HOUSE BILL NO. 592

AN ACT TO BE KNOWN AS THE "NO PATIENT LEFT ALONE ACT;" TO PROVIDE THAT THIS ACT APPLIES TO LICENSED HOSPITALS, NURSING FACILITIES, INTERMEDIATE CARE FACILITIES FOR THE INTELLECTUALLY DISABLED, PERSONAL CARE HOMES, ASSISTED LIVING FACILITIES AND 5 HOSPICE FACILITIES; TO REQUIRE EACH PROVIDER TO ESTABLISH VISITATION POLICIES AND PROCEDURES AND SPECIFY THE MINIMUM TOPICS 7 THAT SUCH POLICIES AND PROCEDURES MUST INCLUDE; TO PROVIDE THAT SAFETY-RELATED POLICIES AND PROCEDURES MAY NOT BE MORE STRINGENT 8 9 THAN THOSE ESTABLISHED FOR THE PROVIDER'S STAFF AND MAY NOT 10 REQUIRE VISITORS TO SUBMIT PROOF OF ANY VACCINATION OR 11 IMMUNIZATION; TO PROVIDE THAT THE POLICIES AND PROCEDURES MUST 12 ALLOW CONSENSUAL PHYSICAL CONTACT BETWEEN A RESIDENT, CLIENT, OR PATIENT AND THE VISITOR; TO PROVIDE THAT AN ADULT RESIDENT, CLIENT, OR PATIENT MAY DESIGNATE A VISITOR(S) WHO IS A FAMILY 14 15 MEMBER, FRIEND, GUARDIAN, OR OTHER INDIVIDUAL AS AN ESSENTIAL 16 CAREGIVER(S); TO PROVIDE THAT THE PROVIDER MUST ALLOW IN-PERSON 17 VISITATION BY THE ESSENTIAL CAREGIVER(S) FOR AT LEAST TWO HOURS 18 DAILY IN ADDITION TO ANY OTHER VISITATION AUTHORIZED BY THE 19 PROVIDER; TO SPECIFY THE CIRCUMSTANCES IN WHICH THE VISITATION 20 POLICIES AND PROCEDURES MUST ALLOW IN-PERSON VISITATION; TO 21 AUTHORIZE PROVIDERS TO SUSPEND IN-PERSON VISITATION BY A SPECIFIC 22 VISITOR IF THE VISITOR VIOLATES THE PROVIDER'S POLICIES AND PROCEDURES; TO REQUIRE THE PROVIDERS TO PROVIDE THEIR VISITATION 23 24 POLICIES AND PROCEDURES TO THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH WHEN 25 APPLYING FOR INITIAL LICENSURE, LICENSURE RENEWAL, OR CHANGE OF OWNERSHIP; TO REQUIRE PROVIDERS TO MAKE THE VISITATION POLICIES 26 27 AND PROCEDURES AVAILABLE TO THE DEPARTMENT FOR REVIEW AT ANY TIME, 28 UPON REQUEST; TO REQUIRE THE DEPARTMENT TO DEDICATE A STAND-ALONE 29 PAGE ON ITS WEBSITE TO EXPLAIN THE VISITATION REQUIREMENTS OF THIS 30 ACT AND PROVIDE A LINK TO THE DEPARTMENT'S WEBPAGE TO REPORT 31 COMPLAINTS; TO PROVIDE THAT THE RIGHTS SPECIFIED IN THIS ACT MAY 32 NOT BE TERMINATED, SUSPENDED, OR WAIVED BY THE HOSPITAL, THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, OR ANY GOVERNMENTAL ENTITY, NOTWITHSTANDING 33

- 34 DECLARATIONS OF EMERGENCY DECLARED BY THE GOVERNOR; AND FOR
- 35 RELATED PURPOSES.
- 36 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 37 **SECTION 1.** (1) This section shall be known and may be cited
- 38 as the "No Patient Left Alone Act."
- 39 (2) This section applies to the following providers:
- 40 (a) Hospitals licensed under Section 41-9-1 et seq.;
- 41 (b) Nursing facilities, intermediate care facilities
- 42 for the intellectually disabled, personal care homes and assisted
- 43 living facilities licensed under Section 43-11-1 et seq.; and
- 44 (c) Hospice facilities licensed under Section 41-85-1
- 45 et seq.
- 46 (3) (a) Not later than thirty (30) days after the effective
- 47 date of this act, each provider shall establish visitation
- 48 policies and procedures. The policies and procedures must, at a
- 49 minimum, include infection control and education policies for
- 50 visitors; screening, personal protective equipment, and other
- 51 infection control protocols for visitors; permissible length of
- 52 visits and numbers of visitors, and designation of a person
- 53 responsible for ensuring that staff adhere to the policies and
- 54 procedures. Safety-related policies and procedures may not be
- 55 more stringent than those established for the provider's staff and
- 56 may not require visitors to submit proof of any vaccination or
- 57 immunization. The policies and procedures must allow consensual
- 58 physical contact between a resident, client, or patient and the
- 59 visitor.

- 60 (b) An adult resident, client, or patient may designate
- 61 a visitor(s) who is a family member, friend, guardian, or other
- 62 individual as an essential caregiver(s). An essential
- 63 caregiver(s) may be designated orally by the resident, client, or
- 64 patient, or designated in a written document signed by the
- 65 resident, client, or patient, doctor and witnessed by an adult.
- 66 The provider must allow in-person visitation by the essential
- 67 caregiver(s) for at least two (2) hours daily in addition to any
- 68 other visitation authorized by the provider. This section does
- 69 not require an essential caregiver(s) to provide necessary care to
- 70 a resident, client, or patient of a provider, and providers may
- 71 not require an essential caregiver(s) to provide such care.
- 72 (c) The visitation policies and procedures required by
- 73 this section must allow in-person visitation in all of the
- 74 following circumstances, unless the resident, client, or patient
- 75 objects:
- 76 (i) End-of-life situations;
- 77 (ii) A resident, client, or patient who was living
- 78 with family before being admitted to the provider's care is
- 79 struggling with the change in environment and lack of in-person
- 80 family support;
- 81 (iii) The resident, client, or patient is making
- 82 one or more major medical decisions;

- 86 (v) A resident, client, or patient needs cueing or
- 87 encouragement to eat or drink which was previously provided by a
- 88 family member or caregiver;
- 89 (vi) A resident, client, or patient who used to
- 90 talk and interact with others is seldom speaking;
- 91 (vii) For hospitals, childbirth, including labor
- 92 and delivery;
- 93 (viii) Pediatric patients; and
- 94 (ix) Any other circumstance that the State
- 95 Department of Health or the designated essential caregiver(s) of
- 96 the resident, client, or patient deems appropriate.
- 97 (d) The policies and procedures may require a visitor
- 98 to agree in writing to follow the provider's policies and
- 99 procedures. A provider may suspend in-person visitation by a
- 100 specific visitor if the visitor violates the provider's policies
- 101 and procedures.
- 102 (e) The providers shall provide their visitation
- 103 policies and procedures to the State Department of Health when
- 104 applying for initial licensure, licensure renewal, or change of
- 105 ownership. The provider must make the visitation policies and
- 106 procedures available to the department for review at any time,
- 107 upon request.

108	(f) Within twenty-four (24) hours after establishing
109	the policies and procedures required under this section, providers
110	must make such policies and procedures easily accessible from the
111	homepage of their websites.

- 112 (4) The State Department of Health shall dedicate a 113 stand-alone page on its website to explain the visitation 114 requirements of this section and provide a link to the 115 department's webpage to report complaints.
- 116 (5) The rights specified in this section may not be
 117 terminated, suspended, or waived by the hospital, the State
 118 Department of Health, or any governmental entity, notwithstanding
 119 declarations of emergency declared by the Governor.
- 120 **SECTION 2.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 121 and after July 1, 2025.
