HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 88

1 A RESOLUTION HONORING THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF MR. ROY L. 2 DIXON, SR., AND EXPRESSING DEEPEST SYMPATHY TO HIS FAMILY AND 3 FRIENDS UPON HIS PASSING. 4 WHEREAS, it is written in Ecclesiastes 3:1 that "To everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under 5 the Heaven," and as such, on February 18, 2023, the immaculate 6 7 author and finisher of our soul's destiny summoned the mortal presence of dearly beloved, Mr. Roy L. Dixon, Sr., to eternal 8 9 rest, rendering great sorrow and loss to his family, friends and 10 community; and 11 WHEREAS, born on October 17, 1942, in Georgetown,

Mississippi, Mr. Dixon was the eleventh child born to Mr. Sebie 12 and Mrs. Louisa Mallard Dixon, and he attended Brushy Creek High 13 14 School, and growing up, he was a faithful member of New Hope M.B. 15 Church in Georgetown; and

16 WHEREAS, Mr. Dixon moved to Jackson, Mississippi, in 1959, where he joined St. Luther M.B. Church, serving as a trustee and 17

18 on the ushers board, and he later became an active member of the 19 Temple of Yah; and

20 WHEREAS, true love struck, and in 1961, Mr. Dixon exchanged 21 the vows of holy matrimony with Ms. Maxine Haley of Crystal 22 Springs, Mississippi, and to this union, six children were born, 23 three boys and three girls; and

24 WHEREAS, always a hard worker, Mr. Dixon grew up working from 25 sunup to sundown on a farm, growing all types of vegetables, and 26 hauling pulpwood and logs, and he began working at Illinois 27 Central Gulf Railroad, where he retired after 20 years, becoming 28 one of the company's first African-American car inspectors, and 29 during that time, he also worked at the Mississippi School Supply 30 Company, starting out working in the warehouse, and because of his exceptional work ethic, he was later promoted to the salesman 31 position, becoming the first African-American to hold that 32 33 position; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Dixon also later owned a janitorial service and a record shop in Crystal Springs, and while never passing up an opportunity, he learned how to cook pork skins from Mr. John Holland, and as the producing and selling of pork skins became a huge success, in April 1974, he built his first building to manufacture Dixon's Fried Pork Skins next to his home; and

WHEREAS, trailblazing a path for future entrepreneurs, Mr.
Dixon became the first African-American in Mississippi to be
approved by the State Health Department and to be USDA Inspected,

43 as well as the first African-American in Mississippi to 44 manufacture and distribute his own product to be sold in stores; 45 and

WHEREAS, in 1980, Mr. Dixon moved to a 10,000 square foot building on Lynch Street, and in 1982, he was the first to bring Jay's Potato Chips to Jackson, Mississippi, and there were numerous awards given as a result of his business from 1980 until 1983; and

51 WHEREAS, throughout his illustrious career in business, Mr. 52 Dixon was tremendously successful and received over 40 different 53 awards and other recognitions as an entrepreneur, such as 54 Entrepreneur of the Year for the Southern Region of the Small Business Association, the 1984 Minority Business Award from 55 56 Jackson, Mississippi, in which he was invited to Washington, D.C., 57 where President Ronald Reagan spoke to him and others in the Rose 58 Garden and recognized him for his outstanding achievement, and an 59 award that was presented to him by former Mississippi Governor, William Winter, at a luncheon at the Governor's Mansion, and in 60 61 1986, he was featured in the USA Today paper, as well as a 62 Mississippi Today book in 1988; and

63 WHEREAS, dedicated to excellence, Mr. Dixon established 64 scholarships where he sent 15 students to Jackson State 65 University, a truly honorable effort; and

66 WHEREAS, Mr. Dixon later partnered with N.L. Carson and built 67 a 20,000 square foot building in Carthage, Mississippi, named

No. 88 **~ OFFICIAL ~** 23/HR31/R2264 PAGE 3 (MCL\JAB) 68 Central Snacks, Inc., and currently, Mr. Carson, along with 69 several employees, manufactures Dixon Pork Skins and other 70 products, and he has distributors in several different states; and 71 WHEREAS, although Mr. Dixon experienced some difficult 72 moments while in business, that did not stop him from pursuing his 73 dream as he understood that success does not come easy, it takes 74 hard work, and sometimes disappointments; and

WHEREAS, devoted to his faith, Mr. Dixon believed that putting God first was most important and was committed to sharing his faith, and because of this, the late Sheriff McMillan of Hinds County, Mississippi, agreed for him to teach at Raymond Detention Center, and he began teaching on Tuesday nights, and later started teaching downtown in the Jackson Police Department jail facility on Thursday nights; and

82 WHEREAS, a true philanthropist, from 2002 through 2012, Mr. 83 Dixon did not miss a week of teaching at the detention center, 84 even teaching on his birthday and having a birthday party for 85 himself, as he brought the cakes and snacks and they would all 86 celebrate with him, and he would purchase Bibles and reading 87 glasses for those that needed them; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Dixon later began teaching at the Henley-Young Juvenile Detention Center, where his motto was, "You Are Better Than That", and he had pamphlets made for the juveniles to learn the Lord's Prayer, Psalm 23 and the Ten Commandments; and

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92 WHEREAS, with a giving heart and a love for serving others, 93 especially those most in need, Mr. Dixon often gave lunches to 94 sick and bereaved families in their time of need, and he was a 95 person who loved his community and wanted to make a positive 96 difference; and

97 WHEREAS, Mr. Dixon's passion was to see small 98 African-American businesses thrive and succeed, and he loved 99 people and wanted to see them smile, and he enjoyed a good laugh 100 by telling some of his famous jokes, and as a true man of God, he 101 did not only leave you with a smile, but he also left you with a 102 word of wisdom and encouragement; and

103 WHEREAS, Mr. Dixon will forever be remembered by his family 104 and community as a loving husband and father, outstanding leader, 105 successful businessman, incredible activist, and a man with 106 extraordinary integrity and wisdom; and

107 WHEREAS, though he has traversed the river of life to reunite 108 with those who answered God's summons to life eternal and now beckon his arrival to the celestial shores of Heaven's grandeur, 109 110 such as his parents, Mr. Sebie and Mrs. Louisa Dixon; daughter, 111 Julie Dixon Moses; sisters, Lenora Wilson, Mable Rogers, Rubystyne 112 Brent and Willie Celeste Catchings; brothers, Earl Dixon, Sr., 113 Colie Dixon, Carlee Dixon, Sebie Dixon, Jr., and Wilmer Dixon; the legacy of Mr. Dixon's indelible imprint upon our lives will 114 115 continue to refresh the hearts and fond memories of his loved ones, including his devoted wife of 62 years, Mrs. Maxine Dixon; 116
