SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 559

1 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE OUTSTANDING PUBLIC 2 SERVICE OF FORMER UNITED STATES MARSHAL NEHEMIAH FLOWERS, JR., ON 3 THE OCCASION OF HIS RETIREMENT FROM THE STATE PAROLE BOARD. 4 WHEREAS, we join the judiciary and public officials of this state in recognizing 45 years of outstanding service by Nehemiah 5 Flowers, Jr., on the occasion of his retirement from the State 6 Parole Board. Flowers has served on the five-member board for the 7 past eight years. He was appointed by then-Governor Phil Bryant 8 9 in 2013 and reappointed by Governor Tate Reeves in 2020. On Friday, December 11, 2009, Nehemiah Flowers, Jr., was recognized 10 11 by the judiciary of this state on the occasion of his retirement as United States Marshal for the Southern District of Mississippi; 12 13 and 14 WHEREAS, in 1969, WLBT-TV3 named Nehemiah the Director of

14 WHEREAS, IN 1909, WEBT-TV3 named Nenemian the Director of 15 Public Affairs, affording him the distinction of being the first 16 African-American TV executive in Mississippi and possibly in the 17 south. In 1973, United States Senator Thad Cochran persuaded 18 Nehemiah Flowers to join his congressional staff. In February

19 2001, Senator Cochran recommended Nehemiah for Presidential 20 Appointment as the United States Marshal for the Southern District 21 of Mississippi. On February 8, 2002, he was confirmed by the 22 United States Senate. The appointment made Nehemiah one of two 23 African Americans to serve as a United States Marshal since 24 Reconstruction; and

25 WHEREAS, Nehemiah Flowers, Jr., is a native Mississippian, 26 born and raised on Davis Street in Jackson. He attended Jackson's 27 public and parochial schools. His elementary education began at 28 Holy Ghost Catholic School and later he attended Brinkley High 29 School and was "Mr. Brinkley" in 1962; and

30 WHEREAS, Nehemiah is a graduate of Belhaven College with a 31 degree in Business Administration. He played halfback at Oklahoma 32 University for three years. He is a Vietnam era veteran. In 33 December 2002, he retired from the United States Army Reserve as a 34 Brigade Command Sergeant Major with 30 years of honorable service. 35 Marshal Flowers is the Past President of the Greater Jackson Law 36 Enforcement Association (GJLA); former member of the Board of 37 Directors for the Central Mississippi Red Cross; currently on the 38 Board of Directors for Mississippi Blood Services, Developing 39 Resources for Education in America, Inc. (DREAM); and National 40 Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives (NOBLE). He was 41 selected by the website BlackMississippi.com as one of the 50 Most 42 Influential Black Mississippians. 45 WHEREAS, we recognize and take pride in the fact that 46 Nehemiah Flowers, Jr., has been a vital part of Mississippi 47 government for many years and we pay tribute to his legacy of law 48 enforcement:
