SENATE BILL NO. 2218

1 AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE MISSISSIPPI-IRELAND TRADE COMMISSION; 2 TO STATE FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE; TO PROVIDE FOR APPOINTMENTS 3 TO THE COMMISSION AND THE LENGTH OF THEIR TERMS; TO SPECIFY HOW THE COMMISSION IS TO CONDUCT ITS BUSINESS; TO SET OUT THE PURPOSES 5 OF THE COMMISSION; TO AUTHORIZE THE COMMISSION TO RAISE FUNDS, 6 THROUGH DIRECT SOLICITATION OR OTHER FUNDRAISING EVENTS, ALONE OR 7 WITH OTHER GROUPS, AND TO ACCEPT GIFTS, GRANTS, AND BEQUESTS FROM INDIVIDUALS, CORPORATIONS, FOUNDATIONS, GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES, AND 8 9 PUBLIC AND PRIVATE ORGANIZATIONS AND INSTITUTIONS TO CARRY OUT ITS 10 PURPOSES; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

- BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 11
- 12 **SECTION 1.** The Legislature finds that:
- 13 (a) Over seven percent (7%) of Mississippi's 2022
- population is of Irish descent, making it the third largest 14
- 15 ancestry in the Magnolia State, with more than two hundred ten
- thousand (210,000) citizens claiming heritage from the Emerald 16
- 17 Isle. Irish settlers came to Mississippi in several waves of
- immigration, and their legacy includes business and industry, 18
- political, religious, and civic activity. Former Mississippi 19
- 20 Governor Gerard Brandon was the grandson of Irish immigrants; and
- 21 Beyond historical ties, the Irish have long been
- important to Mississippi's economy. Based on federal data, 22

- 23 Ireland is Mississippi's twelfth largest foreign trade partner,
- 24 representing industries such as agriculture, aerospace, and
- 25 pharmaceuticals. With a stable political environment and growing
- 26 economy, Ireland is poised to advance bilateral trade and
- 27 investment through direct relationships with Mississippi
- 28 businesses, elected leaders, educational institutions, and
- 29 markets.
- 30 **SECTION 2.** (1) For purposes of this section, "commission"
- 31 means the Mississippi-Ireland Trade Commission.
- 32 (2) (a) There is hereby established the Mississippi-Ireland
- 33 Trade Commission, which shall consist of ten (10) members, to be
- 34 appointed as follows:
- 35 (i) The Governor shall appoint three (3) members,
- 36 one (1) for an initial term of one (1) year, and one (1) for an
- 37 initial term of two (2) years;
- 38 (ii) The Lieutenant Governor shall appoint two (2)
- 39 members of the Senate, one (1) for an initial term of three (3)
- 40 years and one (1) for an initial term of four (4) years;
- 41 (iii) The Speaker of the House shall appoint two
- 42 (2) members of the House of Representatives, one (1) for an
- 43 initial term of three (3) years and one (1) for an initial term of
- 44 four (4) years;

- 45 (iv) The President of the Mississippi Economic
- 46 Council shall appoint one (1) member for an initial term of (1)

- 49 Development Authority, or his or her designee, shall serve as an
- 50 ex officio member; and
- 51 (vi) The Commissioner of the Institutions of
- 52 Higher Learning, or his or her designee, shall serve as an ex
- 53 officio, nonvoting member.
- 54 (b) All appointees of the Governor, Lieutenant
- 55 Governor, Speaker of the House, and President of the Mississippi
- 56 Economic Council shall have either current or past involvement in
- 57 organizations that promote Irish affairs, or an interest in the
- 58 well-being of trade relations between Mississippi and Ireland.
- (c) All initial appointments shall be made no later
- 60 than July 1, 2024. After the expiration of the initial term, all
- 61 terms shall be for a period of four (4) years. A vacancy in the
- 62 membership of the commission shall be filled in the same manner as
- 63 the original appointment was made. A vacancy occurring during an
- 64 unexpired term shall be filled for the remainder of the term.
- 65 (3) Appointed members shall serve without compensation at
- 66 the will and pleasure of the appointing authority. The commission
- 67 shall elect a chairman and such other officers as it considers
- 68 necessary from among its members. A majority of the members of
- 69 the commission shall constitute a quorum for the conduct of
- 70 meetings, and all actions of the commission shall be by a majority
- 71 vote. The commission shall meet, subject to call by the chairman,
- 72 at least quarterly.

- 74 (a) Advance bilateral trade and investment between
- 75 Mississippi and Ireland;
- 76 (b) Initiate joint action on policy issues of mutual
- 77 interest to Mississippi and Ireland;
- 78 (c) Promote business and academic exchanges between
- 79 Mississippi and Ireland;
- 80 (d) Encourage mutual economic support between
- 81 Mississippi and Ireland;
- 82 (e) Encourage mutual investment in the infrastructure
- 83 of Mississippi and Ireland; and
- 84 (f) Address such other issues as determined by the
- 85 commission.
- 86 (5) The Mississippi-Ireland Trade Commission shall be
- 87 authorized to raise funds, through direct solicitation or other
- 88 fundraising events, alone or with other groups, and to accept
- 89 gifts, grants, and bequests from individuals, corporations,
- 90 foundations, governmental agencies, and public and private
- 91 organizations and institutions to carry out its purposes.
- 92 **SECTION 3.** This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 93 and after March 17, 2024.
