HOUSE BILL NO. 360

- AN ACT TO CREATE A NEW SECTION TO REQUIRE EMERGENCY
 COMMUNICATIONS DISTRICTS TO IMPLEMENT A SYSTEM TO ALLOW
- 3 TEXT-TO-911 SERVICES; TO AMEND SECTION 19-5-303, MISSISSIPPI CODE
- 4 OF 1972, TO DEFINE THE TERM "TEXT-TO-911"; TO AMEND SECTION
- 5 19-5-311, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO CONFORM TO THE PRECEDING
- 6 SECTIONS; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
- 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 8 **SECTION 1.** By January 1, 2026, all emergency communications
- 9 districts or the board of supervisors of any county that serves as
- 10 the commissioners of such district shall implement a system to
- 11 allow text-to-911 services.
- 12 **SECTION 2.** Section 19-5-303, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 13 amended as follows:
- 14 19-5-303. For purposes of Sections 19-5-301 through
- 15 19-5-317, the following words and terms shall have the following
- 16 meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:
- 17 (a) "Exchange access facilities" shall mean all lines
- 18 provided by the service supplier for the provision of local
- 19 exchange service as defined in existing general subscriber

20 services tariffs.

- 22 by a service supplier as stated in the service supplier's tariffs
- 23 and approved by the Public Service Commission, which represent the
- 24 service supplier's recurring charges for exchange access
- 25 facilities, exclusive of all taxes, fees, licenses or similar
- 26 charges whatsoever.
- 27 (c) "District" shall mean any communications district
- 28 created pursuant to Section 19-5-301 et seq., or by local and
- 29 private act of the State of Mississippi.
- 30 (d) "Service supplier" shall mean any person providing
- 31 exchange telephone service to any service user throughout the
- 32 county.
- (e) "Service user" shall mean any person, not otherwise
- 34 exempt from taxation, who is provided exchange telephone service
- 35 in the county or state.
- 36 (f) "E911" shall mean Enhanced Universal Emergency
- 37 Number Service or Enhanced 911 Service, which is a telephone
- 38 exchange communications service whereby a Public Safety Answering
- 39 Point (PSAP) designated by the county or local communications
- 40 district may receive telephone calls dialed to the abbreviated
- 41 telephone number 911. E911 Service includes lines and equipment
- 42 necessary for the answering, transferring and dispatching of
- 43 public emergency telephone calls originated by persons within the
- 44 serving area who dial 911. Enhanced 911 Service includes the

- 45 displaying of the name, address and other pertinent caller
- 46 information as may be supplied by the service supplier.
- 47 (g) "Basic 911" shall mean a telephone service
- 48 terminated in designated Public Safety Answering Points accessible
- 49 by the public through telephone calls dialed to the abbreviated
- 50 telephone number 911. Basic 911 is a voice service and does not
- 51 display address or telephone number information.
- 52 (h) "Shared tenant services (STS)" shall mean any
- 53 telephone service operation supplied by a party other than a
- 54 regulated local exchange telephone service supplier for which a
- 55 charge is levied. Such services shall include, but not be limited
- 56 to, apartment building systems, hospital systems, office building
- 57 systems and other systems where dial tone is derived from
- 58 connection of tariffed telephone trunks or lines connected to a
- 59 private branch exchange telephone system.
- (i) "Private branch exchange (PBX)" shall mean any
- 61 telephone service operation supplied by a party other than a
- 62 regulated local exchange telephone service supplier for which a
- 63 charge is not levied. Such services are those where tariffed
- 64 telephone trunks or lines are terminated into a central switch
- 65 which is used to supply dial tone to telephones operating within
- 66 that system.
- 67 (j) "Off-premise extension" shall mean any telephone
- 68 connected to a private branch exchange or a shared tenant service
- 69 which is in a different building or location from the main

- 70 switching equipment and, therefore, has a different physical
- 71 address.
- 72 (k) "Centrex" or "ESSX" shall mean any variety of
- 73 services offered in connection with any tariffed telephone service
- 74 in which switching services and other dialing features are
- 75 provided by the regulated local exchange telephone service
- 76 supplier.
- 77 (1) "Commercial mobile radio service" or "CMRS" shall
- 78 mean commercial mobile radio service under Sections 3(27) and
- 79 332(d) of the Federal Telecommunications Act of 1996, 47 USCS
- 80 Section 151 et seq., and the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of
- 81 1993, Public Law 103-66. The term includes the term "wireless"
- 82 and service provided by any wireless real-time, two-way voice
- 83 communication device, including radio-telephone communications
- 84 used in cellular telephone service, personal communication
- 85 service, or the functional or competitive equivalent of a
- 86 radio-telephone communications line used in cellular telephone
- 87 service, a personal communication service, or a network radio
- 88 access line. The term does not include service whose customers do
- 89 not have ready access to 911, to a communication channel suitable
- 90 only for data transmission, to a wireless roaming service or other
- 91 nonlocal radio access line service, or to a private
- 92 telecommunications system.
- 93 (m) "Telecommunicator" shall mean any person engaged in
- 94 or employed as a telecommunications operator by any public safety,

- 95 fire or emergency medical agency whose primary responsibility is
- 96 the receipt or processing of calls for emergency services provided
- 97 by public safety, fire or emergency medical agencies or the
- 98 dispatching of emergency services provided by public safety, fire
- 99 or emergency medical agencies and who receives or disseminates
- 100 information relative to emergency assistance by telephone or
- 101 radio.
- 102 (n) "Public safety answering point (PSAP)" shall mean
- 103 any designated point of contact between the public and the
- 104 emergency services such as a 911 answering point or, in the
- 105 absence of 911 emergency telephone service, any other designated
- 106 point of contact where emergency telephone calls are routinely
- 107 answered and dispatched or transferred to another agency.
- 108 (o) "Local exchange telephone service" shall mean all
- 109 lines provided by a service supplier as defined in existing
- 110 general subscriber tariffs.
- 111 (p) "911 emergency communication" means any FCC
- 112 mandated 911 communication, message, signal or transmission made
- 113 to a public safety answering point.
- 114 (q) "Voice over Internet Protocol service" means any
- 115 technology that permits a voice conversation using a voice
- 116 connection to a computer, whether through a microphone, a
- 117 telephone or other device, which sends a digital signal over the
- 118 Internet through a broadband connection to be converted back to
- 119 the human voice at a distant terminal and that delivers or is

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- 121 point. Voice over Internet Protocol service shall also include
- 122 interconnected Voice over Internet Protocol service, which is
- 123 service that enables real-time, two-way voice communications,
- 124 requires a broadband connection from the user's location, requires
- 125 Internet protocol compatible customer premises equipment, and
- 126 allows users to receive calls that originate on the public service
- 127 telephone network and to terminate calls to the public switched
- 128 telephone network.
- 129 (r) "Voice over Internet Protocol service supplier"
- 130 means a person or entity who provides Voice over Internet Protocol
- 131 service to subscribers for a fee.
- 132 (s) "Text-to-911" means the ability to send a text
- 133 message to reach 911 emergency call takers from a mobile phone or
- 134 device.
- 135 **SECTION 3.** Section 19-5-311, Mississippi Code of 1972,
- 136 is amended as follows:
- 137 19-5-311. The emergency telephone system shall, when so
- 138 authorized by a vote of a majority of the qualified electors of
- 139 the county voting on the proposal in an election held for that
- 140 purpose, be designed to have the capability of utilizing at least
- 141 one (1) of the following three (3) methods in response to
- 142 emergency calls:
- 143 (a) "District dispatch method," which is a telephone
- 144 service to a centralized dispatch center providing for the

145	dispatch of an appropriate emergency service unit upon receipt of
146	a telephone request for such services and a decision as to the
147	proper action to be taken, including an E911 system.

- 148 (b) "Relay method," which is a telephone service
 149 whereby pertinent information is noted by the recipient of a
 150 telephone request for emergency services and is relayed to
 151 appropriate public safety agencies or other providers of emergency
 152 services for dispatch of an emergency service unit.
- 153 (c) "Transfer method," which is a telephone service
 154 which receives telephone requests for emergency services and
 155 directly transfers such requests to an appropriate public safety
 156 agency or other provider of emergency services.
- In addition to the required implementation of the text-to-911

 services as set out in Section 1 of this act, the board of

 commissioners shall select the method which it determines to be

 the most feasible for the county.
- SECTION 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
