HOUSE BILL NO. 1206

1 AN ACT TO DIRECT THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO DEVELOP 2 AND IMPLEMENT A COMPREHENSIVE AND STATEWIDE FENTANYL AND DRUG 3 ABUSE EDUCATION, PREVENTION AND CESSATION PROGRAM THAT IS BASED ON 4 SCIENTIFIC DATA AND RESEARCH; TO REQUIRE THAT THE PROGRAM INCLUDE 5 THE FOLLOWING MINIMUM COMPONENTS: THE USE OF MASS MEDIA TO 6 DISCOURAGE THE USE OF FENTANYL AND ABUSE OF OTHER DRUGS AND TO 7 EDUCATE PEOPLE ABOUT THE HEALTH HAZARDS FROM THE USE OF FENTANYL AND ABUSE OF OTHER DRUGS; MATERIALS, CURRICULA AND PROGRAMS THAT 8 9 MAY BE USED OR IMPLEMENTED IN SCHOOLS AND OTHER LOCATIONS TO 10 EDUCATE YOUTH ABOUT FENTANYL AND OTHER HARMFUL DRUGS AND TO DISCOURAGE THE USE OF FENTANYL AND ABUSE OF OTHER DRUGS; LOCAL 11 12 COMMUNITY PROGRAMS THAT DISCOURAGE THE USE OF FENTANYL AND ABUSE 13 OF OTHER DRUGS AND INVOLVE COMMUNITY BASED ORGANIZATIONS IN FENTANYL AND DRUG ABUSE EDUCATION, PREVENTION AND CESSATION 14 15 PROGRAMS IN THEIR COMMUNITIES; AND PROGRAMS TO ASSIST AND HELP 16 PEOPLE TO STOP USING FENTANYL AND/OR ABUSING OTHER DRUGS; AND FOR 17 RELATED PURPOSES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: **SECTION 1.** The State Department of Health shall develop and implement a comprehensive statewide fentanyl and drug abuse education, prevention and cessation program that is based on scientific data and research that have been shown to be effective at accomplishing the purposes of this section. At a minimum, the program shall include the following components:

33 Materials, curricula and programs that may be used (b) or implemented in schools and other locations to educate youth 34 35 about fentanyl and other harmful drugs and to discourage the use of fentanyl and abuse of other drugs, including, but not limited 36 37 to, materials, curricula and programs that involve youth, educate youth about the health hazards from the use of fentanyl and abuse 38 39 of other drugs, help youth develop skills to refuse fentanyl and 40 other harmful drugs, and demonstrate to youth how to stop using 41 fentanyl and abusing other drugs;

42 (c) Local community programs, including, but not 43 limited to, youth-based partnerships that discourage the use of 44 fentanyl and abuse of other drugs and involve community-based 45 organizations in fentanyl and drug abuse education, prevention and 46 cessation programs in their communities;

47 (d) Programs to assist and help people to stop using48 fentanyl and/or abusing other drugs; and

No. 1206 **~ OFFICIAL ~** 23/HR43/R1644 PAGE 2 (RF\EW) (e) A surveillance and evaluation system that monitors program accountability and results, produces publicly available reports that review how monies expended for the program are spent, and includes an evaluation of the program's effectiveness in reducing and preventing the use of fentanyl and abuse of other drugs, and annual recommendations for improvements to enhance the program's effectiveness.

56 **SECTION 2.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 57 and after July 1, 2023.
