SENATE BILL NO. 2167

AN ACT TO ENACT THE MISSISSIPPI EARLY INTERVENTION PILOT PROJECT ACT; TO PROVIDE FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE MISSISSIPPI EARLY INTERVENTION PILOT PROJECT WITHIN THE T.K. MARTIN CENTER AT MISSISSIPPI STATE UNIVERSITY, SUBJECT TO THE AVAILABILITY OF 5 FUNDING, FOR A PERIOD OF ONE YEAR BEGINNING ON JULY 1, 2023; TO PROVIDE FOR THE PURPOSE OF THE PILOT PROJECT, INCLUDING THAT IT 7 TAKE REFERRALS FROM PRIMARY CARE PROVIDERS WHO ARE LOCATED WITHIN THE DESIGNATED PILOT PROJECT AREA BASED ON AN IDENTIFIED CONCERN 8 9 ON EITHER AN EVIDENCE-BASED DEVELOPMENTAL SCREENER OR A CAREGIVER 10 CONCERN AND TO BE RESPONSIBLE FOR PROVIDING EARLY INTERVENTION 11 SERVICES AS WELL AS ASSISTING FAMILIES WHO WILL TRANSITION FROM 12 IDEA PART C SERVICES TO IDEA PART B SERVICES DURING THE PILOT PROJECT; TO PROVIDE FOR THE RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE T.K. MARTIN CENTER, INCLUDING REQUIRING THE 14 15 DIRECTOR TO SUBMIT A REPORT TO THE LEGISLATURE AT THE CONCLUSION 16 OF THE PROJECT; TO PROVIDE FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE EARLY 17 INTERVENTION TASK FORCE TO STUDY THE IDEA PART C EARLY 18 INTERVENTION SYSTEM IN MISSISSIPPI AND MISSISSIPPI'S LAWS 19 REGARDING EARLY INTERVENTION; TO PROVIDE FOR THE GOALS AND 20 RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TASK FORCE; TO PROVIDE FOR THE MEMBERSHIP 21 OF THE TASK FORCE; TO REQUIRE THE TASK FORCE TO DEVELOP AND REPORT 22 ITS FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR PROPOSED LEGISLATION TO THE 23 LEGISLATURE ON OR BEFORE DECEMBER 1, 2023; AND FOR RELATED 24 PURPOSES.

25 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:

26 **SECTION 1.** (1) This act shall be known and may be cited as

27 the "Mississippi Early Intervention Pilot Project Act."

28 (2) As used in this act, the following terms shall have the

29 meanings ascribed herein:

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30 (a)	"Designated	pilot	project	area"	means	an	area	that
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- 31 serves eligible children within the following counties: Choctaw,
- 32 Lowndes, Noxubee, Oktibbeha and Winston.
- 33 (b) "Early intervention services" shall have the same
- 34 meaning as defined in Section 41-87-5.
- 35 (c) "Eligible infants and toddlers" or "eligible
- 36 children" shall have the same meaning as defined in Section
- 37 41-87-5.
- 38 (d) "IDEA Part B" means Part B of the Individuals with
- 39 Disabilities Education Act pursuant to 20 USC 1411; 34 CFR 300.
- 40 (e) "IDEA Part C" means Part C of the Individuals with
- 41 Disabilities Education Act pursuant to 20 USC 1431; 34 CFR 303.
- 42 (f) "IFSP" means Individual Family Service Plan.
- 43 (q) "Mississippi Early Intervention Pilot Project" or
- 44 "Pilot Project" means the Early Intervention Pilot Project created
- 45 in this act and administered by the T.K. Martin Center for
- 46 Technology and Disability ("T.K. Martin Center") at Mississippi
- 47 State University.
- 48 (h) "Primary service providers" means a family's
- 49 primary contact for early intervention services who sees the
- 50 family most often, who collaborates with all service providers on
- 51 the IFSP team and who helps the family address the child's
- 52 development from a holistic perspective.
- (i) "University-based hub model" means a form of
- 54 service delivery in which early intervention services are provided

- 55 by state-employed personnel who provide service coordination,
- 56 developmental assessments, developmental intervention, child find,
- 57 and public awareness activities through Single Point of Entry
- District Offices (SPOE) located within public university systems. 58
- There is established within the T.K. Martin Center, the 59 (3)
- 60 Mississippi Early Intervention Pilot Project, subject to the
- availability of funding for such purposes. The Pilot Project will 61
- 62 deploy a fully staffed and salaried early intervention team in the
- 63 designated pilot project area using a university-based hub model
- 64 that is not dependent on contract providers. The purpose of the
- 65 Pilot Project is to determine if this approach to treatment is as
- efficient and as effective, or more effective, than the current 66
- 67 First Steps Early Intervention Program operated at the Mississippi
- State Department of Health. 68
- 69 (4)The Pilot Project shall:
- 70 Be administered by the T.K. Martin Center at
- 71 Mississippi State University;
- 72 Be operated for a period of one (1) year beginning
- 73 on July 1, 2023, and continuing through July 1, 2024;
- 74 Take referrals from primary care providers who are
- 75 located within the designated pilot project area based on an
- 76 identified concern on either an evidence-based developmental
- screener or a caregiver concern; 77
- 78 Provide timely and evidence-based early
- intervention services to eligible children; 79

80	(e)	Collect	and	supply	data	on	the	efficacy	of
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- 81 deploying a fully staffed and salaried intervention team using a
- 82 university-based hub model not dependent on contract providers;
- 83 (f) Utilize the University of Mississippi Medical
- 84 Center's Child Health Developmental Promotion (CHDP) fellows who
- 85 shall provide in-kind services as additional service providers
- 86 needed to enhance the early intervention services at the T.K.
- 87 Martin Center;
- 88 (q) Provide early intervention services to children who
- 89 are in the custody of Mississippi Child Protection Services;
- 90 (h) Partner with the Social Science Research Center at
- 91 Mississippi State University who will provide project evaluation
- 92 services;
- 93 (i) Be comprised of an early intervention team as
- 94 required by IDEA Part C for service provisions and shall be
- 95 comprised of a medical provider, occupational therapist, physical
- 96 therapist, speech-language pathologist, early
- 97 interventionist/developmental specialist, two (2) psychologists
- 98 and a social worker, the majority of which are employees at the
- 99 T.K. Martin Center or are CHDP fellows; and
- 100 (j) Be responsible for providing early intervention
- 101 services as well as assisting families who will transition from
- 102 IDEA Part C services to IDEA Part B services during the Pilot
- 103 Project.
- 104 (5) The Executive Director of the T.K. Martin Center shall:

105	(a)	Submit a	report	to	the	Legislature	on	or	before
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- 106 January 1, 2024, and at the conclusion of the Pilot Project; and
- 107 (b) Submit periodic reports to the "Early Intervention
- 108 Task Force to Study the IDEA Part C Early Intervention System in
- 109 Mississippi and Mississippi's Laws Regarding Early Intervention."
- 110 (6) The reports shall include, but are not limited to, the
- 111 following information:
- 112 (a) Total spent on Pilot Project funding;
- 113 (b) The amount of administrative costs to operate the
- 114 Pilot Project;
- 115 (c) The demographics of designated pilot project areas;
- 116 (d) The number of children (by county and age) deemed
- 117 eligible for services using current early intervention eligibility
- 118 criteria;
- (e) The number of children (by county and age) deemed
- 120 eligible for services using expanded early intervention
- 121 eligibility criteria which includes children at-risk of developing
- 122 a delay;
- (f) The number of children (by county and age) served
- 124 by the Pilot Project;
- 125 (g) The number of children (by county and age) referred
- 126 to the Pilot Project;
- 127 (h) The number of caregivers (by county) preferring
- 128 service delivery in natural environments;



129	(i) The number of children (by county and age) served
130	in natural environments;
131	(j) The number of caregivers (by county) opting for
132	program intake by telehealth services;
133	(k) The number of children (by county and age)
134	receiving timely services as required by IDEA Part C;
135	(1) The number of children (by county and age)
136	exhibiting improvement in outcomes such as positive social
137	emotional skills, acquisition and use of knowledge and skills, and
138	use of appropriate behaviors;
139	(m) The number of families (by county) reporting that
140	early intervention services have helped them in the following
141	ways: knowing their rights, effectively communicating their
142	children's needs and helping their children develop and learn;
143	(n) The number of children (by county and age)
144	receiving timely referrals to an (IFSP) as required by IDEA Part
145	C;
146	(o) The number of children (by county and age) with
147	disabilities exiting IDEA Part C with a timely transition
148	notification, conferencing and planning to enter IDEA Part B; and
149	(p) The data collected on program eligibility and
150	family preference for, and feasibility of, services delivered in

SECTION 2. (1) There is hereby established the "Early

Intervention Task Force to Study the IDEA Part C Early

- 155 Regarding Early Intervention." The goal of the Task Force shall
- 156 be to develop a recommendation to the Legislature on reforming the
- 157 current early intervention system and laws in Mississippi, with a
- 158 goal of increasing access to services for children from birth to
- 159 age three (3) through a robust First Steps Early Intervention
- 160 Program. The Task Force may propose legislation and rule changes
- 161 based upon its recommendation.
- 162 (2) The members of the Task Force shall be as follows:
- 163 (a) The Chairmen of the Public Health Committees of the
- 164 Mississippi Senate and the Mississippi House of Representatives,
- or his or her designee from their respective committee membership;
- 166 (b) The Chairmen of the Appropriations Committees of
- 167 the Mississippi Senate and the Mississippi House of
- 168 Representatives, or his or her designee from their respective
- 169 committee membership;
- 170 (c) One (1) member of the Mississippi State Senate, to
- 171 be named by the Lieutenant Governor; and one (1) member of the
- 172 Mississippi House of Representatives, to be named by the Speaker
- 173 of the House of Representatives, who are interested in early
- 174 intervention issues;
- 175 (d) The State Health Officer of the Mississippi
- 176 Department of Health or a designated deputy;



177	(e)	One	(1)	designee	that	is	а	direct	service	provider
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- 178 in the First Steps Early Intervention Program, to be named by the
- 179 State Health Officer;
- 180 (f) One (1) faculty member from the Social Science
- 181 Research Center (SSRC) at Mississippi State University, to be
- 182 named by the director of the SSRC;
- 183 (g) One (1) developmental-behavioral pediatrician with
- 184 expertise in early childhood systems building, to be named by the
- 185 Vice Chancellor of the University of Mississippi Medical Center;
- (h) One (1) general pediatrician, to be named by the
- 187 Mississippi Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics;
- (i) One (1) clinical psychologist with expertise in
- 189 social-emotional health of infants and toddlers, to be named by
- 190 the Vice Chancellor of the University of Mississippi Medical
- 191 Center:
- (j) One (1) school psychologist, to be named by the
- 193 Mississippi Association of Psychologists in the Schools;
- (k) One (1) early interventionist/development
- 195 therapist, to be named by the State Health Officer;
- 196 (1) The Executive Director of the Mississippi Early
- 197 Learning Alliance;
- 198 (m) One (1) family advocacy representative to be
- 199 appointed by the Executive Director of the Mississippi Coalition
- 200 for Citizens with Disabilities.

201	(n) One (1) parent representative with a current or
202	experience with early intervention to be appointed by the
203	Executive Director of the Mississippi Coalition for Citizens with
204	Disabilities.

- 205 (o) A faculty member from each of the universities
 206 within the Institutions of Higher Learning with an early childhood
 207 development program or early intervention program, to be named by
 208 the president of each university shall serve as advisory members
 209 to the task force; and
- 210 (p) Any other advisory members as determined necessary
 211 by the Joint Legislative Committee on Performance Evaluation and
 212 Expenditure Review.
- 213 (3) The Task Force shall meet within forty-five (45) days of 214 the effective date of this act and shall evaluate the current 215 early intervention laws in Mississippi. Specifically, the Task 216 Force shall:
- 217 (a) Evaluate early intervention infrastructure in
 218 Mississippi and in states with better performance outcomes as
 219 compared to Mississippi, study the employment structures of early
 220 intervention systems and evaluate eligibility requirements to
 221 support serving more children within the early intervention
 222 system;
- (b) Review billing and reimbursement processes and rates for early intervention services in Mississippi and in other states, to ensure a timely receipt of payment to providers;

226	(c) Explore options for an ideal location where early
227	intervention services should be housed to reduce barriers to
228	<pre>implementation;</pre>
229	(d) Study early intervention service delivery models
230	used in surrounding states, including a university-based hub model
231	and evaluate how this model may impact the training of students
232	and future professionals;
233	(e) Access the efficiency of telemedicine for initial
234	evaluations and therapeutic services deemed clinically
235	appropriate;
236	(f) Explore the benefits of including additional
237	service providers within the early intervention service delivery
238	system;
239	(g) Review the Comprehensive Systems of Personnel
240	Development (CSPD) and the quantity, quality and effectiveness of
241	the early intervention workforce; explore the feasibility of
242	funding a CSPD Coordinator within a state agency to assist in

(h) Evaluate the Early Intervention Pilot Project, as created in Section 2 of this act, review program data and provide recommendations;

ensuring all early intervention providers meet competencies for

248 (i) Explore the feasibility of developing an Office of 249 Early Childhood and provide recommendations on this approach; and

- 252 (4) The Task Force may request the assistance of the
 253 Mississippi Department of Health, the Social Sciences Research
 254 Center at Mississippi State University, the Mississippi Early
 255 Learning Alliance or any other related entity or organization with
 256 expertise in early intervention services.
- 257 (5) The members of the Task Force shall elect a Chair from 258 among the members. The Task Force shall develop and report its 259 findings and recommendations for proposed legislation to the 260 Legislature and proposed rule changes to the Mississippi 261 Department of Health on or before December 1, 2023. A quorum of 262 the membership shall be required to approve any final report and 263 recommendation. Members of the Task Force shall be reimbursed for 264 necessary travel expense in the same manner as public employees 265 are reimbursed for official duties from any available funds and 266 members of the Legislature shall be reimbursed in the same manner 267 as for attending out-of-session committee meetings.
- 268 (6) The Joint Legislative Committee on Performance
 269 Evaluation and Expenditure Review shall provide necessary clerical
 270 support for the meetings of the Task Force and the preparation of
 271 the report. Proposed legislation shall be prepared by the
 272 Legislative Services Offices of the Senate and House as requested.
- 273 (7) The Task Force shall be dissolved upon presentation of 274 its report.

275 **SECTION 3.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 276 and after July 1, 2023.
