HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 105

A RESOLUTION COMMENDING THE LIFE, LEGACY AND CONTRIBUTIONS OF 1 2 MRS. CHERYL "CHERI" MERRITT BARRY EXPRESSING SINCEREST SYMPATHY 3 UPON HER PASSING. 4 WHEREAS, Mrs. Cheryl "Cheri" Merritt Barry, the loving and vibrant jewel of the Barry Family as well as a political pioneer, 5 as she was the City of Meridian's first and only female mayor, 6 7 departed this earthly life, at the age of 68, on Christmas Eve, December 24, 2023, to be in the presence of the Lord, surrounded 8 9 in love by her family and friends; and 10 WHEREAS, Mrs. Barry, who was affectionally referred to as 11 "YaYa" by many - which is a doting name that was given to her by 12 her grandchildren - was born on April 19, 1955, to her parents, George and Jean Merritt, and was reared in love, along with her 13 14 older brother, Greg, and younger sister, Jeanna; and 15 WHEREAS, knowing the importance of earning an education, Mrs. 16 Barry graduated from Lamar High School, where she was an outstanding member of the softball team, where her innate nature 17

of teamwork later used in her life during her service to others, shone through as she was known for her fierce pitching skills; and WHEREAS, after high school, Mrs. Barry began her college career at Converse College in Spartanburg, South Carolina, before attending the University of Mississippi, where she met the love of her life, Rick, whom she would go on to unite in holy matrimony on August 6, 1977; and

25 WHEREAS, aptly described as one who never met a stranger, 26 Mrs. Barry, who had always immersed herself in helping the 27 Meridian community, even as a youth, also had a huge place in her 28 heart for those with special needs, and she made it one of her 29 missions to always make them feel included, which is a wonderful 30 testament of her kind and beautiful soul; and

31 WHEREAS, Mrs. Barry's professional career was mainly in 32 public service, where she worked with the Lafayette and Lauderdale 33 County welfare systems and focused on children and geriatric abuse 34 victims; and

35 WHEREAS, blessed with a "get it done" attitude, when it came 36 to serving others, Mrs. Barry selflessly served with her local Red 37 Cross chapter and helped during Hurricane Katrina by facilitating 38 restoration of the counties served by the American Red Cross Key 39 Chapter, and she served as the Executive Director of Key Chapter 40 during the 9/11 tragedy; and

41 WHEREAS, Mrs. Barry later served as the Executive Director of 42 the Rush Foundation and helped raise money to distribute to the

WHEREAS, after making significant contributions with the Red Cross and the Rush Foundation, Mrs. Barry made the ultimate contribution by serving as the mayor of the City of Meridian from 2009 through 2013, where she led the charge in making several improvements in the Queen City; and

53 WHEREAS, Mrs. Barry, while serving as mayor, made various accomplishments during her administration, some of which are as 54 55 follows: completion of the renovations of the city hall; 56 improvements of the 22nd Avenue overpass; constructed two city 57 fire stations; relocated the police department and the city 58 partnered with the Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians in which 59 they had several collaborations, one of which is the current city 60 hall lawn Christmas tree; and

61 WHEREAS, due to her outstanding community service, Mrs. Barry 62 received various awards such an being named Junior Auxiliary 63 Humanitarian of the Year and *The Meridian Star*'s Woman of the 64 Year, and although she loved serving her community, one of her 65 greatest joys was spending time with her wonderful and adoring 66 family; and
