Adopted COMMITTEE AMENDMENT NO 1 PROPOSED TO

Amend by striking all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

SECTION 1. The following sum, or so much thereof as may be 4 5 necessary, is appropriated out of any money in the State General Fund not otherwise appropriated, to the Department of Human 6 7 Services for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2024, and ending June 30, 2025.....\$ 75,956,688.00. 8 9 SECTION 2. The following sum, or so much thereof as may be 10 necessary, is appropriated out of any money in any special fund in 11 the State Treasury to the credit of the Department of Human 12 Services which is comprised of special source funds collected by 13 or otherwise available to the department for the support of the

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14 various divisions of the department, for the purpose of defraying 15 the expenses of the department for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2024, and ending June 30, 2025.....\$ 1,738,701,848.00. 16 17 SECTION 3. None of the funds appropriated by this act shall 18 be expended for any purpose that is not actually required or 19 necessary for performing any of the powers or duties of the 20 Department of Human Services that are authorized by the Mississippi Constitution of 1890, state or federal law, or rules 21 22 or regulations that implement state or federal law.

23 **SECTION 4.** With the funds appropriated in this act, the 24 following positions are authorized:

25 AUTHORIZED HEADCOUNT:

28 With the funds herein appropriated, it shall be the agency's 29 responsibility to make certain that funds required for Personal 30 Services for Fiscal Year 2026 do not exceed Fiscal Year 2025 funds appropriated for that purpose unless programs or positions are 31 32 added to the agency's Fiscal Year 2025 budget by the Mississippi 33 Legislature. The Legislature shall determine the agency's personal 34 services appropriation, which the State Personnel Board shall 35 publish. In accordance with applicable laws, if an agency determines that its personal services amount is insufficient, the 36 37 agency must contact the State Personnel Board. Any adjustment to 38 the personal services amount must be approved by the State

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39 Personnel Director and the State Fiscal Officer after consultation 40 with the Legislative Budget Office. Any adjustment shall be reported to the Legislative Budget Office and the House and Senate 41 42 Appropriations Chairmen. The agency's personal services 43 appropriation may consist of restricted funds for approved 44 vacancies for Fiscal Year 2025 that may not be utilized for active Fiscal Year 2024 headcount. It shall be the agency's 45 46 responsibility to ensure that the funds provided for vacancies are 47 used to increase headcount and not for promotions, title changes, 48 in-range salary adjustments, or any other mechanism for increasing 49 salaries for current employees. If the State Personnel Board 50 determines that an agency has used provided vacancy funds for any 51 of the mechanisms previously listed, the State Personnel Board 52 shall not process any additional salary actions for the agency in 53 the current fiscal year, except for new hires determined by the 54 State Personnel Board to be essential for the agency. It is the 55 Legislature's intention that no employee salary falls below the 56 minimum salary established by the Mississippi State Personnel 57 Board.

Additionally, the State Personnel Board shall determine and publish the projected annualized payroll costs based on current employees. It shall be the responsibility of the agency head to ensure that actual personnel expenditures for Fiscal Year 2025 do not exceed the data provided by the Legislative Budget Office. If the agency's projected cost for Fiscal Year 2025 exceeds the

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annualized costs, no salary actions shall be processed by the
State Personnel Board except for new hires determined to be
essential for the agency.

Any transfers or escalations shall be made in accordance with 67 68 the terms, conditions, and procedures established by law or 69 allowable under the terms set forth within this act. The State 70 Personnel Board shall not escalate positions without written 71 approval from the Department of Finance and Administration. The 72 Department of Finance and Administration shall not provide written 73 approval to escalate any funds for salaries and/or positions 74 without proof of availability of new or additional funds above the 75 appropriated level.

No general funds authorized to be expended herein shall be used to replace federal funds and/or other special funds used for salaries authorized under the provisions of this act and which are withdrawn and no longer available.

None of the funds herein appropriated shall be used in violation of the Internal Revenue Service's Publication 15-A relating to the reporting of income paid to contract employees, as interpreted by the Office of the State Auditor.

84 SECTION 5. It is the intention of the Legislature that the 85 Department of Human Services shall maintain complete accounting 86 and personnel records related to the expenditure of all funds 87 appropriated under this act and that such records shall be in the 88 same format and level of detail as maintained for Fiscal Year

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89 2024. It is further the intention of the Legislature that the 90 agency's budget request for Fiscal Year 2026 shall be submitted to 91 the Joint Legislative Budget Committee in a format and level of 92 detail comparable to the format and level of detail provided 93 during the Fiscal Year 2025 budget request process.

94 SECTION 6. Of the funds appropriated in Section 2 herein to the Department of Human Services, One Million Dollars 95 96 (\$1,000,000.00) shall be transferred to the Department of Health, 97 Child Care Licensure Program from the Child Care Development Fund or other appropriate special fund. These funds are to be 98 99 transferred to the Board of Health no later than July 31, 2024. 100 The Department of Health shall make a complete accounting to the 101 Department of Human Services detailing the uses of these funds in 102 accordance with federal and state regulations.

103 SECTION 7. It is the intention of the Legislature that 104 whenever two (2) or more bids are received by this agency for the 105 purchase of commodities or equipment, and whenever all things 106 stated in such received bids are equal with respect to price, 107 quality and service, the Mississippi Industries for the Blind 108 shall be given preference. A similar preference shall be given to 109 the Mississippi Industries for the Blind whenever purchases are 110 made without competitive bids.

111 SECTION 8. The Department of Human Services is authorized to 112 expend available funds on technology or equipment upgrades or 113 replacements when it will generate savings through efficiency or

114 when the savings generated from such upgrades or replacements 115 exceed expenditures thereof.

116 SECTION 9. It is the intention of the Legislature that none 117 of the funds provided herein shall be used to pay certain 118 utilities for state furnished housing for any employees. Such 119 utilities shall include electricity, natural gas, butane, propane, 120 cable and phone services. Where actual cost cannot be determined, 121 the agency shall be required to provide meters to be in compliance 122 with legislative intent. Such state furnished housing shall include single-family and multi-family residences but shall not 123 124 include any dormitory residences. Allowances for such utilities 125 shall be prohibited.

SECTION 10. In compliance with the "Mississippi Performance Budget and Strategic Planning Act of 1994," it is the intent of the Legislature that the funds provided herein shall be utilized in the most efficient and effective manner possible to achieve the intended mission of this agency. Based on the funding authorized, this agency shall make every effort to attain the targeted performance measures provided below:

A reporting of the degree to which the performance targets set above have been or are being achieved shall be provided in the agency's budget request submitted to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee for Fiscal Year 2026.

231 SECTION 11. It is the intent of the Legislature that the 232 Department of Human Services, Division of Child Support 233 Enforcement, make a concentrated effort to increase collections of 234 past due child support payments. On or before January 1, 2025, 235 the Executive Director of the Department of Human Services shall 236 submit a report to the Legislative Budget Office detailing 237 year-to-date performance measures in the Child Support Enforcement 238 Program compared with the prior year.

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239 SECTION 12. It is the intention of the Legislature that the 240 Department of Human Services shall have the authority to spend 241 such additional funds as it shall receive from the federal 242 government in incentives or the federal match on those incentives 243 for the purpose of child support enforcement.

SECTION 13. Of the funds appropriated in Section 1, Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00) shall be transferred to the Juvenile Facility Monitoring Unit at the Department of Public Safety no later than July 31, 2024.

SECTION 14. Of the funds appropriated herein, to the Department of Human Services One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00), is provided for the support of the Home Delivered Meals Program and any additional funds that may be appropriated to this program. SECTION 15. Of the funds provided in Section 1, herein to

253 the Department of Human Services, an amount not to exceed One 254 Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) is provided to fund the 255 Senior Olympics Program.

SECTION 16. It is the intention of the Legislature that the Governor's Office, Division of Medicaid and the Department of Human Services shall continue to work together to implement Section 43-12-1, Mississippi Code of 1972, known as the "Medicaid and Human Services Transparency and Fraud Prevention Act".

261 SECTION 17. As a condition of receiving and expending any 262 funds appropriated under this act, the Department of Human 263 Services:

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(a) Shall use a competitive procurement process for entering into all TANF subgrant agreements with non-state entities when the federal government does not direct to whom the funds must be subgranted;

(b) Upon awarding of a grant to any subgrantee of the department, shall require the subgrantee to submit a monthly report to the department that contains, but is not limited to, all of the following:

(i) A listing of all costs incurred by the subgranteeduring the previous month;

(ii) A listing of all clients served by the subgrantee, with an explanation of which services were provided to the clients;

(iii) A listing of all lower-tier subgrantees, who must be approved by the department before the execution of any such agreement by the prime subgrantee; and

280 (iv) Any other data required by the department to 281 provide sufficient evidence of budgetary compliance;

(c) Shall not advance funds to a subgrantee for more thansixty (60) days; and

(d) Shall reimburse a subgrantee for expenses only after the required documentation is provided and is approved by the department.

287 **SECTION 18.** It is the intent of the Legislature, that within 288 the funds available, the Department of Human Services may provide

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any qualifying grants of CARES Act or American Rescue Act funding in an amount not to exceed One Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) to the three (3) regional food banks that serve Mississippi, including Feed the Gulf Coast, Mid-South Food Bank, and Mississippi Food Network.

294 SECTION 19. The following sum, or so much thereof as may be 295 necessary, is reappropriated out of any money in the Capital 296 Expense Fund not otherwise appropriated for the Department of 297 Human Services for the purpose of reauthorizing the expenditure of 298 Capital Expense Funds, as authorized in HB 1622, 2023 Regular 299 Session to defray expenses of the Department of Human Services for 300 the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2024, and ending June 30, 2025.....\$ 58,327,806.00. 301 302 This appropriation is made for the purpose of reauthorizing 303 the expenditure of funds as allocated herein: 304 (a) To defray the Department's computer 305 expenses.....\$ 4,327,806.00. 306 To secure federal funding for a new (b) 307 computer system.....\$ 54,000,000.00. 308 Notwithstanding the amount reappropriated under this section, 309 the amount that may be expended under the authority of this 310 section, shall not exceed the unexpended balance of the funds 311 remaining as of June 30, 2024, from the amount authorized for the 312 previous fiscal year. In addition, this reappropriation shall not change the purpose for which the funds were originally authorized. 313

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314 SECTION 20. Of the funds appropriated herein, no more than 315 Three Thousand Six Hundred Fifty-two Dollars (\$3,652.00) may be 316 used to pay invoices to certain vendors for expenses incurred in 317 FY 2022.

318 **SECTION 21.** The money herein appropriated shall be paid by 319 the State Treasurer out of any money in the State Treasury to the 320 credit of the proper fund or funds as set forth in this act, upon warrants issued by the State Fiscal Officer; and the State Fiscal 321 322 Officer shall issue his warrants upon requisitions signed by the proper person, officer or officers, in the manner provided by law. 323 324 SECTION 22. This act shall take effect and be in force from 325 and after July 1, 2024, and shall stand repealed June 29, 2024.

1 AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO DEFRAY THE EXPENSES OF THE 2 DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2025.

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
