also a keen 31 businesswoman: within months of the success of her first single, 32 she established two music publishing companies, organized beneath her parent company, Gentry Ltd., which among other activities 33 34 produced her live shows; and later, when she was primarily 35 performing, she negotiated her own multi-million dollar contracts; and she was an original co-owner of the Phoenix Suns Basketball 36 37 Team, helping bring the first major professional sports franchise to the State of Arizona; and 38

39 WHEREAS, early in her career, despite performing regularly, 40 initially Bobbie's sole ambition was to write songs to sell to 41 other artists, telling *The Washington Post* that she only sang on 42 the recording of "Ode to Billie Joe" she took to Capitol Records 43 because it was cheaper than hiring a professional; and also

WHEREAS, the first six years of her career Bobbie was primarily a recording artist, and for the next six she was an entertainer appearing on stages all over the world, but primarily in Las Vegas and Reno; and though she had started playing Las Vegas as early as 1968 when Howard Hughes put her on at Caesar's Palace, it was not until her recording career ended that her stage career really took off; and

54 WHEREAS, one of Bobbie's most talked about live segments in 55 this period was her tribute to Elvis Presley, witnessed one night 56 by the King himself; and by the mid-seventies, she was the 57 undisputed Queen of Las Vegas breaking attendance records at The 58 Landmark and apparently racking up more performances during her 59 stage career than any other lady to play the strip; and

60 WHEREAS, her last production was at the Sahara in Las Vegas 61 during September 1980; but there was no farewell show or 62 announcement of her retirement; and in May 1981, Bobbie was one of 63 many guest stars on the NBC special "An All-Star Salute to 64 Mother's Day" during which she sang just one song: a rendition of 65 the Broadway tune "Mama, A Rainbow," dedicated to her own mother 66 who was in the audience; and

67 WHEREAS, what no one knew at the time was that this would be 68 her last performance; and the following year she made her last

72 WHEREAS, it is the policy of this Legislature to celebrate 73 the accomplishments of musical artists from the State of 74 Mississippi who have used their talents to enhance the musical 75 landscape of our lives:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF
REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, THE SENATE CONCURRING
THEREIN, That we do hereby commend legendary and renowned
singer-songwriter Mrs. Bobbie Gentry for bringing the gift of
music into the lives of millions, and we extend our sincere wishes
for good health and happiness in her lighter years.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be furnished to Mrs. Bobbie Gentry and to the members of the Capitol Press Corps.
