HOUSE BILL NO. 939

1 AN ACT TO AMEND SECTIONS 41-135-1 AND 41-135-3, MISSISSIPPI 2 CODE OF 1972, TO REVISE THE LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND INTENT AND 3 DEFINITIONS FOR THE PURPOSES OF THE STATUTES SUPPORTING AND 4 PROMOTING BREASTFEEDING; TO AMEND SECTION 41-135-5, MISSISSIPPI 5 CODE OF 1972, TO REQUIRE MATERNAL HEALTH CARE FACILITIES TO ADOPT 6 AN INFANT FEEDING POLICY THAT SUPPORTS AND PROMOTES BREASTFEEDING; 7 TO AMEND SECTION 41-135-7, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO REQUIRE ALL MATERNAL HEALTH CARE FACILITIES TO POST A COPY OF THE 8 9 "BREASTFEEDING IN MISSISSIPPI: GUIDELINES" CONSPICUOUSLY IN A PUBLIC PLACE ON THEIR PREMISES; TO REQUIRE THAT THOSE GUIDELINES 10 11 INCLUDE CERTAIN STATEMENTS; TO AMEND SECTION 41-135-9, MISSISSIPPI 12 CODE OF 1972, TO REQUIRE THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO PROVIDE 13 THE VIDEO PREPARED BY THE DEPARTMENT WHICH CONTAINS INFORMATION ABOUT THE IMPORTANCE OF BREASTFEEDING INFANTS TO OTHER STATE 14 15 AGENCIES THAT PROVIDE BENEFITS TO WOMEN OF CHILDBEARING AGE; TO 16 CREATE NEW SECTION 41-135-11, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO REQUIRE 17 EMPLOYERS TO PROVIDE EMPLOYEES WITH A REASONABLE BREAK TIME AND A 18 PRIVATE SPACE TO EXPRESS MILK DURING WORK HOURS; TO AMEND SECTION 19 17-25-9, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO PROVIDE THAT IT IS A 20 MISDEMEANOR FOR ANY PERSON TO VIOLATE A MOTHER'S RIGHT TO BREASTFEED HER CHILD IN ANY LOCATION WHERE SHE IS OTHERWISE 21 22 AUTHORIZED TO BE; TO AMEND SECTIONS 43-20-31 AND 71-1-55, 23 MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO CONFORM TO THE PROVISIONS OF THIS 24 ACT; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

25 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:

26 SECTION 1. Section 41-135-1, Mississippi Code of 1972, is

27 amended as follows:

41-135-1. (1) The Legislature of the State of Mississippi
acknowledges that extensive research demonstrates the wide-ranging

41 Significant economic and social benefits to the (C) 42 state, such as reduced health care costs * * * and reduced employee absenteeism for care attributable to child illness, as 43 44 well as * * * significant economic benefits to families, as the 45 United States Surgeon General estimates that the average family can save * * * nearly One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars 46 (\$1,500.00) during a baby's first year of life * * * using optimal 47 48 breastfeeding * * * practices, in addition to reduced medical 49 costs and lost wages attributable to child illness; 50 (d) Significant benefits to businesses and employers, 51 including reduced health care costs, reduced employee absenteeism 52 attributable to child illness, improved employee productivity, 53 higher morale, and improved ability to attract and retain valuable 54 employees;

No. 939 ~ OFFICIAL ~ 23/HR26/R855 PAGE 2 (MCL\KW) 55 Significant economic benefits to the state through (e) 56 health care savings, estimated between Thirty-six Million Dollars 57 (\$36,000,000.00) to One Hundred Thirty Million Dollars (\$130,000,000.00) annually, if Mississippi adopts recommended 58 59 breastfeeding practices. 60 (2)The Legislature also recognizes that, despite these numerous benefits provided at no cost, * * * Mississippi still has 61 one of the lowest breastfeeding rates in the country, and * * * 62 63 mothers in Mississippi face many barriers to breastfeeding, 64 including social stigma, lack of * * * education, * * * and lack 65 of support. Therefore, the Legislature declares the intent of this 66 (3)67 chapter is to create policies that will support and promote breastfeeding in Mississippi, specifically by: * * * 68 69 (a) Educating mothers about the benefits of 70 breastfeeding and their rights as a breastfeeding mother * * *; 71 Ensuring that maternal health care facilities and (b) employers become places of breastfeeding support and have policies 72 73 to facilitate a mother's choice to breastfeed; and 74 (c) Removing the social stigma of breastfeeding through 75 increased protections of existing breastfeeding rights. 76 SECTION 2. Section 41-135-3, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows: 77 78 41-135-3. As used in this chapter, the following words and phrases have the meanings as defined in this section: 79 H. B. 81 is the statement of rights required by Section 41-135-7.

82 (b) "Employer" means a person engaged in business who 83 has one or more employees and includes the state and its political 84 subdivisions.

85 (***<u>c</u>) "Maternal health care facility" means any 86 facility that provides prenatal or perinatal care, including, but 87 not limited to, hospitals, clinics, pediatric offices, and 88 other * * physical facilities.

89 (***<u>d</u>) "Maternal health care provider" means any
90 physician, nurse or other authorized practitioner that attends to
91 pregnant women and mothers of infants.

92 $(* * * \underline{e})$ "Perinatal" means the period from twenty-two 93 (22) weeks of gestation to twenty-eight (28) days after birth.

94 $(\star \star \underline{f})$ "Prenatal" means the period between 95 conception to birth.

96 (***g) "Public place" means a place of * * high
97 patient traffic within the maternal health care facility such as a
98 lobby area or waiting room.

99 (h) "Reasonable effort" means any effort that does not 100 impose an undue hardship on the operation of the employer's 101 business.

102(i) "Undue hardship" means any action that requires103significant difficulty or expense when considered in relation to

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104 factors such as the size of the business, its financial resources, 105 and the nature and structure of its operation.

106 SECTION 3. Section 41-135-5, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 107 amended as follows:

108 41-135-5. It is important that all Mississippi maternal 109 health care facilities become places of breastfeeding support, as the information they disseminate and the support they provide to 110 111 their patients often determine whether or not a mother chooses or 112 is able to breastfeed. Therefore:

(* * *a) * * * All maternal health care facilities 114 shall adopt an infant feeding policy that promotes and supports breastfeeding. * * * Infant feeding policies adopted under this 115 116 section shall include guidance on the use of formula: (* * *i) for medically necessary supplementation; (* * *ii) if preferred 117 by the mother; or (* * *iii) when exclusive breastfeeding is not 118 119 advised for the mother and/or infant.

120 (* * *b) * * * This breastfeeding infant feeding policy * * * shall be written down and all relevant * * * maternal 121 122 health care facility personnel, including, but not limited to, 123 obstetric and neonatal staff, * * * shall be trained in the 124 necessary skills to implement the adopted policy.

125 (* * *c) * * * Maternal health care facilities shall 126 make a copy of their breastfeeding infant feeding policy available 127 to the State Department of Health.

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128 **SECTION 4.** Section 41-135-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 129 amended as follows:

130 41-135-7. (1) * * * <u>All</u> maternal health care facilities in 131 the state * * <u>shall</u> post a copy of the * * <u>"Breastfeeding in</u> 132 <u>Mississippi: Guidelines"</u> conspicuously in a public place * * * <u>on</u> 133 <u>their premises, and the copy</u> shall be of an adequate size and font 134 so as to be easily read by all visitors and/or patients within the 135 room or space.

136 (2) The "Breastfeeding in Mississippi: Guidelines" shall 137 include the following statements:

(a) Breast milk provides the best source of nutrition
for infants, supplying the perfect mix of vitamins and immunities
that a child needs to grow and thrive.

141 (b) Know the benefits:

142 (i) Breastfed babies are generally healthier and
143 have significantly lower risks of illnesses such as diabetes, ear
144 infections, allergies, asthma and obesity, and breastfeeding has
145 been linked to higher IQs in children.

146 (ii) Breastfed babies have a much lower risk of 147 sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS).

148 (iii) Mothers also benefit from breastfeeding,

149 having significantly lower risks of breast cancer, ovarian cancer,

150 uterine cancer and postpartum depression.

151 (iv) Even breastfeeding as short as the first week
152 can have a positive health impact on a child.

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153	(c) Know the law:
154	(i) A mother has the right to breastfeed in any
155	location, public or private, where she is otherwise authorized to
156	be, which includes hospitals, playgrounds, restaurants, and/or
157	stores.
158	(ii) A mother may breastfeed openly without
159	covering herself if she chooses and doing so is not considered
160	indecent and is not punishable by law.
161	(iii) An employer may not discriminate against a
162	person for using their designated break time to pump or nurse a
163	child.
164	(iv) Parents may request that maternal health care
165	facility staff not feed their baby formula or use pacifiers unless
166	medically necessary.
167	(v) Parents may request that their baby be brought
168	to them at any time during their maternal health care facility
169	stay for regular feedings.
170	(* * * $\underline{3}$) The State Department of Health shall make
171	available to every maternal health care provider and maternal
172	health care facility, via its website, a template copy of
173	the \star \star <u>guidelines</u> for use within their facilities. \star \star \star
174	Maternal health care providers and maternal health care facilities
175	are free to choose whether to use the Department of Health
176	template or develop their own copy as long as it <u>includes the</u>
177	specific text outlined in subsection (2) of this section and later

180 (* * *4) The State Department of Health shall revise the "Breastfeeding in Mississippi: Guidelines" as needed to reflect 181 182 advances in research regarding breastfeeding and to incorporate 183 any additional rights of breastfeeding mothers as *** * *** later granted by the * * * Legislature, and * * * maternal health care 184 185 facilities shall post the revised version of the "Breastfeeding in 186 Mississippi: Guidelines" within three (3) months of its updated 187 publishing.

188 ($\star \star \star 5$) The State Board of Health shall adopt any rules 189 and regulations necessary to ensure the display of these $\star \star \star$ 190 guidelines.

191 SECTION 5. Section 41-135-9, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 192 amended as follows:

193 41-135-9. The State Department of Health shall prepare a 194 video in an appropriate medium for presentation in offices of the department in which the department provides benefits to women of 195 196 childbearing age, which shall provide information about the 197 importance of breastfeeding infants. Applicants for and recipients of any such benefits provided by the department may 198 199 view the video in the offices of the department. The department * * * shall provide the video to other state agencies 200 201 that provide benefits to women of childbearing age, for 202 appropriate use by those agencies.

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205 <u>41-135-11.</u> Encouraging and promoting breastfeeding provides206 significant benefits to both employees and employers. Therefore:

207 (a) All employers shall provide reasonable paid or
208 unpaid break time for an employee who needs to express breast milk
209 for her child.

(b) To the extent possible, break times must run concurrently with any paid break time.

(c) An employer shall make reasonable effort to provide a private, secure, sanitary room or other location in close proximity to the work area, other than a bathroom or toilet stall, where employees can express milk, and this space must include access to an electrical outlet.

(d) Employers may not discriminate against, discipline, or take adverse action against an employee because she has elected to exercise her right under this section.

220 SECTION 7. Section 17-25-9, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 221 amended as follows:

17-25-9. (1) A mother may breastfeed her child in any location, public or private, where the mother is otherwise authorized to be, without respect to whether the mother's breast or any part of it is covered during or incidental to the breastfeeding.

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227 (2) Any corporation, manager, agency or person who violates
228 this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction,
229 shall be fined not less than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) nor more
230 than Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) for each offense.

231 SECTION 8. Section 43-20-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
232 amended as follows:

233 43-20-31. The Department of Health shall promulgate
234 regulations to ensure that licensed child care facilities shall be
235 required to comply with the following:

(a) Breastfeeding mothers, including employees, shall
be provided a sanitary place that is not a toilet stall to
breastfeed their children or express milk. This area shall
provide an electrical outlet, comfortable chair, and nearby access
to running water.

(b) A refrigerator will be made available for storage of expressed breast milk following guidelines from the American Academy of Pediatrics and Centers for Disease Control in ensuring that breast milk is properly treated to avoid waste. Universal precautions are not required in handling human milk.

(c) Staff shall be trained in the safe and properstorage and handling of human milk.

(d) Breastfeeding promotion information will be displayed in order to positively promote breastfeeding to the clients of the facility.

254 **SECTION 9.** Section 71-1-55, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 255 amended as follows:

256 71-1-55. No employer shall prohibit an employee from
257 expressing breast milk during any meal period or other break
258 period provided by the employer. <u>In addition, each employer shall</u>
259 <u>comply with the requirements of Section 41-135-11.</u>

260 **SECTION 10.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 261 and after July 1, 2023.
