## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 507

- A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION COMMENDING OMEGA PSI PHI FRATERNITY, INC., FOR ITS OUTSTANDING COMMUNITY SERVICE AND PHILANTHROPY AND DESIGNATING MARCH 9, 2024, AS "OMEGA PSI PHI DAY" IN MISSISSIPPI.
- WHEREAS, Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., was the first
- 5 international fraternal organization founded on the campus of a
- 6 historically black college, Howard University in Washington, D.C.,
- 7 on November 17, 1911, by three Howard University juniors, Edgar
- 8 Amos Love, Oscar James Cooper and Frank Coleman, and their faculty
- 9 advisor, Dr. Ernest Everett Just, and it seeks to occupy a
- 10 progressive, cooperative and constructive place in the civic and
- 11 political life in communities across the nation and throughout the
- 12 world; and
- 13 WHEREAS, the founders were highly educated and went on to
- 14 have distinguished careers in their chosen fields: Dr. Ernest E.
- 15 Just became a world-renowned biologist, was the first recipient of
- 16 the prestigious Spingarn Medal from the National Association for
- 17 the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) in 1915 and was the 19th
- 18 honoree in the U.S. Postal Service's Black Heritage Stamp Series

- 19 on February 1, 1996; Professor Frank Coleman became a professor
- 20 and head of the Physics Department at Howard University and a
- 21 United States Army Officer in World War I; Dr. Oscar J. Cooper
- 22 earned a doctorate of medicine degree from Howard University in
- 23 1917 and practiced medicine for over 50 years in Philadelphia,
- 24 Pennsylvania; and Bishop Edgar A. Love became a United States Army
- Chaplain in World War I and a bishop in the Methodist Church for 25
- 26 many years; and
- 27 WHEREAS, since its founding in 1911, Omega Psi Phi's mission
- has been to build a strong and effective force of men dedicated to 28
- 29 its Cardinal Principles of Manhood, Scholarship, Perseverance and
- 30 Uplift. From the initials of the Greek phrase "friendship is
- 31 essential to the soul," the name Omega Psi Phi was derived, and
- 32 the phrase was selected as the fraternity's motto. Over 700
- 33 chapters of this distinguished fraternity have been established in
- 34 the United States and around the world since its inception, and in
- 35 the great State of Mississippi, Omega Psi Phi operates 21 graduate
- 36 chapters and nine undergraduate chapters; and
- 37 WHEREAS, the Omegas are involved in their communities and
- 38 organize many philanthropic programs, such as the annual
- 39 Achievement Week Program; Scholarship Program; Voter Registration
- 40 Program; Education and Mobilization Program; Talent Hunt Program;
- 41 National High School Essay Contest; Assault on Illiteracy Program;
- 42 Annual Charles Drew Blood Drive; College Endowment Fund Program;
- Domestic Abuse Awareness Program; Fatherhood Initiative Program 43

- 44 and the National Social Action Program, which aims to meet the
- 45 needs of health, housing, civil rights and education for African
- 46 Americans; and
- WHEREAS, Chris Barnett serves as the current State
- 48 Representative of the fraternity in Mississippi, and numerous
- 49 Omega chapters in Mississippi have volunteered over 3,000 hours
- 50 and donated thousands of dollars to multiple projects with the
- 51 purpose of uplifting and encouraging citizens of their communities
- 52 to achieve higher social, economic and intellectual statuses; and
- 53 WHEREAS, since 1911, the outstanding men of Omega Psi Phi
- 54 have played a vital role in our nation's illustrious history, and
- 55 there are numerous remarkable and distinguished Omega men who are
- 56 recognized as leaders in the arts, sciences, academics, athletics,
- 57 business, civil rights, education and government at the local,
- 58 national and international level; and
- 59 WHEREAS, in the mid-1930s, the following group of exceptional
- 60 Omega members: Robert C. Weaver, Lawrence Oxley, Roscoe Brown,
- 61 Frank Horne, William Hastie, J. Arthur Weiseger, Ted Poston,
- 62 Campbell C. Johnson and William Trent were appointed to the
- 63 Federal Council of Negro Affairs or "Black Cabinet," which was an
- 64 informal group created by President Franklin D. Roosevelt that was
- 65 comprised of African-American public policy advisors whose mission
- 66 was to help the country emerge out of the Depression; and
- 67 WHEREAS, other fascinating Omega men in our nation's history
- 68 include Charles Drew, who perfected the use of blood plasma as a

- 69 life-saving tool. Spottswood Robinson, Oliver Hill and James
- 70 Nabrit were an integral part of the inner circle for the NAACP
- 71 Legal Defense and Educational Fund and coordinated the court
- 72 battles for racial equality. Their work culminated in the
- 73 landmark decision outlawing segregation in public schools in Brown
- 74 v. Board of Education. Wiley A. Branton served as the principal
- 75 lawyer in the civil rights case that desegregated the public
- 76 schools in Little Rock, Arkansas, in 1957; and Bayard Rustin, an
- 77 outstanding activist and one of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s,
- 78 advisors, helped organize the March on Washington, D.C., for Jobs
- 79 and Freedom that occurred on August 28, 1963, where Dr. Martin
- 80 Luther King, Jr., delivered his legendary "I Have a Dream" speech;
- 81 and
- 82 WHEREAS, numerous Omega men have been involved in various
- 83 influential and note-worthy professions, including Dr. Robert C.
- 84 Weaver, the first African-American person appointed to a
- 85 cabinet-level position in the United States as the first Secretary
- 86 of Housing and Urban Development in 1966. H. Carl Moultrie was
- 87 appointed as a judge to the Superior Court of Washington, D.C.
- 88 Clifford Alexander was appointed Secretary of the Army in 1976.
- 89 Ronald McNair tragically perished during the launch of the Space
- 90 Shuttle Challenger on January 28, 1986. Reverend Jesse Jackson,
- 91 Jr., has become a revered advocate and as a candidate for the
- 92 Democratic Party presidential nomination in 1986. L. Douglas
- 93 Wilder became the first African-American governor elected in the

- 94 history of the United States as Virginia's 66th governor on
- 95 January 13, 1990, and David Satcher was appointed the 16th Surgeon
- 96 General of the United States in 1998; and
- 97 WHEREAS, with its long list of exceptional members who have
- 98 made tremendous contributions to the betterment of society through
- 99 their extensive and outstanding service to medical, political,
- 100 scientific, and community for more than 100 years, Omega Psi Phi
- 101 Fraternity, Inc., has become a pinnacle of hope within the State
- 102 of Mississippi and across the globe; and
- 103 WHEREAS, it is with great pride that we recognize and commend
- 104 this outstanding organization which has brought honor to its
- 105 communities and the State of Mississippi through remarkable years
- 106 of service:
- 107 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
- 108 MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That
- 109 we do hereby commend the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., for their
- 110 outstanding community service and philanthropy and designate March
- 111 9, 2024, as "Omega Psi Phi Day" in Mississippi.
