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## SENATE BILL NO. 3012 (As Sent to Governor)

1 2	AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO DEFRAY THE EXPENSES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY FOR FISCAL YEAR 2024.
3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
4	SECTION 1. The following sum of money, or so much thereof as
5	may be necessary, is appropriated out of any money in the State
6	General Fund not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of
7	the Department of Public Safety for the fiscal year beginning
8	July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2024 \$ 158,543,141.00.
9	SECTION 2. The following sum, or so much thereof as may be
10	necessary, is appropriated out of any money in the State Treasury
11	to the credit of the Department of Public Safety for the purpose
12	of defraying the expenses incurred in the operation of the various
13	divisions of the department for the fiscal year beginning
14	July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2024 \$ 114,574,930.00.
15	SECTION 3. Of the funds appropriated under the provisions of
16	this act, the following positions are authorized:

20	With the funds herein appropriated, it shall be the agency's
21	responsibility to make certain that funds required for Personal
22	Services for Fiscal Year 2025 do not exceed Fiscal Year 2024 funds
23	appropriated for that purpose unless programs or positions are
24	added to the agency's Fiscal Year 2024 budget by the Mississippi
25	Legislature. The Legislature shall determine the agency's
26	personal services appropriation, which the State Personnel Board
27	shall publish. The agency's personal services appropriation may
28	consist of restricted funds for approved vacancies for Fiscal Year
29	2024 that may not be utilized for active Fiscal Year 2023
30	Headcount. It shall be the agency's responsibility to ensure that
31	the funds provided for vacancies are used to increase headcount
32	and not for promotions, title changes, in-range salary adjustments
33	or any other mechanism for increasing salaries for current
34	employees. It is the Legislature's intention that no employee
35	salary falls below the minimum salary established by the
36	Mississippi State Personnel Board.

Additionally, the State Personnel Board shall determine and publish the projected annualized payroll costs based on current employees. It shall be the responsibility of the agency head to ensure that actual personnel expenditures for Fiscal Year 2024 do not exceed the data provided by the Legislative Budget Office. If the agency's Fiscal Year 2024 projected cost exceeds the annualized costs, no salary actions shall be processed by the

- 45 essential for the agency.
- Any transfers or escalations shall be made in accordance with
- 47 the terms, conditions, and procedures established by law or

- 80 **SECTION 6.** It is the intent of the Legislature that the
- 81 local governments pay for part of the computer cost of the
- 82 Mississippi Justice Information Center by maintaining their
- 83 contribution to the Department of Public Safety.
- SECTION 7. It is the intention of the Legislature that the
- 85 Department of Public Safety designate certain employees to aid the
- 86 Office of Forensics Laboratories in the billing and collecting of
- 87 all fees charged for services rendered by the Office of Forensics
- 88 Laboratories.
- 89 **SECTION 8.** No part of the funds appropriated herein shall be
- 90 transferred to, expended by, or used, directly or indirectly, for
- 91 the benefit of any public relations, publicity or publication
- 92 activities of any other state agency, department or officer, nor
- 93 shall any personnel paid with funds appropriated herein be

94	transferred or assigned to any other state agency, department or
95	officer for public relations, publicity, or publication activities

97	SECTION 9. It is the intention of the Legislature that the
98	Department of Public Safety shall not issue citations for
99	violations of speed limits on a quota basis. No funds expended
100	under this act shall be used for such quota-based citations for

102	SECTION 10. In compliance with the "Mississippi Performance
103	Budget and Strategic Planning Act of 1994," it is the intent of
104	the Legislature that the funds provided herein shall be utilized
105	in the most efficient and effective manner possible to achieve the

It is the intention of the Legislature that all 271 divisions within the Mississippi Department of Public Safety shall 272 maintain complete accounting and personnel records related to the 273 expenditure of all funds appropriated under this act and that such 274 records shall be in the same format and level of detail as maintained for Fiscal Year 2023. It is further the intention of 275 276 the Legislature that the agency's budget request for Fiscal Year 277 2025 shall be submitted to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee 278 in a format and level of detail comparable to the format and level 279 of detail provided during the Fiscal Year 2024 budget request 280 process.

SECTION 12. Of the funds appropriated under the provisions of Section 2 of this act, funds may be expended to defray the costs of clothing for sworn nonuniform law enforcement officers in an amount not to exceed One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) annually per officer.

SECTION 13. It is the intention of the Legislature that whenever two (2) or more bids are received by this agency for the purchase of commodities or equipment, and whenever all things stated in such received bids are equal with respect to price, quality and service, the Mississippi Industries for the Blind shall be given preference. A similar preference shall be given to

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the Mississippi Industries for the Blind whenever purchases are made without competitive bids.

SECTION 14. The department is authorized to expend available funds on technology or equipment upgrades or replacements when it will generate savings through efficiency or when the savings generated from such upgrades or replacements exceed expenditures thereof.

SECTION 15. Of the funds provided herein, and in addition to the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) authorized in Section 45-3-7,
