A circuit judge shall be elected for and from each circuit court district and the listing of individual precincts 27 28 shall be those precincts as they existed on October 1, 1990. He H. B. - 30 thereof, when in their opinion the public interest may require.
- 31 The terms of all circuit judges hereafter elected shall begin on

- 34 of the district in which he or she serves but shall not be
- 35 required to be a resident of a subdistrict if the district is
- 36 divided into subdistricts.
