## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 512

1 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION MOURNING THE LOSS AND CELEBRATING THE 2 CONTRIBUTIONS AND CAREER OF MISSISSIPPI MUSIC ICON AND ROCK AND 3 ROLL LEGEND JERRY LEE LEWIS OF NESBIT, DESOTO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, AND EXPRESSING THE SYMPATHY OF THE LEGISLATURE ON HIS PASSING. WHEREAS, Jerry Lee Lewis, "The Killer," whose hammering 5

boogie-woogie piano, unleashed-tomcat voice, and unapologetic bad 6

7 boy persona made him a pioneer of rock & roll and rockabilly music

and an early rival of Elvis Presley, passed away on October 28, 8

9 2022. Lewis died at his home in Desoto County, Mississippi, with

his seventh wife, Judith Coghlan, by his side. He was 87; and 10

WHEREAS, Lewis' two 1957 singles, "Whole Lotta Shakin' Goin' 11

12 On" and "Great Balls of Fire," were some of rock's earliest and

most primal hits. His howling, whooping, libidinous performances 13

14 announced, as defiantly as any other records of the period, that a

new style of music had arrived and would take zero prisoners. "I 15

had created rock & roll before they ever thought about having rock 16

17 & roll," Lewis told Rolling Stone in 2014. "When Elvis come out,

18 he was rockabilly. When I come out with 'Whole Lotta Shakin'

- 19 Goin' On,' that was rock & roll. That's when the name 'rock &
- 20 roll' was put in front"; and
- 21 WHEREAS, born September 29, 1935, in Ferriday, Louisiana,
- 22 Lewis grew up poor. Around the house, young Jerry Lee was exposed
- 23 to cowboy music, blues 78s, and swing records, and he sneaked into
- 24 local clubs to hear the likes of Ray Charles and B.B. King.
- 25 Although he was proficient on the drums, Lewis began playing piano
- 26 at age eight. Lewis' father mortgaged their farm to buy him a
- 27 piano, and an older cousin taught him the boogie-woogie style soon
- 28 after. He gave his first public performance at age 15 in the
- 29 parking lot of a car dealership. He once said that the first song
- 30 he learned to play was "Silent Night," but, as he told Rolling
- 31 Stone, "I played it rock & roll style"; and
- 32 WHEREAS, Lewis' life was completely altered when he and his
- 33 father drove to Sun Records in Memphis. To afford the trip, the
- 34 elder Lewis sold 33 dozen eggs from his farm. Thanks to Presley,
- 35 Sun Records was the place to go for many aspiring musicians.
- 36 Label Head Sam Phillips wasn't present that day, but Chief
- 37 Engineer Jack Clement was, and after hearing Lewis sing and play
- 38 country songs, he advised Lewis to focus on rock & roll instead.
- 39 On a return trip to Sun, Lewis cut a few more rock songs,
- 40 including the country hit "Crazy Arms," which Phillips then heard.
- 41 "Where the hell did this man come from?" Phillips recalled to
- 42 Rolling Stone in 1979. In Lewis, Phillips saw a young, raw talent
- 43 equal to that of his biggest star, Presley; and

- WHEREAS, at the Sun Recording Studios in Memphis in 1956, along with Carl Perkins, Elvis Presley and Johnny Cash, Lewis was
- 46 part of the "Million Dollar Quartet"; and
- WHEREAS, at the end of one of his Sun recording sessions,
- 48 Lewis offhandedly suggested he cut a song he'd been playing on and
- 49 off. With no rehearsal with the band, Lewis bashed out "Whole
- 50 Lotta Shakin' Goin' On." Released in early 1957, the song
- 51 exploded on the charts, and with good reason. From its barreling
- 52 piano to Lewis' super-suggestive delivery, the song made other
- 53 greats sound tame. Both that hit and its follow-up cover, Otis
- 54 Blackwell's "Great Balls of Fire," weren't just dynamic, but also
- 55 historic. They landed in the Top Five of the country, pop and R&B
- 56 charts simultaneously; and
- 57 WHEREAS, Lewis kept working and recording. His Live at the
- 58 Star-Club, Hamburg album, taped in 1964, is still considered one
- 59 of rock's greatest concert records. He dug into blues, gospel,
- 60 and country. Some of Lewis' 1950s hits made the country charts,
- 61 and in 1968 he migrated to the genre. "Another Place Another
- 62 Time" kick-started a string of country hits, and he was reborn as
- 63 a honky-tonk singer with his career restored. He returned to the
- 64 pop charts in 1972 with a cover of Kris Kristofferson's "Me and
- 65 Bobby McGee." As proof of how much he was still revered, Lewis'
- 66 1972 album The Session, cut in London, features cameos from Peter
- 67 Frampton and Alvin Lee, among others. Lewis rarely slowed down
- 68 into the 80s, cuting a few rock-friendly albums for Elektra, and

- 69 he continued touring and recording, keeping his legend alive. He
- 70 was inducted into the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame in 1986. In 1989,
- 71 his life was immortalized onscreen in Great Balls of Fire,
- 72 featuring Dennis Quaid; and
- 73 WHEREAS, for all the turmoil and controversy about his life,
- 74 Lewis continued to loom large in the culture. He recorded two
- 75 well-received albums of duets, 2006's Last Man Standing and 2010's
- 76 Mean Old Man, featuring legends Jimmy Page, Eric Clapton, Mick
- 77 Jagger, Keith Richards, John Mayer, Rod Stewart, Merle Haggard,
- 78 Kid Rock and John Fogerty. Lewis was also the first act to
- 79 perform during the 25th-anniversary Rock & Roll Hall of Fame
- 80 concerts at Madison Square Garden in 2009. Moreover, his famous
- 81 1956 jam session with Presley, Johnny Cash and Carl Perkins was
- 82 turned into a Broadway musical, Million Dollar Quartet, the
- 83 following year. At the 2022 Cannes Film Festival, director Ethan
- 84 Coen premiered Jerry Lee Lewis: Trouble in Mind, his homage
- 85 documentary on the icon; and
- WHEREAS, in October of 2022, Lewis was inducted into the
- 87 Country Music Hall of Fame. He will be remembered for his
- 88 lifetime of hillbilly wildness, and he will be renowned for his
- 89 seizure of the musical moment at the dawn of rock & roll, when his
- 90 incomparable talent was intoxicating, playing out his defiant
- 91 dramas on the keyboard in the studio and on the stage and making
- 92 rock & roll history; and



93	WHEREAS, Jerry Lee Lewis is survived by his wife, Judith, and
94	his children Ronnie, Phoebe, Lori and Jerry Lee III; and
95	WHEREAS, Jerry Lee is known as the last survivor of rock and
96	roll's golden generation, and he will be celebrated for his impact
97	on Mississippi, American pop culture and the rock music rebellion:
98	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
99	MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That
100	we do hereby mourn the loss and celebrate the contributions and
101	career of Mississippi music icon Jerry Lee Lewis of Nesbit, Desoto
102	County, Mississippi, and express to his surviving family the
103	sympathy of the Legislature on the passing of this Mississippi
104	rock & roll legend.
105	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED That this resolution be presented to
106	the surviving family of Jerry Lee Lewis, forwarded to the
107	Mississippi Music Hall of Fame and the National Rock & Roll Hall
108	of Fame and be made available to the Capitol Press Corps.
