## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 505

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE LEGACY OF NFL HALL OF FAME RUNNING BACK WALTER PAYTON ON THE OCCASION OF THE DEDICATION OF "WALTER PAYTON FIELD" IN COLUMBIA, MISSISSIPPI.

- 4 WHEREAS, we join the citizens of Columbia, Mississippi, in
- 5 recognizing the legacy of Walter Payton; and
- 6 WHEREAS, the field that bears the name of arguably the most
- 7 famous Chicago Bear, NFL Hall of Fame Running Back, Walter Payton,
- 8 will forever be enshrined at Gardner Stadium. Walter and his
- 9 brother, Eddie, played the sport they loved for the "Wildcats" of
- 10 Columbia High School in Columbia, Mississippi. A statue of the
- 11 man simply known as "Sweetness" now greets visitors in the home
- 12 plaza welcoming them to Walter Payton Field; and
- WHEREAS, history was made when the newly built Walter Payton
- 14 Field at Gardner Stadium opened on September 23, 2021. The
- 15 Columbia School District honored the legacy of NFL Hall of Famer
- 16 and Columbia High School Running Back, Walter Payton, with the
- 17 Payton family and former teammates in attendance. Teammates from
- 18 Columbia High School, Jackson State University and the NFL came to

- 19 pay tribute to the outstanding person that Walter Payton was both
- 20 on and off the field; and
- 21 WHEREAS, Walter Payton's legacy includes having
- 22 record-breaking careers at Jackson State University and the
- 23 Chicago Bears. He broke the NFL record for most rushing yards and
- 24 played in the 1986 Super Bowl, won by the Chicago Bears. For his
- 25 humanitarian efforts, the NFL named its "Man of the Year" after
- 26 him; and
- 27 WHEREAS, Walter's brother, Eddie Payton, also a high school
- 28 football standout from Columbia and JSU, believes that his brother
- 29 is the best person for whom the new state-of-the-art field at
- 30 Gardner Stadium should be named. He was a featured speaker at the
- 31 ceremony. When Walter and Eddie played football at Columbia High
- 32 School, they both wore number 22 and both later played football at
- 33 Jackson State University, where Walter changed his jersey to
- 34 number 34; and
- 35 WHEREAS, Walter's brother, Eddie, and his sister, Pam Curry,
- 36 were also on hand in cutting the ribbon for the opening ceremony.
- 37 Bud Holmes, the longtime agent of both Payton brothers, attended
- 38 along with many of their teammates he represented during their
- 39 time in professional football. Robert Brazile, a fellow NFL Hall
- 40 of Fame inductee who played with the Houston Oilers, shared how
- 41 much this group of teammates and friends enjoy getting together,
- 42 especially having an opportunity to honor their peer and friend.
- 43 Other speakers for the opening ceremony were: Architect Jamie

- 44 Wier, Coach Chip Bilderback, Coach Charles Boston, Matt Pace of
- 45 Codaray Construction, Mitchell Williams with the Fellowship of
- Christian Athletes, Representative Ken Morgan, Senator Angela 46
- Hill, and Mayor Justin McKenzie. A short documentary made by the 47
- 48 Columbia High School Broadcast Journalism Class, featuring clips
- 49 of Walter Payton and interviews with Eddie Payton and Coach
- Boston, was played on the stadium's new jumbotron; and 50
- 51 WHEREAS, the bronze sculpture of Walter Payton, created by
- nationally recognized Artist and Columbia resident, Ben Watts, is 52
- 53 now featured prominently at the main entrance of the new stadium;
- 54 and
- 55 WHEREAS, Walter Jerry Payton was born on July 25, 1954, in
- 56 Columbia, Mississippi. Walter was one of three children born to
- 57 Edward and Alyne Payton. Young Payton played a number of sports
- with his brother, Eddie. Payton attended John Jefferson High 58
- 59 School (now Jefferson Middle School), an all-black school for his
- 60 first three years of high school. Then in his senior year, he was
- one of the African-American students who integrated formerly 61
- 62 all-white Columbia High School. Payton played football all four
- years of his high school career. He then followed his brother, 63
- 64 Eddie, to play college football at Jackson State University in
- 65 Jackson, Mississippi. Payton excelled at Jackson State, rushing
- 66 for more than 3,500 yards and breaking into the National College
- Athletic Association (NCAA) record books by scoring 65 rushing 67
- touchdowns. Payton entered the 1975 NFL draft and was the 4th 68

- 69 overall pick by the Chicago Bears. Payton's greatest year was in
- 70 1985, where he gained more than 1,500 rushing yards and led the
- 71 Chicago Bears to a 15-1 regular season record. Payton then led
- 72 the Chicago Bears in becoming Super Bowl XX Champions. Payton
- 73 continued having successful seasons with the Chicago Bears
- 74 throughout the rest of his career. He played 13 seasons with the
- 75 Chicago Bears, finishing his career with 16,726 rushing yards and
- 76 scoring 110 touchdowns. Throughout his career, he amassed
- 77 numerous honors, including nine-time Pro Bowl Selection
- 78 (1976-1980, 1983-1986), nine-time All-Pro Selection (1976-1980,
- 79 1983-1986), NFL MVP (1977), two-time NFC Player of the Year (1977,
- 80 1985), Bert Bell Award (1977), Pro Bowl MVP (1978), and Super Bowl
- 81 XX Champion (1985). Walter Payton retired in 1988 and was
- 82 inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame five years later in
- 83 1993. The Chicago Bears also retired his number 34 jersey
- 84 indicating he will always be known as one of the greatest running
- 85 backs in football history; and
- 86 WHEREAS, the opening of the new Walter Payton Field was
- 87 certainly a remarkable event. Columbia schools were able to
- 88 witness a momentous occasion that will not be forgotten. The
- 89 excitement, the atmosphere, the energy and the sense of unity were
- 90 historic; and
- 91 WHEREAS, it is with great pride that we commend the legacy of
- 92 a great Mississippi athlete who stated, "We are stronger together
- 93 than we are alone":

94	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
95	MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That
96	we do hereby recognize the legacy of NFL Hall of Fame Running Back
97	Walter Payton on the occasion of the dedication of "Walter Payton
98	Field" in Columbia, Mississippi, and extend to the athletes,
99	alumni, leaders and educators of Columbia High School our best
100	wishes for future success.

102	the family of Walter Payton, his former Coach Charles Boston,
103	Columbia School Superintendent Jason Harris, forwarded to the
104	Columbia School Board, and made available to the Capitol Press
