COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL NO. 2580

1 AN ACT TO BRING FORWARD SECTIONS 37-106-75 AND 37-106-29, 2 MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, WHICH ARE THE PROVISIONS RELATED TO THE 3 HIGHER EDUCATION LEGISLATIVE PLAN (HELP) GRANT AND THE MISSISSIPPI 4 RESIDENT TUITION ASSISTANCE GRANT PROGRAM, FOR THE PURPOSE OF 5 POSSIBLE AMENDMENT; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 7 SECTION 1. Section 37-106-75, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 8 brought forward as follows: 9 37-106-75. (1) The Legislature hereby establishes the 10 Higher Education Legislative Plan Grant Program. 11 (2) For purposes of this section: "Institution of higher education" shall mean any 12 (a) state institution of higher learning or public community or junior 13 college, or any regionally accredited, state-approved, nonprofit 14 15 two-year or four-year college or university located in the State of Mississippi approved by the board. 16 17 (b) "Tuition" shall mean the semester or trimester or term charges and all required fees imposed by an institution of 18 higher education as a condition of enrollment by all students. 19 G1/2S. 20 However, for a two-year nonpublic institution of higher education 21 defined in paragraph (a), the tuition payments shall not exceed 22 the average charges and fees required by all of the two-year 23 public institutions of higher education defined in paragraph (a), 24 and for a four-year nonpublic institution of higher education 25 defined in paragraph (a), the tuition payments shall not exceed the average charges and fees required by all of the four-year 26 27 public institutions of higher education defined in paragraph (a).

(3) Subject to the availability of funds, the state may pay
the tuition of students who enroll at any state institution of
higher education to pursue an academic undergraduate degree who
apply for the assistance under the program and who meet all of the
following qualifications:

(a) Resident of the State of Mississippi. Resident
status for the purpose of receiving assistance under this chapter
shall be determined in the same manner as resident status for
tuition purposes in Sections 37-103-1 through 37-103-29, with the
exception of Section 37-103-17;

(b) Graduate from high school within the two (2) years
preceding the application with a minimum cumulative grade point
average of 2.5 calculated on a 4.0 scale;

41 (c) Successfully complete, as certified by the high
42 school counselor or other school official, high school coursework
43 which includes the College Preparatory Curriculum (CPC) approved

44 by the Board of Trustees of State Institutions of Higher Learning 45 and required for admission into a state university;

(d) Have a composite score on the American College Test
of at least twenty (20) on the 1989 version or an equivalent
concordant value on an enhanced version of such test;

49 (e) Have no criminal record, except for misdemeanor
50 traffic violations; and

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(f) Be in financial need.

52 Subject to the availability of funds, the state may pay (4) the tuition of students who enroll at any state institution of 53 54 higher education to pursue an academic undergraduate degree or 55 associate degree who apply for assistance under the program and 56 who meet the qualifications in paragraphs (a), (e) and (f) of 57 subsection (3) but who fail to meet one (1) of the particular 58 requirements established by paragraph (b), (c) or (d) of 59 subsection (3) by an amount of ten percent (10%) or less.

60 (5) To maintain continued state payment of tuition, once
61 enrolled in an institution of higher education, a student shall
62 meet all of the following requirements:

(a) Make steady academic progress toward a degree,
earning not less than the minimum number of hours of credit
required for full-time standing in each academic period requiring
such enrollment;

67 (b) Maintain continuous enrollment for not less than 68 two (2) semesters or three (3) quarters in each successive academic year, unless granted an exception for cause by the board; 69 70 Have a cumulative grade point average of at least (C) 2.5 calculated on a 4.0 scale at the end of the first academic 71 72 year and thereafter maintain such a cumulative grade point average as evaluated at the end of each academic year; 73

74 (d) Have no criminal record, except for misdemeanor75 traffic violations; and

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(e) Be in financial need.

(6) The provisions of this section shall be administered by the board. The board may promulgate rules for all matters necessary for the implementation of this section. By rule, the board shall provide for:

81 (a) A mechanism for informing all students of the 82 availability of the assistance provided under this section early 83 enough in their schooling that a salutary motivational effect is 84 possible;

(b) Applications, forms, financial audit procedures,
eligibility and other program audit procedures and other matters
related to efficient operation;

(c) A procedure for waiver through the 1996-1997
academic year of the program eligibility requirement for
successful completion of a specified core curriculum upon proper
documentation by the applicant that failure to comply with the

92 requirement is due solely to the fact that the required course or 93 courses were not available to the applicant at the school 94 attended.

95 (7) An applicant shall be found to be in financial need if: 96 (a) The family has one (1) child under the age of 97 twenty-one (21), and the annual adjusted gross income of the 98 family is less than Forty-two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars 99 (\$42,500.00); or

(b) The family has an annual adjusted gross income of less than Forty-two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$42,500.00) plus Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for each additional child under the age of twenty-one (21).

The annual adjusted gross income of the family shall be verified by completion of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and the completion of the verification process if the applicant is selected for it.

As used in this subsection, the term "family" for an unemancipated applicant means the applicant, the applicant's parents and other children under age twenty-one (21) of the applicant's parents. The term "family" for an emancipated applicant means the applicant, an applicant's spouse, and any children under age twenty-one (21) of the applicant and spouse. (8) No student shall receive a grant under this section in

115 an amount greater than the tuition charged by the school. The

116 student must apply for a federal grant prior to receiving state
117 funds.

SECTION 2. Section 37-106-29, Mississippi Code of 1972, is brought forward as follows:

120 37-106-29. (1) There is established the Mississippi 121 Resident Tuition Assistance Grant Program for college or 122 university freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors to be 123 administered by the Mississippi Postsecondary Education Financial 124 Assistance Board established under Section 37-106-9, Mississippi 125 Code of 1972, which shall set the dates and deadlines for applying for an award under this section. The board shall establish such 126 127 rules and regulations as it deems necessary and proper to carry 128 out the purposes and intent of this section.

(2) The board shall approve grants to full-time freshmen,
sophomore, junior and senior Mississippi residents who meet the
general requirements for student eligibility as provided in
subsection (4) of this section.

133 (3) Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grants shall be 134 for Mississippi resident students from any Mississippi family 135 whose prior year adjusted gross income (AGI) exceeds the maximum 136 allowed to qualify for full Pell Grant eligibility and 137 campus-based federal aid. Those Mississippi students qualifying for less than the full Pell Grant award shall receive a 138 139 Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grant in an amount not to exceed the maximum Pell Grant allowable for that individual 140

141 student. The award shall be applied to tuition, rooms and meals, 142 books, materials and fees not to exceed One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for junior and senior students attending state 143 institutions of higher learning in Mississippi or four-year 144 145 regionally accredited, state-approved, nonprofit colleges and 146 universities in Mississippi, and Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for freshmen and sophomores attending state institutions of higher 147 learning or public community or junior colleges in Mississippi, or 148 149 regionally accredited, state-approved, nonprofit two-year or 150 four-year colleges in Mississippi, which will be prorated per 151 term, semester or quarter of the academic year for costs of 152 attendance, calculated according to the formula specified in 153 subsection (8) of this section.

154 (4) The general requirements for initial eligibility of
155 students for Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grants
156 consist of the following:

(a) Member of a Mississippi family whose prior year
adjusted gross income (AGI) exceeds the maximum allowed to qualify
for Pell Grant eligibility and campus-based federal aid.

(b) Acceptance for enrollment at any state institution of higher learning or public community or junior college located in Mississippi, or any regionally accredited, state-approved, nonprofit two-year or four-year college or university located in Mississippi and approved by the board.

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(c) Completion of a secondary education as follows:

166 (i) Graduation from high school verified by the
167 institution before disbursement of award with a minimum grade
168 point average of 2.5 calculated on a 4.0 scale after seven (7)
169 semesters as certified by the high school counselor or other
170 authorized school official on the application; or

171 (ii) Attendance at a home education program during172 grade levels 9 through 12; or

173 (iii) Satisfactory completion of the High School174 Equivalency Diploma; or

175 (iv) Successful completion of the International176 Baccalaureate Program.

(d) A minimum score of fifteen (15) on the ACT test except that any student entering a vocational or technical program of study, or who has satisfactorily completed the High School Equivalency Diploma Test and attends a community or junior college will not be required to have a test score under the ACT unless a student enrolls in courses of academic study.

(e) Any student currently enrolled in any qualified
institution shall have to only meet the same requirements as
students who are applying for a renewal award.

(5) By accepting a Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grant, the student is attesting to the accuracy, completeness and correctness of information provided to demonstrate the student's eligibility. Falsification of such information shall result in the denial of any pending grant and revocation of any award

191 currently held to the extent that no further payments shall be 192 Any student knowingly making false statements in order to made. 193 receive a grant shall be quilty of a misdemeanor punishable, upon conviction thereof, by a fine of up to Ten Thousand Dollars 194 195 (\$10,000.00), a prison sentence of up to one (1) year in the 196 county jail, or both, and shall be required to return all 197 Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grants wrongfully 198 obtained.

(6) Eligibility for renewal of Mississippi Resident Tuition
Assistance Grants shall be evaluated at the end of each semester,
or term, of each academic year. As a condition for renewal, a
student shall:

(a) Make steady academic progress toward a certificate
or degree, as outlined in the school Satisfactory Academic
Progress Standards and certified by the institution's registrar.

206 (b) Maintain continuous enrollment for not less than 207 two (2) semesters or three (3) quarters in each successive 208 academic year, unless granted an exception for cause by the 209 administering board; examples of cause may include student 210 participation in a cooperative program, internship program or 211 foreign study program. If a student fails to maintain continuous 212 enrollment, and is not granted an exception for cause by the administering board, the student is ineligible to receive the 213 214 Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grant during the following 215 semester or trimester or term of the regular academic year.

(c) Have a cumulative grade point average of at least 217 2.50 calculated on a 4.0 scale at the end of each semester or 218 trimester or term.

(7) Each student, each year, must complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid form or a Statement of Certification as designed by the administering board to determine his/her eligibility for a Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grant.

224 (8) The amount of the Mississippi Resident Tuition (a) 225 Assistance Grant awarded to any one (1) student, up to the maximum 226 amount provided in subsection (3) of this section, shall be the difference of the student's cost of attendance at his accredited 227 college of choice and the amount of federal aid such student may 228 229 receive, not to supplant but to supplement the amount of any 230 federal aid awarded to the student. Cost of attendance is the 231 tuition and fees of the applicable institution plus an allowance 232 for room and meals and books and materials.

(b) Payment of the Mississippi Resident Tuition
Assistance Grant shall be made payable to the recipient and the
educational institution and mailed directly to the institution, to
be applied first to tuition.

(9) In order for an institution to remain eligible for its
students to participate in the Mississippi Resident Tuition
Assistance Grant Program, the institution shall comply with the
following requirements:

(a) A complete and accurate roster of the eligibility
status of each awarded student shall be made to the board for each
term, semester or quarter of the academic year the student
receives a Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grant.

245 (b) The institution is required to make refunds to the 246 Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grant Fund for any funds 247 which have not been disbursed to the recipient, in the case of 248 students who have received a grant but who terminate enrollment 249 during the academic term, semester or quarter of the academic year 250 if an institution's refund policies permit a student to receive a 251 refund in such instance. The recipient shall be responsible for 252 the refund of any funds which have been disbursed by the 253 institution in such instance.

(c) If a student drops below full-time status but does
not terminate all enrollment during the term, semester or quarter
of the academic year no refund will be required for that term.
However, that student is ineligible to receive the Mississippi
Resident Tuition Assistance Grant during the following term,
semester or quarter of the regular academic year.

(d) The board may conduct its own annual audits of any institution participating in the Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grant Program. The board may suspend or revoke an institution's eligibility to receive future monies under the program if it finds that the institution has not complied with the provisions of this section. In determining a student's initial

266 eligibility, the number of prior semesters enrolled will not be 267 counted against the student.

(10) No student may receive a Mississippi Resident Tuition
Assistance Grant for more than the equivalent semesters or
quarters required to complete one (1) baccalaureate degree or one
(1) certificate or associate degree program per institution.

272 (11) No student receiving a Mississippi Eminent Scholars Grant as provided in Section 37-106-31 shall be eligible to 273 274 receive the Mississippi Resident Tuition Assistance Grant pursuant 275 to this section unless he is eligible for such award after the 276 Mississippi Eminent Scholars Grant has been considered by the 277 board when conducting an assessment of the financial resources 278 available to the student. In no case shall any student receive 279 any combination of student financial aid that would exceed the 280 cost of attendance, as defined in subsection (8)(a).

For purposes of this section, certificated shall mean, but not be limited to, all postsecondary vocational programs in eligible institutions approved by the board.

284 **SECTION 3.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 285 and after July 1, 2023, and shall stand repealed on June 30, 2023.
