## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 542

1	A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION EXTENDING THE SINCEREST CONDOLENCES
2	OF THE LEGISLATURE ON THE PASSING OF RESPECTED HISTORIC
3	PRESERVATIONIST ELBERT RILEY HILLIARD, DIRECTOR EMERITUS OF THE
4	MISSISSIPPI DEPARTMENT OF ARCHIVES AND HISTORY, AND HONORING HIS
5	PUBLIC SERVICE.
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6	WHEREAS, we join historic preservationists and students of

- 7 Mississippi History in mourning the passing of Elbert Riley
- 8 Hilliard, Director Emeritus of the Mississippi Department of
- 9 Archives and History (MDAH), on March 17, 2024; and
- 10 WHEREAS, Director Hilliard was an educator, historical
- 11 administrator, historic preservationist and dedicated public
- 12 servant who spent 39 years with the Mississippi Department of
- Archives and History, and at the time of his retirement on 13
- 14 December 31, 2004, was the longest serving State Historic
- 15 Preservation Officer in the nation; and
- WHEREAS, born February 8, 1937, at his Riley grandparents' 16
- 17 home in Lambert, Mississippi, Elbert attended school at Anguilla,
- where he met his future wife, then Claire Nicols. They were 18
- 19 married in the Anguilla Methodist Church on August 3, 1958. In

- 20 1958, Elbert graduated from Delta State College with a Bachelor's
- 21 degree in Social Studies and Physical Education. Prior to
- 22 Elbert's receiving his M.A. degree in History in August 1959, he
- 23 and Claire accepted teaching positions in the Natchez-Adams County
- 24 School System. In June 1960, Claire and Elbert moved to Madison
- 25 to join the Madison County School System. Claire taught first
- 26 grade, and Elbert taught history courses and coached boys and
- 27 girls basketball, baseball, and girls track. Here, he earned the
- 28 esteem of his students and acquired his second lifetime nickname,
- 29 "Coach Hilliard"; and
- 30 WHEREAS, Elbert joined MDAH as the Curator of History and
- 31 Administrator of the Old Capitol Museum in July 1965, serving
- 32 under the tutelage of the renowned Charlotte Capers, MDAH's
- 33 beloved and highly respected third director. Elbert became the
- 34 first Director of the Division of Historic Sites and Archaeology
- 35 (now Historic Preservation) in 1970, and in that position
- 36 initiated and led the MDAH's participation in the National
- 37 Historic Preservation Program that was established by the U.S.
- 38 Congress enactment of the National Historic Preservation Act in
- 39 1966. He also oversaw the implementation of the State Antiquities
- 40 Law that has resulted in the preservation of innumerable
- 41 Mississippi Landmark properties and a recognition by citizens and
- 42 elected officials of the importance and economic impact of
- 43 historic preservation. Preservationists throughout the nation

- 44 have frequently noted that Mississippi's Antiquities Act is the
- 45 envy of other state historic preservation offices; and
- 46 WHEREAS, Director Hilliard became Director of MDAH in July
- 47 1973 and served in that capacity until his own retirement on
- 48 December 31, 2004. As MDAH Director, Elbert also served as
- 49 Mississippi's first State Historical Records Coordinator, as
- 50 Secretary-Treasurer of the Mississippi Historical Society (a
- 51 volunteer position that he continued to hold until March 2018),
- 52 and as a member of the Board of Editors of the Heritage of
- 53 Mississippi Series since its inception. He had the privilege of
- 54 working under the leadership and guidance of the Board of Trustees
- 55 President, William F. Winter, and the other members of the MDAH's
- 56 Nonpolitical Board. Elbert frequently mentioned how fortunate he
- 57 was in having the support of both the board and the talented and
- 58 dedicated staff members who were committed to the MDAH's mission
- 59 and public service; and
- 60 WHEREAS, during his tenure with MDAH, Elbert witnessed its
- 61 growth from small quarters in the north wing of the War Memorial
- 62 Building in 1965 to what is now the Charlotte Capers Building in
- 63 1971, and then to the new state-of-the-art William F. Winter
- 64 Building in 2003. He frequently noted that, due to the support of
- 65 the Mississippi Legislature and visionary citizens across the
- 66 state, MDAH has evolved into a comprehensive historical agency
- 67 that is responsible for duties and programs, which are
- 68 administered by two or more separate agencies in most states; and

69	WHEREAS, since its establishment in 1902, MDAH has only had
70	seven directors, and Elbert considered himself fortunate in having
71	known all of them except for the MDAH's first Director, Dunbar
72	Rowland. Katie Blount, current MDAH Director, noted Elbert's
73	unique impact when she said, "Elbert Hilliard led MDAH for 39
74	years during which MDAH grew into a multifaceted historical agency
75	with a national reputation for excellence. His work had a
76	profound impact on the effort to preserve, interpret, and promote
77	Mississippi history. He led with humility, compassion, and
78	wisdom, and those of us who served under him loved and admired him
79	for those qualities as well as his enormous impact on this agency
80	and the state"; and
81	WHEREAS, on the occasion of Elbert's retirement, the MDAH
82	Board of Trustees granted him Director Emeritus status, effective
83	January 1, 2005, and adopted a resolution honoring him for his
84	service "with honor, dedication, and great distinction for the
85	past 31 years." Citing a few of his countless contributions, the
86	board noted the growth of a multifaceted historical agency with a
87	national reputation for excellence; his overseeing 17 historic
88	properties, six of which are National Historic Landmarks; his
89	invaluable work with the Mississippi Legislature to strengthen and
90	clarify Mississippi's laws governing historic preservation, state
91	and local government records, and archival and library security.
92	Former Governor and Board President, William F. Winter said at
93	Filhert's retirement "Filhert has helped make the department one of

94	the	most	stable	in	state	government,	one	that	doesn't	change	with

- 95 each administration"; and
- 96 WHEREAS, Governor Haley Barbour, presiding over Elbert's
- 97 retirement reception in the rotunda of the Old Capitol Museum,
- 98 proclaimed January 27, 2005, as "Elbert Hilliard Day." The
- 99 Mississippi House of Representatives and the Mississippi Senate
- 100 adopted concurrent resolutions "commending the legacy of public
- 101 service of Elbert R. Hilliard and congratulating him on the
- 102 occasion of his retirement after 39 remarkable years with the
- 103 Mississippi Department of Archives and History"; and
- 104 WHEREAS, in 2010, Governor Barbour presented Elbert the
- 105 Mississippi Medal of Service. At its annual meeting in 2017, the
- 106 Mississippi Historical Society presented its Lifetime Achievement
- 107 Award to Elbert for "his effective running of the day-to-day
- 108 business of the organization from 1973 to 2017." During his
- 109 service as MDAH Director, Elbert actively supported the
- 110 Mississippi Heritage Trust as well as the Mississippi Main Street
- 111 Association and encouraged mayors and local officials throughout
- 112 the state to request MDAH's assistance in identifying and
- 113 preserving the important cultural resources in their respective
- 114 communities; and
- 115 WHEREAS, through the years, Elbert remembered the influence
- 116 that Delta State had on his life. In May 2005, he received the
- 117 first Honorary Doctorate to be awarded by Delta State University

118	and	in	2007,	Elbert	was	named	to	the	university's	Alumni	Hall	of

119 Fame; and

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120 WHEREAS, a lifelong Methodist, Elbert was a longtime faithful 121 member of the Madison United Methodist Church, teaching youth and 122 adult Sunday School classes, serving for many years on the 123 church's Administrative Council, the Building Committee for the 124 new sanctuary, the Stained-Glass Window Committee, and as the 125 Church Historian. In 2009, he received the Mississippi 126 Conference's Tobias Gibson Award for his significant contributions 127 to the preservation of Methodist history. From 2005 to 2015, he served as Chair of the Pearl River Church Historic Council that 128 129 coordinates the Annual Lambuth Day Ceremony and oversees the preservation of the historic Pearl River Church that has been 130 131 designated a World Heritage Landmark by the United Methodist 132 General Conference Commission on Archives and History; and 133

WHEREAS, we pay tribute and cherish fondly the memory of this most public-spirited citizen of the State of Mississippi whose enormous civic energy is a wonderful example for public servants and who leaves a legacy of leadership and dedication to the state he loved:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That
we do hereby extend the sincerest condolences of the Legislature
on the passing of respected historic preservationist Elbert Riley
Hilliard, Director Emeritus of the Mississippi Department of

144	for a lifetime of selfless service, a grateful state thanks him.
