HOUSE BILL NO. 511

1 AN ACT TO CREATE THE "EDUCATION STANDARDS LEGISLATIVE REVIEW 2 ACT"; TO PROVIDE THAT ALL SUBJECT MATTER STANDARDS AND REVISIONS 3 TO THOSE STANDARDS ADOPTED BY THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION SHALL 4 BE SUBJECT TO LEGISLATIVE REVIEW BEFORE SUCH STANDARDS CAN BE 5 IMPLEMENTED BY THE BOARD; TO PRESCRIBE THE PROCESS TO BE ADHERED 6 TO BY THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION AND THE LEGISLATION IN THE 7 ADOPTION, REVIEW AND FINAL IMPLEMENTATION OF STANDARDS UPON COMPLETION OF THE LEGISLATIVE REVIEW PROCESS; TO BRING FORWARD 8 SECTION 37-1-3, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, FOR THE PURPOSE OF 9 POSSIBLE AMENDMENTS; TO AMEND SECTION 37-1-2, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 10 11 1972, TO CORRECT GRAMMATICAL ERRORS; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

12BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:13SECTION 1.This act shall be known and may be cited as the

14 "Education Standards Legislative Review Act."

15 <u>SECTION 2.</u> (1) All subject matter standards and revisions 16 to the standards adopted by the State Board of Education pursuant 17 to the authority provided to the board to do so under Sections 18 37-1-2 and 37-1-3 shall be subject to legislative review as set 19 forth in this section. The standards shall not be implemented by 20 the State Board of Education until the legislative review process 21 is completed as provided for in this section. (2) Upon adoption of any subject matter standards, the State Board of Education shall submit the adopted standards to the Speaker of the House of Representatives or a designee and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate or a designee before the last thirty (30) days of the legislative session of the year in which such standards are scheduled to be implemented by the board.

By adoption of a joint resolution, the Legislature shall 28 (3) 29 approve the standards, disapprove the standards in whole or in 30 part, amend the standards in whole or in part or disapprove the 31 standards in whole or in part with instructions to the State Board 32 of Education. If the Legislature fails to adopt a joint resolution within thirty (30) legislative days following 33 submission of the standards, the standards shall be deemed 34 35 approved.

If the subject matter standards are disapproved in whole 36 (4) 37 or are disapproved in whole with instructions as provided for in 38 this section, the State Board of Education may adopt new standards and submit the new standards for legislative review pursuant to 39 40 this section. The State Board of Education shall continue to 41 implement current standards in place until the new standards have 42 been reviewed by the Legislature and approved as provided for in 43 this section. If the subject matter standards are amended, 44 approved in part or are disapproved in part with instructions, the 45 State Board of Education may revise the standards in accordance with the legislative changes and implement the standards. 46

47 (5) Upon final approval of the standards, the standards shall be considered final agency rules. The board shall submit a 48 copy of the standards to the Secretary of State, who shall include 49 the standards in the publication known as the "Mississippi 50 51 Administrative Code" in the same manner as agency rules are 52 published in the "Code" as provided for in the Administrative 53 Procedures Act. All standards approved and published as provided for in this subsection shall have the same force and effect of law 54 55 as agency rules promulgated pursuant to the Administrative 56 Procedures Act.

57 (6) Unless otherwise provided by specific vote of the Legislature, joint resolutions introduced for purposes of 58 59 approving, disapproving, amending or disapproving with 60 instructions any subject matter standards shall not be subject to regular legislative cutoff dates, shall be limited to such 61 62 provisions as may be necessary for approving, disapproving, 63 amending or disapproving with instructions any subject matter standards and any such other direction or mandate regarding the 64 65 standards deemed necessary by the Legislature. The joint 66 resolution shall contain no other provisions.

67 SECTION 3. Section 37-1-2, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 68 amended as follows:

37-1-2. The Legislature finds and determines that the
quality of public education and its effect upon the social,
cultural and economic enhancement of the people of Mississippi is

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72 a matter of public policy, the object of which is the education 73 and performance of its children and youth. The Legislature hereby 74 declares the following to be the policy of the State of 75 Mississippi:

(a) That the students, parents, general citizenry,
local schoolteachers and administrators, local governments, local
school boards, and state government have a joint and shared
responsibility for the quality of education delivered through the
public education system in the State of Mississippi;

81 (b) To produce a functionally literate school82 population;

83 (c) To ensure that all students master the most84 essential parts of a basic education;

85 (d) To establish, raise and maintain educational86 standards;

87 (e) To improve the quality of education by88 strengthening it and elevating its goals;

89 (f) To provide quality education for all school-age90 children in the state;

91 (g) That excellence and high achievement of all92 students should be the ultimate goal;

93 (h) To encourage the common efforts of students,
94 parents, teachers, administrators and business and professional
95 leaders for the establishment of specific goals for performance;

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96 (i) To improve instructional and administrative 97 quality, to relate the education community to other policymakers, to achieve increased competency among students, teachers and 98 administrators, to provide for continuing professional development 99 100 for teachers, counselors and administrators, to assure that the 101 budget process, the planning function and the allocation of 102 personnel of the State Department of Education are commensurate 103 with its educational goals;

(j) That the return on public education which is the single largest investment for the state be the effectiveness of the delivery system and the product it is designed to produce;

107 (k) That the investment in public education can be 108 justified on the basis of the economic benefits that will accrue 109 both to the individual and to society, recognizing that the return 110 on such investment is long term and dramatic progress is not 111 immediate;

(1) That emphasis must be placed upon early mastery of the skills necessary to * * * <u>be successful</u> in school and that quality, performance-based early childhood education programs are an essential element of a comprehensive education system;

(m) That local school districts and their public schools be required to account for the product of their efforts;

(n) That the children of this state receive a period of instruction sufficient to train each in the basic educational skills adequate for the student to take his or her place in

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121 society and make a contribution as a citizen of this state, and 122 that all children be encouraged to continue their education until 123 they have completed high school;

(o) To establish an accreditation system based upon measurable elements in school known to be related to instructional effectiveness, to establish a credible process for measuring and rating schools, to establish a method for monitoring continued performance, and to provide for a state response when performance is inadequate;

(p) That the teachers of this state, to the extent possible, receive salaries that are at least equal to the average of the salaries received by teachers in the southeastern United States.

134 SECTION 4. Section 37-1-3, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 135 brought forward as follows:

136 37-1-3. (1) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules 137 and regulations and set standards and policies for the 138 organization, operation, management, planning, budgeting and 139 programs of the State Department of Education.

(a) The board is directed to identify all functions of
the department that contribute to or comprise a part of the state
system of educational accountability and to establish and maintain
within the department the necessary organizational structure,
policies and procedures for effectively coordinating such
functions. Such policies and procedures shall clearly fix and

146 delineate responsibilities for various aspects of the system and 147 for overall coordination of the total system and its effective 148 management.

(b) The board shall establish and maintain a
system-wide plan of performance, policy and directions of public
education not otherwise provided for.

(c) The board shall effectively use the personnel and
resources of the department to enhance technical assistance to
school districts in instruction and management therein.

155 (d) The board shall establish and maintain a central156 budget policy.

(e) The board shall establish and maintain within the
State Department of Education a central management capacity under
the direction of the State Superintendent of Public Education.

(f) The board, with recommendations from the superintendent, shall design and maintain a five-year plan and program for educational improvement that shall set forth objectives for system performance and development and be the basis for budget requests and legislative initiatives.

(2) (a) The State Board of Education shall adopt and maintain a curriculum and a course of study to be used in the public school districts that is designed to prepare the state's children and youth to be productive, informed, creative citizens, workers and leaders, and it shall regulate all matters arising in

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170 the practical administration of the school system not otherwise 171 provided for.

172 Before the 1999-2000 school year, the State Board (b) of Education shall develop personal living and finances objectives 173 174 that focus on money management skills for individuals and families 175 for appropriate, existing courses at the secondary level. The objectives must require the teaching of those skills necessary to 176 handle personal business and finances and must include instruction 177 178 in the following: 179 (i) Opening a bank account and assessing the 180 quality of a bank's services; 181 (ii) Balancing a checkbook; 182 (iii) Managing debt, including retail and credit 183 card debt; Completing a loan application; 184 (iv) 185 (V) The implications of an inheritance; 186 The basics of personal insurance policies; (vi) 187 (vii) Consumer rights and responsibilities; 188 Dealing with salesmen and merchants; (viii) 189 (ix) Computing state and federal income taxes; 190 (X) Local tax assessments; 191 (xi) Computing interest rates by various 192 mechanisms; 193 (xii) Understanding simple contracts; and 194 Contesting an incorrect billing statement. (xiii)

195 (3)The State Board of Education shall have authority to 196 expend any available federal funds, or any other funds expressly 197 designated, to pay training, educational expenses, salary incentives and salary supplements to licensed teachers employed in 198 199 local school districts or schools administered by the State Board 200 of Education. Such incentive payments shall not be considered 201 part of a school district's local supplement as defined in Section 202 37-151-5(o), nor shall the incentives be considered part of the 203 local supplement paid to an individual teacher for the purposes of 204 Section 37-19-7(1). MAEP funds or any other state funds shall not 205 be used to provide such incentives unless specifically authorized 206 by law.

207 (4) The State Board of Education shall through its actions
208 seek to implement the policies set forth in Section 37-1-2.

209 **SECTION 5.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 210 and after July 1, 2023.
