HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 30

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING AND COMMENDING THE 2 JACKSON STATE UNIVERSITY "TIGERS" FOOTBALL TEAM, HEAD COACH DEION 3 SANDERS AND THE "TIGERS" COACHING STAFF UPON WINNING THEIR SECOND CONSECUTIVE SOUTHWESTERN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE (SWAC) CHAMPIONSHIP UPON BECOMING THE 2022 SWAC CHAMPIONS, AND RECOGNIZING JACKSON 5 STATE UNIVERSITY'S CONTINUAL FULFILLMENT OF ITS VISION STATEMENT 7 OF BUILDING UPON ITS HISTORIC MISSION OF PROMOTING AND EMPOWERING 8 DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION AMONG ITS SCHOLARS AND SCHOLAR-ATHLETES 9 THROUGH INTERDISCIPLINARY AND MULTI-MODAL COLLABORATIVE LEARNING. 10 WHEREAS, the Jackson State University "Tigers" Football Team, 11 led by "Coach Prime" Deion Sanders and an equally exceptional 12 coaching staff, reigned supreme during the 2022 season, laying claim to its second consecutive Southwestern Athletic Conference 13 14 (SWAC) Championship, the Tigers' first back-to-back SWAC titles 15 since 1995-1996; and WHEREAS, after initially clenching the SWAC Championship 16 17 during the 2021 gridiron season for the first time since 2007 with 18 the university's first 11-win season in school history, the 2022 19 Tigers one upped their previous season, breaking their own record by going a perfect 12-0 on the regular season, and 8-0 in

conference division play; and

22	WHEREAS, the Tigers, who had a superior season that was
23	driven by more than just the yearning to succeed, intensely
24	amplified all of their hard work, motivation and audacity, which
25	were so apparent all through the season, for the game that
26	ultimately separated the gladiators from the civilians, to defeat
27	Southern University 43-24 at Mississippi Veterans Memorial Stadium
28	in Jackson, Mississippi, on December 3, 2022, before an exuberant
29	crowd of 53,754 enthusiastic spectators, and collect the program's
30	18th SWAC Football Championship, which also berthed the team's
31	second consecutive bowl appearance at the Cricket Celebration
32	Bowl; and
33	WHEREAS, striving all season long to be the best football
34	program in the state, Jackson State University put aside the
35	excitement, fanfare and attention to focus on the championship
36	game and prepare as they had throughout the season, and that
37	strategy, along with the monumental support from the entire
38	community, which evidenced its devoted belief in "Thee I Love"
39	through record breaking game attendance that amassed approximately
40	501,000 fans throughout the 2022 season of competition, and which
41	further helped solidify the Tigers' ascent to championship status;
42	and
43	WHEREAS, bursting with wit and athleticism, the Jackson State
44	University Tigers Football Team's mental stamina and determination
45	never waivered from the moment they ran onto the field until the
46	last down was played scoring 490 points on the season, while only

- 47 yielding 176 points to their formidable opponents, for an average
- 48 of approximately 37.7 points per game; and
- WHEREAS, during the championship game that kept fans in a
- 50 fully immersive experience for the entire 60 minutes of
- 51 electrifying play, the game's opening 11 minutes set the tone for
- 52 what was to follow in the next three quarters as the nation's top
- 53 ranked defense forced three turnovers, made two sacks and
- 54 following a three-and-out forced by the JSU defense, the Tigers'
- 55 offense drove 61 yards in nine plays, as freshman kicker,
- 56 Alejandro Mata's 22-yard field goal gave Jackson State a 3-0 lead;
- 57 and
- 58 WHEREAS, the interception and 37-yard return of a Southern
- 59 pass by Herman Smith III positioned the Tigers at the Jaguar's
- 60 one-yard line, which made for an effortless one-yard touchdown run
- 61 by Sy'Veon Wilkerson two plays later, followed by a PAT kick that
- 62 gave Jackson State a 10-0 lead with 8:26 to play in the first
- 63 quarter; and
- WHEREAS, On the ensuing possession, linebacker Aubrey Miller
- 65 Jr.'s sack and forced fumble was recovered by Antonio Doyle, Jr.,
- 66 at the Southern 14-yard line, which afforded quarterback Shedeur
- 67 Sanders prime opportunity to capitalize on the next play, by
- 68 firing a 14-yard touchdown pass to Shane Hooks, and Kevin
- 69 Coleman's two-point conversion pass catapulted the Tigers to an
- 70 18-0 lead with 6:35 remaining in the first quarter; and

71 WHEREAS, Jackson State made its third takeaway on the next 72 Southern drive as Baron Hopson's sack and forced fumble was 73 recovered by Justin Ragin at the JSU 42-yard line, allowing the 74 Tigers to find the end zone once again as Sanders and Hooks 75 connected on a 40-yard scoring pass, and echoed with a 76 Sanders-to-Coleman two-point conversion pass, which gave JSU a 77 26-0 advantage over Southern with 3:51 to play in the opening 78 period; and 79 WHEREAS, an early score by Southern in the second quarter 80 only fueled JSU's fire, compelling the Tigers to respond on its fifth straight possession with a seven-play, 85-yard drive, which 81 82 resulted in a 14-yard scoring pass from Sanders to Coleman, and 83 Mata's PAT boosting the Tigers to a 33-7 lead with 11:25 to play in the first half; and 84 WHEREAS, after Southern managed to close the gap in the third 85 86 quarter, the Tigers, on the prowl, pounced once again to put the 87 game away for good, as Sanders threw his fourth touchdown pass of the game, a nine-yard strike to Rico Powers late in the period for 88 89 the final margin, yielding the Tigers a 43-24 victory over the 90 Jaquars, a staunch reminder why tigers are the "true" kings of the 91 jungle; and 92 WHEREAS, while the old saying goes, "defense wins championships," it certainly held true during the championship 93

game, as the Tigers' defense erected an impenetrable stone wall

that showcased the tactical prowess, stamina and skillsets that

- 96 are inherent characteristics to the apex predator for which they
- 97 are named; and
- 98 WHEREAS, the Tigers, who played with nothing but heart and
- 99 soul all season, have a very talented and distinguished roster,
- 100 and each player made a substantial contribution that led to one of
- 101 the most historic seasons in the history of the Tigers football

L27	and there were outstanding performances by individual players, bu
L28	the key to the team's remarkable success has been the constant
L29	atmosphere of unity and year-round hard work by the following
L30	talented 19 student-athletes who were named to all-conference
L31	teams as All-SWAC honorees, including: first-team recipients,
L32	Shedeur Sanders, Aubrey Miller, Jr., Dallas Daniels, Shane Hooks,
L33	Willis Patrick, Tyler Brown, Cam'ron Silmon-Craig and Alejandro
L34	Mata; second-team recipients, Travis Hunter, Sy'Veon Wilkerson,
L35	D.J. Stevens, Devin Hayes, Justin Ragin, Nyles Gaddy, Shilo
L36	Sanders and Isaiah Bolden; third-team recipients, Jurriente Davis
L37	and John Huggins; fourth-team recipient, Jacob Politte; in
L38	addition to Shedeur Sanders being named Offensive Player of the
L39	Year, Aubrey Miller, Jr., being named Defensive Player of the
L40	Year, and Kevin Coleman, Jr., being named Freshman of the Year;
L41	WHEREAS, Head Coach Deion Sanders, who doubled up on being
L42	named SWAC Coach of the Year for the second consecutive year,
L43	along with an elite coaching staff who are personally vested in
L44	the academic and athletic success of each player, have superbly
4.5	coached and tremendously inspired the Tigers and broadened their

146	knowledge of the game while refining their skills in execution,
147	and he continues to build upon the legacy of superior play and
148	true sportsmanship forged by the tenacious and undaunted spirit of
149	each team member, as evidenced in his ability to produce high
150	caliber players and plays and by the team's successful season; and
151	WHEREAS, the level of accountability to which each player is
152	held has manifested a culture of success that has become
153	demonstrative both on and off the field, and not only with the
154	football team, but through the entire Tigers' athletics program,
155	which leads the Southwestern Athletic Conference, and the state of
156	Mississippi in the latest NCAA's Graduation Success Rate (GSR)
157	report announced in November, posting an overall GSR of 90%, the
158	highest in the SWAC, and tied with Ole Miss and Mississippi State
159	for the highest in the state; and
160	WHEREAS, despite the challenges of the pandemic and endemic
161	water and infrastructure woes, JSU's student-athletes, staff and
162	coaches remained steadfast in their focus on the academic mission
163	of becoming champions in the classroom first, which has enabled
164	them to continually excel in all aspects of the collegiate
165	experience, which in turn further impacts their posture for their
166	individual career successes moving forward, as more than 150
167	student-athletes attained at least a 3.0 grade-point average, with
168	35 student-athletes with a 4.0 GPA, and a collective 3.101 grade
169	point average in the Fall 2022 semester, which produced 28
170	graduates; and

171	WHEREAS, building on its historic mission of empowering a
172	culturally diverse cohort of students to become leaders, Jackson
173	State University has become recognized as a challenging, yet
174	nurturing, state-of-the-art technologically-infused intellectual
175	community that promotes student and faculty engagement in creative
176	research, participation in interdisciplinary and
177	multi-instructional/organizational collaborative learning teams,
178	while serving the global community; and
179	WHEREAS, the symphony of diversity and inclusion that is
180	being masterfully orchestrated by the administration of Jackson
181	State University has laid the historical foundation for a student
182	body that is a beautiful tapestry of ethnicities and cultures
183	intricately woven together into a masterpiece that is
184	representative of the Mississippi we aspire daily to achieve and
185	utilize as a branding trademark to highlight the greatness and
186	limitless potential for success the Hospitality State has to
187	offer; and
188	WHEREAS, in a testament to the fulfillment of its platform of
189	diversity and inclusion JSU made history on April 5, 2022, with
190	the Sonic Boom of the South's bestowing the J5 head drum major
191	honor for the 2022-2023 season upon senior Marvin Garcia Meda, as
192	the first Hispanic head drum major after initially becoming the
193	first Hispanic student to hold a highly-coveted position as a
194	member of the energetic, high-stepping and
195	synchronously-choreographed quintet as a sophomore, and sophomore

197	performer of the Prancing J-Settes in the institution's history,
198	both of whom are first-generation Jackson State University
199	students; and
200	WHEREAS, the beauty of Jackson State University is the
201	familial bond that was established at its 1877 founding as Natchez
202	Seminary by the American Baptist Home Mission Society for the
203	moral, religious and intellectual improvement of African
204	Americans, and which prevails in perpetuity through the
205	dauntlessly enduring commitment to those core values while
206	expanding its curriculum to meet the ambitious educational needs
207	of a progressive student body whose affinity for their beloved
208	university is entrenched in the popular ascribed alumni motto,
209	"Thee I Love," which is gleaned from the lyrics of its alma mater
210	"Jackson Fair"; and
211	WHEREAS, it is the policy of this Legislature to recognize
212	and commend outstanding Mississippi student-athletes, especially
213	those such as the Jackson State University "Tigers" Football Team,
214	whose hard work and perseverance brings honor to their school,
215	their community and to the State of Mississippi:
