HOUSE BILL NO. 567

1 AN ACT TO AMEND SECTIONS 37-3-82 AND 37-7-321, MISSISSIPPI 2 CODE OF 1972, TO REQUIRE LOCAL SCHOOL DISTRICTS AND LOCAL LAW 3 ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES THAT EMPLOY INDIVIDUALS TO SERVE AS SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS TO PROVIDE MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID TRAINING THAT 4 5 IS EVIDENCED-BASED AND APPROVED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL 6 HEALTH; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 8 SECTION 1. Section 37-3-82, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows: 9 37-3-82. (1) There is hereby established the Mississippi 10

11 Community Oriented Policing Services in Schools (MCOPS) grant program in the State Department of Education to provide funding, 12 13 pursuant to specific appropriation by the Legislature therefor, to assist law enforcement agencies in providing additional School 14 15 Resource Officers to engage in community policing in and around primary and secondary schools. The MCOPS program shall authorize 16 17 the State Department of Education to make grants to increase 18 deployment of law enforcement officers in order (a) to increase or enhance community policing in this state, (b) that trained, sworn 19

20 enforcement officers assigned to schools play an integral part in

- 21 the development and/or enhancement of a comprehensive school
- 22 safety plan, and (c) that the presence of these officers shall
- 23 provide schools with a direct link to local law enforcement
- 24 agencies.
- 25 (2) The MCOPS program shall meet the following requirements
- 26 and standards:
- 27 (a) This program shall provide an incentive for law
- 28 enforcement agencies to build collaborative partnerships with the
- 29 school community and to use community policing efforts to combat
- 30 school violence and implement educational programs to improve
- 31 student and school safety.
- 32 (b) The additional School Resource Officers must devote
- 33 at least seventy-five percent (75%) of their time to work in and
- 34 around primary and secondary schools, in addition to the time that
- 35 School Resource Officers are devoting in the absence of the MCOPS
- 36 in Schools grant.
- 37 (c) Beginning with the 2019-2020 school year, the MCOPS
- 38 in Schools program shall provide a minimum state contribution of
- 39 up to Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) per officer position over
- 40 the one-year grant period, to be matched from local funds on a
- 41 50/50 matching basis. Officers paid with MCOPS funds may be
- 42 employed by the local law enforcement agency or by the local
- 43 school district. MCOPS funds may be used to pay for entry-level
- 44 salaries and benefits of newly trained additional School Resource
- 45 Officers and may be used to pay the salaries and benefits of

46	School Resource Officers employed prior to July 1, 2013. All
47	jurisdictions that apply must demonstrate that they have primary
48	law enforcement authority over the school(s) identified in their
49	application and demonstrate their inability to implement this
50	project without state assistance. Schools or law enforcement
51	agencies may not reduce its overall federal, state, locally funded
52	level of sworn officers (including other School Resource Officers
53	or other sworn officers assigned to the schools) as a result of
54	applying for or receiving MCOPS in Schools grant funding. MCOPS
55	in Schools funding may be used to rehire sworn officers previously
56	employed who have been laid off for financial reasons unrelated to
57	the availability of the MCOPS in Schools grant, but must obtain
58	prior written approval from the State Department of Education.
59	MCOPS in Schools funding may be used to train school resource
60	officers. In order to be eligible for such program, each local
61	school board desiring to participate shall apply to the State
62	Department of Education by May 31 before the beginning of the
63	applicable fiscal year on forms provided by the department. The
64	State Department of Education shall determine by July 1 of each
65	succeeding year which local school districts have submitted
66	approved applications for School Resource Officer funding.
67	(d) School Resource Officers (SROs) may serve in a
68	variety of roles, including, but not limited to, that of a law
69	enforcement officer/safety specialist, law-related educator, and

problem-solver/community liaison. These officers may teach

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- 71 programs such as crime prevention, substance abuse prevention, and 72 gang resistance as well as monitor and assist troubled students 73 through mentoring programs. The School Resource Officer(s) may 74 also identify physical changes in the environment that may reduce 75 crime in and around the schools, as well as assist in developing 76 school policies which address criminal activity and school safety. 77 The application must also include a Memorandum of Understanding 78 (MOU), signed by the law enforcement executive and the appropriate 79 school official(s), to document the roles and responsibilities to 80 be undertaken by the law enforcement agency and the educational 81 school partner(s) through this collaborative effort. application must also include a Narrative Addendum to document 82 83 that the School Resource Officer(s) will be assigned to work in and around primary or secondary schools and provide supporting 84 85 documentation in the following areas: problem identification and 86 justification, community policing strategies to be used by the 87 officers, quality and level of commitment to the effort, and the
- (e) All agencies receiving awards through the MCOPS in Schools program are required to send the School Resource Officer position(s) funded by this grant, to the Mississippi Law Enforcement Officers' Training Academy where they shall be required to participate in training through the Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training Program at the academy, with the cost to be defrayed from the MCOPS program. 100 MCOPS in Schools grant, will receive additional training

101 information following notification of the grant award. The MCOPS

102 in Schools training requirement must be completed prior to the end

103 of twelve-month grant funding for officer positions.

104 (f) Each school district that employs or enters into a 105 interlocal agreement with a local law enforcement agency for the 106 purpose of providing school resource officers to the schools 107 within the local school district shall be provided Mental Health 108 First Aid training that is evidence-based and approved by the 109 Department of Mental Health to all of those officers as a component of their initial minimum level of law enforcement 110 111 training requirements and any required continuing education or

certification training during the time of continued employment by

the school district or with the local law enforcement agency.

(3) The State Department of Education shall promulgate rules and regulations prescribing procedures for the application,

116 expenditure requirements and the administration of the Mississippi

117 Community Oriented Policing Services in Schools (MCOPS) program

118 established in this section, and shall make a report on the

implementation of the MCOPS program with any recommendations to

120 the 2020 Regular Session of the Legislature.

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121	SECTION 2.	Section	37-7-321,	Mississippi	Code	of	1972,	is
122	amended as follo	ws:						

- 37-7-321. (1) The school board of any school district
 within the State of Mississippi, in its discretion, may employ one
 or more persons as security personnel and may designate such
 persons as peace officers in or on any property operated for
 school purposes by such board upon their taking such oath and
 making such bond as required of a constable of the county in which
 the school district is situated.
- 130 (2) Any person employed by a school board as a security 131 quard or school resource officer or in any other position that has 132 the powers of a peace officer must receive a minimum level of basic law enforcement training, as jointly determined and 133 prescribed by the Board on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and 134 135 Training and the State Board of Education, within two (2) years of 136 the person's initial employment in such position. Upon the 137 failure of any person employed in such position to receive the required training within the designated time, the person may not 138 139 exercise the powers of a peace officer in or on the property of 140 the school district. Additionally, such persons employed in the 141 capacity as a school resource officer shall be provided Mental 142 Health First Aid training by the employing school district or local law enforcement agency, which is evidence-based and approved 143 by the Department of Mental Health, as a component of their 144

initial minimum level of law enforcement training requirements and

- 147 the time of continued employment by the school district or with
- 148 the local law enforcement agency.
- 149 (3) The school board is authorized and empowered, in its
- 150 discretion, and subject to the approval of the Federal
- 151 Communications Commission, to install and operate a noncommercial
- 152 radio broadcasting and transmission station for educational and
- 153 vocational educational purposes.
- 154 (4) If a law enforcement officer is duly appointed to be a
- 155 peace officer by a school district under this section, the local
- 156 school board may enter into an interlocal agreement with other law
- 157 enforcement entities for the provision of equipment or traffic
- 158 control duties, however, the duty to enforce traffic regulations
- 159 and to enforce the laws of the state or municipality off of school
- 160 property lies with the local police or sheriff's department which
- 161 cannot withhold its services solely because of the lack of such an
- 162 agreement.
- 163 **SECTION 3.** This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 164 and after July 1, 2025.
