HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 49

1 A RESOLUTION COMMENDING OMEGA PSI PHI FRATERNITY, INC., FOR 2 ITS IMPRESSIVE HISTORY OF COMMUNITY ACTIVISM, ITS LEGACY OF 3 BROTHERHOOD AND ITS CELEBRATION OF MARCH 9, 2023, AS "OMEGA PSI 4 PHI DAY" IN MISSISSIPPI.

5 WHEREAS, the men and brothers of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, 6 Inc., have convened at the Mississippi State Capitol on March 9, 7 2023, in celebration of "Omega Psi Phi Day" in Mississippi in 8 continuation of its legacy of occupying a progressive, cooperative 9 and constructive place in the civic and political life of 10 communities throughout the state, the nation and the world; and

WHEREAS, this fraternity was the first international 11 12 fraternal organization founded on the campus of Howard University in Washington, D.C., on November 17, 1911, by three distinguished 13 14 Howard University juniors, Edgar Amos Love, Oscar James Cooper and Frank Coleman, with the assistance of their faculty advisor, Dr. 15 Ernest Everett Just, and from the initials of the Greek phrase 16 17 "friendship is essential to the soul," the name Omega Psi Phi was derived and the phrase was selected as the fraternity's motto; and 18

19 WHEREAS, the organization's distinguished founders graduated 20 from Howard University to become distinguished professionals with 21 stellar resumes and impressive lives; and

22 WHEREAS, Dr. Ernest E. Just became a world-renowned biologist 23 who was the first recipient of the prestigious Spingarn Medal from 24 the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People 25 (NAACP) in 1915, with a distinguished legacy that earned him the 26 honor of being the 19th historic figure celebrated in the U.S. 27 Postal Service's Black Heritage Stamp Series on February 1, 1996; 28 and

29 WHEREAS, Professor Frank Coleman became a beloved professor 30 and head of the Physics Department at Howard University and later 31 an Officer in the United States Army in World War I; Dr. Oscar J. 32 Cooper earned a doctor of medicine degree from Howard University 33 in 1917, and practiced medicine for over 50 years in Philadelphia, 34 Pennsylvania; and Bishop Edgar A. Love was a United States Army 35 Chaplain in World War I and was a bishop in the Methodist Church for many years; and 36

WHEREAS, over 700 chapters of this distinguished fraternity have been established in the United States and around the world since its inception, with 21 graduate chapters and nine undergraduate chapters in the great State of Mississippi; and WHEREAS, the astute men of Omega Psi Phi are tremendously

44 scholarship program, voter registration program, education and 45 mobilization program, Talent Hunt program, National High School 46 Essay Contest, Assault on Illiteracy program, annual Charles Drew 47 Blood Drive, College Endowment Fund program, Domestic Abuse 48 Awareness program, Fatherhood Initiative program and the National 49 Social Action program; and

50 WHEREAS, the passionate Mississippi chapters of Omega Psi Phi 51 Fraternity have dedicated over 5,000 hours of community service, 52 and donated hundreds of thousands of dollars to multiple projects 53 with the purpose of uplifting and encouraging citizens of their 54 communities to achieve higher social, economic and intellectual 55 statuses; and

56 WHEREAS, in the mid-1930s, a group of exceptional Omega 57 members, Robert C. Weaver, Lawrence Oxley, Roscoe Brown, Frank 58 Horne, William Hastie, J. Arthur Weiseger, Ted Poston, Campbell C. 59 Johnson and William Trent were appointed to the Federal Council of 60 Negro Affairs or "Black Cabinet," which was an informal group created by President Franklin D. Roosevelt which was comprised of 61 62 African-American public policy advisors whose mission was to help 63 the country emerge out of the depression; and

64 WHEREAS, other fascinating Omega men in our nation's history 65 include Charles Drew, who perfected the use of blood plasma as a 66 life-saving tool; Spottswood Robinson, Oliver Hill and James 67 Nabrit, who were an integral part of the inner circle for the 68 NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund and who coordinated the

Board of Education; Wiley A. Branton, who served as the 71 72 principal lawyer in the civil rights case that desegregated the 73 public schools in Little Rock, Arkansas, in 1957; and Bayard 74 Rustin, an outstanding activist and one of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s advisors, who helped organize the March on Washington for 75 76 Jobs and Freedom that occurred in Washington, D.C., on August 28, 77 1963, where Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., delivered his legendary 78 "I Have a Dream" speech; and

79 WHEREAS, numerous Omega men have been involved in various influential and note worthy professions, including Dr. Robert C. 80 81 Weaver, the first African-American person appointed to a 82 cabinet-level position in the United States, who was appointed as 83 the first Secretary of Housing and Urban Development in 1966; H. 84 Carl Moultrie, who was appointed as a judge to the Superior Court 85 of Washington, D.C.; Clifford Alexander, who was appointed Secretary of the Army in 1976; Ronald McNair, who tragically 86 87 perished during the launch of the Space Shuttle Challenger on 88 January 28, 1986; Reverend Jesse Jackson, Jr., who became a 89 candidate for the Democratic Party presidential nomination in 1986; L. Douglas Wilder, the first African-American Governor 90 elected in the history of the United States, who became Virginia's 91 92 66th Governor on January 13, 1990; and David Satcher, who was

93 appointed the 16th Surgeon General of the United States in 1998; 94 and
