## SENATE BILL NO. 2271 (As Passed the Senate)

AN ACT TO REPEAL SECTION 25-53-171, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, WHICH ESTABLISHES THE MISSISSIPPI WIRELESS COMMUNICATION COMMISSION UNDER THE MISSISSIPPI DEPARTMENT OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY SERVICES; TO CREATE SECTION 33-15-57, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO ESTABLISH THE MISSISSIPPI WIRELESS COMMUNICATION 5 6 COMMISSION UNDER THE MISSISSIPPI EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY; TO AMEND SECTION 33-15-14, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO INCLUDE 7 OVERSEEING THE MISSISSIPPI WIRELESS COMMUNICATION COMMISSION 8 WITHIN THE DUTIES OF THE MISSISSIPPI EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY; 9 TO AMEND SECTION 33-15-307, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO ALLOW 10 MEMA TO OBTAIN A LINE OF CREDIT THROUGH THE STATE TREASURY FROM 11 12 THE WORKING CASH-STABILIZATION FUND OR ANY OTHER SPECIAL SOURCES FUND IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$10,000,000.00 IN ONE FISCAL YEAR 13 TO FUND SHORTFALLS; TO PROVIDE THAT THE LOANS SHALL BE RECEIVED BY THE STATE TREASURER AND PLACED INTO THE DISASTER TRUST FUND 14 15 ACCOUNT; TO REQUIRE THAT LOAN FUNDS SHALL BE EXPENDED FOLLOWING 16 17 THE STATE MATCH REQUIRED BY FEMA FOR OTHER NEEDS ASSISTANCE AWARDS 18 DURING FEDERALLY DECLARED DISASTERS; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 19 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 20 **SECTION 1.** Section 25-53-171, Mississippi Code of 1972, 21 which establishes the Mississippi Wireless Communication 22 Commission under the Mississippi Department of Information Technology Services, is hereby repealed. 23 24 SECTION 2. The following shall be codified as Section 25 33-15-57, Mississippi Code of 1972:

- 26 33-15-57. (1) There is hereby created the Wireless
- 27 Communication Commission, which shall be responsible for promoting
- 28 the efficient use of public resources to ensure that law
- 29 enforcement personnel and essential public health and safety
- 30 personnel have effective communications services available in
- 31 emergency situations, and to ensure the rapid restoration of such
- 32 communications services in the event of disruption caused by
- 33 natural disaster, terrorist attack or other public emergency.
- 34 (2) The Wireless Communication Commission, hereafter
- 35 referred to as the "commission," shall consist of the following:
- 36 (a) The Executive Director of the Department of
- 37 Transportation, or his or her designee;
- 38 (b) The Commissioner of Public Safety, or his or her
- 39 designee;
- 40 (c) The Executive Director of the Department of Public
- 41 Health, or his or her designee;
- 42 (d) The Executive Director of the Department of
- 43 Information Technology Services, or his or her designee;
- 44 (e) The Executive Director of the Mississippi Emergency
- 45 Management Agency, or his or her designee;
- 46 (f) The Executive Director of the Mississippi Office of
- 47 Homeland Security, or his or her designee;
- 48 (q) The President of the Mississippi Sheriffs'
- 49 Association, or his or her designee;

50      (h)  The President of the Mississippi Associat	cion	of
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- 51 Supervisors, or his or her designee;
- 52 (i) The President of the Mississippi Municipal
- 53 Association, or his or her designee;
- 54 (j) The President of the Mississippi Association of
- 55 Fire Chiefs, or his or her designee;
- 56 (k) The President of the Mississippi Association of
- 57 Police Chiefs, or his or her designee;
- 58 (1) The Chief of the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol,
- 59 or his or her designee;
- 60 (m) The Commissioner of the Department of Corrections,
- or his or her designee;
- (n) The Adjutant General of the Mississippi National
- 63 Guard, or his or her designee;
- (o) The Executive Director of the Mississippi
- 65 Department of Environmental Quality, or his or her designee; and
- 66 (p) The Executive Director of Wildlife, Fisheries and
- 67 Parks, or his or her designee.
- All members of the commission shall serve a term of not less
- 69 than four (4) years.
- 70 (3) Within forty-five (45) days from July 1, 2025, the
- 71 Executive Director of the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency
- 72 shall call a meeting of the commission in the City of Jackson,
- 73 Mississippi, and organize by electing a chairman and other
- 74 officers from its membership. The commission shall adopt rules

- 75 which govern the time and place for meetings and governing the
- 76 manner of conducting its business. The commission shall meet at
- 77 least monthly and maintain minutes of such meetings. A quorum
- 78 shall consist of a majority of the membership of the commission.
- 79 (4) The commission, in conjunction with the Mississippi
- 80 Emergency Management Agency, shall have the sole authority to
- 81 promulgate rules and regulations governing the operations of the
- 82 wireless communications system described in paragraph (a) and
- 83 shall be vested with all legal authority necessary and proper to
- 84 perform this function including, but not limited to:
- 85 (a) Purchasing, leasing, acquiring and otherwise
- 86 implementing a statewide wireless communications system to serve
- 87 wireless users in state and local governments and those private
- 88 entities that enter into a partnership with the commission. All
- 89 purchases shall be made in accordance with public purchasing laws
- 90 and, if required, shall be approved by the Mississippi Emergency
- 91 Management Agency. This system shall enable interoperability
- 92 between various wireless communications technologies.
- 93 (b) Ensuring that federal/state communications
- 94 requirements are followed with respect to such wireless
- 95 communications systems.
- 96 (c) Providing system planning with all public safety
- 97 communications systems.
- 98 (d) Assisting with establishment of state and local
- 99 wireless communications.

100	(e) In consultation with the Mississippi Emergency
101	Management Agency, having the authority to permit state and local
102	agencies use of the communications system under the terms and
103	conditions established by the commission.

- 104 Providing technical support to users and bearing (f)105 the overall responsibility for the design, engineering, 106 acquisition and implementation of the statewide communications 107 system and for ensuring the proper operation and maintenance of 108 all equipment common to the system.
- 109 (a) Seeking proposals for services through competitive 110 processes where required by law and selecting service providers 111 under procedures provided for by law.
- 112 Establishing, in conjunction with the Mississippi 113 Emergency Management Agency, policies, procedures and standards 114 which shall be incorporated into a comprehensive management plan 115 for the operation of the statewide communications system.
- 116 Having sign-off approval on all wireless (i) communications systems within the state which are owned or 117 118 operated by any state or local governmental entity, agency or 119 department.
- 120 ( † ) Creating a standard user agreement.
- 121 The commission, in conjunction with the Mississippi 122 Emergency Management Agency, shall exercise its powers and duties 123 pursuant to this section to plan, manage and administer the wireless communications system. The commission may: 124

125	(a) In consultation with the advisory board and the
126	Mississippi Emergency Management Agency, establish policies,
127	procedures and standards to incorporate into a comprehensive
128	management plan for use and operation of the communications
129	system.

- (b) Enter into mutual aid agreements among federal,
  state and local agencies for the use of the communications system.
- 132 (c) Establish the cost of maintenance and operation of
  133 the system and charge subscribers for access and use of the
  134 system.
- 135 (d) Assess charges for use of the system.
- (e) Obtain space through rent or lease of space on any tower under state control. The commission may also rent, lease or sublease ground space as necessary to locate equipment to support antennae on the towers. The costs for use of such space shall be established by the owner/agent for each site when it is determined to be practicable and feasible to make space available.
- (f) Provide space through rent or lease of space on any tower under the commission's control. The commission may also rent, lease or sublease ground space as necessary to locate equipment to support antennae on the towers. The costs for use of such space shall be established by the commission when it is determined to be practicable and feasible to make space available.
- 148 (g) Refuse to lease space on any tower at any site.
- 149 All monies collected by the commission for such rents, leases or

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- 150 subleases shall be deposited directly into a special fund hereby
- 151 created and known as the "Integrated Public Safety Communications
- 152 Fund." This fund shall be administered by the Mississippi
- 153 Emergency Management Agency and may be used by the commission to
- 154 construct, maintain and operate the system.
- 155 (h) Rent, lease or sublease ground space on lands
- 156 acquired by the commission for the construction of privately owned
- 157 or publicly owned towers. The commission, as part of such rental,
- 158 lease or sublease agreement, may require space on such towers for
- 159 antennae as may be necessary for the construction and operation of
- 160 the wireless communications system.
- 161 (i) Enter into and perform use and occupancy agreements
- 162 concerning the system.
- (j) Exercise any power necessary to carry out the
- 164 intent of this law.
- 165 (6) The Department of Transportation, the Department of
- 166 Public Safety and other commission members may provide to the
- 167 commission, on a full-time or part-time basis, personnel and
- 168 technical support necessary and sufficient to effectively and
- 169 efficiently carry out the requirements of this section.
- 170 (7) (a) Expenditures from the Integrated Public Safety
- 171 Communications Fund shall be administered by the Mississippi
- 172 Emergency Management Agency with expenditures approved jointly by
- 173 the commission and the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency.

- 200 (d) The Chairman of the House of Representatives

- 204 (f) The Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways 205 and Means Committee, or his or her designee.
- 206 Members of the advisory board shall receive per diem and
  207 expenses which shall be paid from the contingent expense funds of
  208 their respective houses in the same amounts as provided for
  209 committee meetings when the Legislature is not in session;
  210 however, no per diem and expenses for attending meetings of the
  211 advisory board shall be paid to legislative members while the
  212 Legislature is in session.
- 213 (10) It is the intent of the Legislature that all state and
  214 local government entities make available for purposes of this
  215 section all publicly owned wireless communications infrastructure,
  216 including, but not limited to, communications towers, transmission
  217 equipment, transmission frequencies and other related properties
  218 and facilities.
- 219 (11) Nothing in this section shall be construed or 220 interpreted to provide for the regulation or oversight of 221 commercial mobile radio services.

222	(12)	Nothing	in	this	section	shall	be	construed	to	supersede
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- 223 the authority of the Mississippi Department of Information
- 224 Technology Services provided in Section 25-53-1 et seq.
- 225 (13) From and after July 1, 2016, the expenses of this
- 226 agency shall be defrayed by appropriation from the State General
- 227 Fund and all user charges and fees authorized under this section
- 228 shall be deposited into the State General Fund as authorized by
- 229 law.
- 230 (14) From and after July 1, 2016, no state agency shall
- 231 charge another state agency a fee, assessment, rent or other
- 232 charge for services or resources received by authority of this
- 233 section.
- 234 **SECTION 3.** Section 33-15-14, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 235 amended as follows:
- 236 33-15-14. (1) The agency is responsible for maintaining a
- 237 comprehensive statewide program of emergency management. The
- 238 agency is responsible for coordination with efforts of the federal
- 239 government with other departments and agencies of state
- 240 government, with county and municipal governments and school
- 241 boards and with private agencies that have a role in emergency
- 242 management.
- 243 (2) In performing its duties under this article, the agency
- 244 shall:
- 245 (a) Work with the Governor, or his or her

246 representative, in preparing a State Comprehensive Emergency

247	Management Plan of this state, which shall be integrated into and
248	coordinated with the emergency management plans of the federal
249	government and of other states to the fullest possible extent, and
250	to coordinate the preparation of plans and programs for emergency
251	management by the political subdivisions of the state, such local
252	plans to be integrated into and coordinated with the emergency
253	plan and program of this state. The plan must contain provisions
254	to ensure that the state is prepared for emergencies and minor,
255	major and catastrophic disasters, and the agency shall work
256	closely with local governments and agencies and organizations with
257	emergency management responsibilities in preparing and maintaining
258	the plan. The State Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan will
259	be operations oriented and:

specific regional and interregional planning provisions and promotes intergovernmental coordination of evacuation activities. This component must, at a minimum: ensure coordination pertaining to evacuees crossing county lines; set forth procedures for directing people caught on evacuation routes to safe shelter; and establish policies and strategies for emergency medical evacuations.

(ii) Include a shelter component that includes specific regional and interregional planning provisions and promotes coordination of shelter activities between the public, private and nonprofit sectors. This component must, at a minimum:

272 contain strategies to ensure the availability of adequate public 273 shelter space in each region of the state; establish strategies 274 for refuge-of-last-resort programs; provide strategies to assist 275 local emergency management efforts to ensure that adequate 276 staffing plans exist for all shelters, including medical and 277 security personnel; provide for a post-disaster communications 278 system for public shelters; establish model shelter guidelines for 279 operations, registration, inventory, power generation capability, 280 information management and staffing; and set forth policy guidance 281 for sheltering people with special needs.

(iii) Include a post-disaster response and recovery component that includes specific regional and interregional planning provisions and promotes intergovernmental coordination of post-disaster response and recovery activities. This component must provide for post-disaster response and recovery strategies according to whether a disaster is minor, major or catastrophic. The post-disaster response and recovery component must, at a minimum: establish the structure of the state's post-disaster response and recovery organization; establish procedures for activating the state's plan; set forth policies used to quide post-disaster response and recovery activities; describe the chain of command during the post-disaster response and recovery period; describe initial and continuous post-disaster response and recovery actions; identify the roles and responsibilities of each involved agency and organization;

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297	provide for a comprehensive communications plan; establish
298	procedures for monitoring mutual aid agreements; provide for rapid
299	impact assessment teams; ensure the availability of an effective
300	statewide urban search and rescue program coordinated with the
301	fire services; ensure the existence of a comprehensive statewide
302	medical care and relief plan administered by the State Department
303	of Health; and establish systems for coordinating volunteers and
304	accepting and distributing donated funds and goods.

- 305 (iv) Include additional provisions addressing
  306 aspects of preparedness, response and recovery, as determined
  307 necessary by the agency.
- 308 Address the need for coordinated and  $(\nabla)$ 309 expeditious deployment of state resources, including the 310 Mississippi National Guard. In the case of an imminent major 311 disaster, procedures should address predeployment of the 312 Mississippi National Guard, and, in the case of an imminent 313 catastrophic disaster, procedures should address predeployment of 314 the Mississippi National Guard and the United States Armed Forces. 315 This subparagraph (v) does not authorize the agency to call out 316 and deploy the Mississippi National Guard, which authority and 317 determination rests solely with the Governor.
- (vi) Establish a system of communications and
  warning to ensure that the state's population and emergency
  management agencies are warned of developing emergency situations
  and can communicate emergency response decisions.

322	(vii) Establish guidelines and schedules for
323	annual exercises that evaluate the ability of the state and its
324	political subdivisions to respond to minor, major and catastrophic
325	disasters and support local emergency management agencies. Such
326	exercises shall be coordinated with local governments and, to the
327	extent possible, the federal government.

- (viii) 1. Assign lead and support
  responsibilities to state agencies and personnel for emergency
  support functions and other support activities.
- 331 2. The agency shall prepare an interim 332 post-disaster response and recovery component that substantially 333 complies with the provisions of this paragraph (a). Each state 334 agency assigned lead responsibility for an emergency support 335 function by the State Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan 336 shall also prepare a detailed operational plan needed to implement 337 its responsibilities. The complete State Comprehensive Emergency 338 Management Plan shall be submitted to the Governor no later than January 1, 1996, and on January 1 of every even-numbered year 339 340 thereafter.
- 341 (b) Adopt standards and requirements for county
  342 emergency management plans. The standards and requirements must
  343 ensure that county plans are coordinated and consistent with the
  344 State Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan. If a municipality
  345 elects to establish an emergency management program, it must adopt

- 348 (c) Assist political subdivisions in preparing and 349 maintaining emergency management plans.
- 350 (d) Review periodically political subdivision emergency
  351 management plans for consistency with the State Comprehensive
  352 Emergency Management Plan and standards and requirements adopted
  353 under this section.
- (e) Make recommendations to the Legislature, building
  code organizations and political subdivisions for zoning, building
  and other land use controls, safety measures for securing mobile
  homes or other nonpermanent or semipermanent structures; and other
  preparedness, prevention and mitigation measures designed to
  eliminate emergencies or reduce their impact.
  - Emergency Management Plan and program for emergency management, ascertain the requirements of the state, its political subdivisions and the Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians for equipment and supplies of all kinds in the event of an emergency; plan for and either procure supplies, medicines, materials and equipment or enter into memoranda of agreement or open purchase orders that will ensure their availability; and use and employ from time to time any of the property, services and resources within the state in accordance with this article.

- 372 (h) Prepare and distribute to appropriate state and 373 local officials catalogs of federal, state and private assistance 374 programs.
- 375 (i) Implement training programs to improve the ability
  376 of state and local emergency management personnel to prepare and
  377 implement emergency management plans and programs, and require all
  378 local civil defense directors or emergency management directors to
  379 complete such training as a condition to their authority to
  380 continue service in their emergency management positions.
- 381 (j) Review periodically emergency operating procedures 382 of state agencies and recommend revisions as needed to ensure 383 consistency with the State Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan 384 and program.
- 385 (k) Prepare, in advance whenever possible, such
  386 executive orders, proclamations and rules for issuance by the
  387 Governor as are necessary or appropriate for coping with
  388 emergencies and disasters.
- 389 (1) Cooperate with the federal government and any 390 public or private agency or entity in achieving any purpose of 391 this article.
- 392 (m) Assist political subdivisions with the creation and 393 training of urban search and rescue teams and promote the

- development and maintenance of a state urban search and rescue program.
- 396 (n) Delegate, as necessary and appropriate, authority
  397 vested in it under this article and provide for the subdelegation
  398 of such authority.
- 399 (o) Require each county or municipality to designate an 400 agent for working with the agency in the event of a natural disaster. The county or municipality may designate any person as 402 agent who has completed training programs required of emergency 403 management directors.
- 404 (p) Report biennially to the Governor and the President 405 of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, no 406 later than January 1 of every odd-numbered year, the status of the 407 emergency management capabilities of the state and its political 408 subdivisions.
- (q) In accordance with Section 25-43-1 et seq., create,
  implement, administer, promulgate, amend and rescind rules,
  programs and plans needed to carry out the provisions of this
  article with due consideration for, and in cooperating with, the
  plans and programs of the federal government.
- 414 (r) Have the sole power and discretion to enter into,
  415 sign, execute and deliver long-term or multiyear leases of real
  416 and personal property with other state and federal agencies.
- 417 (s) Do other things necessary, incidental or 418 appropriate for the implementation of this article.

- 423 (u) Unless otherwise instructed by the Governor,

- 427 states referenced in Section 33-15-11(b)(10).
- 428 (v) Work in conjunction with the Mississippi Wireless

- 432 **SECTION 4.** Section 33-15-307, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 433 amended as follows:
- 434 33-15-307. (1) The provisions of this article shall be
- 435 invoked only pursuant to a state of emergency declared by the
- 436 Governor or an emergency or major disaster declared by the
- 437 President, or pursuant to an executive order of the Governor, or
- 438 administrative order of the director, in order to provide state or
- 439 local government resources and personnel in compliance with the
- 440 provisions of the Emergency Management Assistance Compact, Section
- 441 45-18-1 et seq., or in nondeclared times for administrative and
- 442 training costs associated with state disaster response and
- 443 recovery programs. Each declaration shall cite the cause for the

- declaration and define the area eligible for assistance and the type of assistance to be provided.
- 446 The Disaster Assistance Trust Fund is created as a 447 special fund in the State Treasury into which shall be paid any 448 funds appropriated or otherwise made available by the Legislature 449 for disaster assistance, any funds transferred from the Working 450 Cash-Stabilization Reserve Fund as provided under subsection (5) 451 of this section, any income from investment of the funds in the 452 trust fund, and federal reimbursement for administrative costs for 453 management of the Individuals and Households Program (IHP), the
- 454 Public Assistance Program, the Hazard Mitigation Program and
  455 Disaster Reservist Program.
- 456 (3) Income from investment of the funds in the trust fund, 457 and all other funds deposited therein pursuant to law, shall be 458 available for expenditure, transfer and allocation pursuant to 459 this article.
- 460 (4) The Disaster Assistance Trust Fund shall be used only 461 for the following purposes:
- 462 (a) The state's portion of the cost share for public 463 assistance under a major disaster declaration.
- (b) The state's cost share of the Individuals and
  Households Program (IHP) pursuant to Section 33-15-209(1) under a
  major disaster declared by the President.
- 467 (c) Administrative costs for managing the IHP.

468		(d)	Administrative	costs	for	managing	the	Public
469	Assistance	Prod	gram.					

- 470 (e) The State Temporary Housing Program pursuant to
  471 Section 33-15-217 under a state of emergency declared by the
  472 Governor.
- (f) 473 Out-of-pocket expenses, including travel, per diem, 474 overtime and other similar expenses, of state or local agencies 475 when so tasked by the Governor or the director for emergency 476 response under the provisions of Section 33-15-11(b)(7) and 477 current executive orders. This includes actual emergency response 478 and recovery activities, and applies to mobilization and 479 deployment of personnel from state or local agencies to another 480 state under the provisions of the Emergency Management Assistance 481 Compact. At the discretion of the director, this may include 482 reimbursement of costs to local governments for overtime and 483 backfill of deployed personnel within the state under the 484 provisions of Section 33-15-15(a) and to jurisdictions who are 485 signatories of the Statewide Mutual Aid Compact (SMAC).
- 486 (g) Costs incurred as a result of state active duty for
  487 the Mississippi National Guard when so tasked by the Governor to
  488 provide support to other agencies and local governments in a major
  489 disaster or emergency situation, or when tasked by the Governor to
  490 provide support to another state under the provisions of the
  491 Emergency Management Assistance Compact.

- 494 (i) Administrative costs of the Hazard Mitigation 495 Program.
- 496 (j) Costs incurred as a result of the implementation of 497 the Disaster Reservist Program under a major disaster declaration.
- 498 (k) Administrative costs of the Disaster Reservist
- 499 Program.
- 500 (1) Costs incurred as a result of the implementation of 501 public assistance, and/or individual assistance, and/or Disaster 502 Reservist Program, and/or hazard mitigation, and/or temporary 503 housing under a Governor's state of emergency.
- (m) The state's portion of the cost share for public assistance under a major disaster declaration for tornado or other storm damage to public facilities and infrastructure occurring on November 10, 2002, as provided in Sections 1 through 16 of Chapter 3, Third Extraordinary Session 2002.
- (n) Actual costs, including personnel call-back wages, base and overtime wages, travel, per diem and other out-of-pocket expenses incurred by regional response teams as a result of being mobilized or deployed when so tasked by the Governor pursuant to Section 33-15-11(b)(7), or by the director for emergency response pursuant to Section 33-15-15(a).
- 515 (o) The state's portion of the cost share for public 516 assistance under the Presidential Declaration of Major Disaster

- for the State of Mississippi (FEMA-1604-DR) dated August 29, 2005,
- 518 for hurricane or other storm damage to public facilities and
- 519 infrastructure as a result of Hurricane Katrina, as provided in
- 520 Section 3 of Chapter 538, Laws of 2006.
- 521 (p) Costs incurred for alternative housing grants up to
- 522 Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00) per county, per
- 523 event, to be administered by the Mississippi Emergency Management
- 524 Agency for materials only for repairs to communities that do not
- 525 qualify for Federal Emergency Management Agency Individual
- 526 Assistance Grants.
- 527 (q) Costs incurred by the Mississippi Emergency
- 528 Management Agency, approved by the executive director, to assist
- 529 municipalities and counties by allowing them to apply and receive
- 530 funds for debris removal support, which funds shall be reimbursed
- 531 to the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency at the date
- 532 determined after the federal disaster declaration. The
- 533 Mississippi Emergency Management Agency shall adopt rules and
- 534 regulations necessary to administer this program.
- 535 (5) Whenever the director determines that funds are
- 536 immediately needed in the Disaster Assistance Trust Fund to
- 537 provide for disaster assistance under this article, he shall
- 538 notify the Executive Director of the Department of Finance and
- 539 Administration of his determination and shall requisition the
- 540 amount of funds from the Working Cash-Stabilization Fund that are
- 541 needed in the trust fund, which shall be subject to the

542	limitations set forth below in this subsection. At the same time
543	he makes the requisition, the director shall notify the Lieutenant
544	Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the
545	respective Chairmen of the Senate Appropriations Committee, the
546	Senate Finance Committee, the House Appropriations Committee and
547	the House Ways and Means Committee of his determination of the
548	need for the funds and the amount that he has requisitioned. Upon
549	receipt of such a requisition from the director, the Executive
550	Director of the Department of Finance and Administration shall
551	ascertain if the amount requisitioned is available in the Working
552	Cash-Stabilization Reserve Fund and is within the limitations set
553	forth below in this subsection and, if it is, he shall transfer
554	that amount from the Working Cash-Stabilization Reserve Fund to
555	the trust fund. If the amount requisitioned is more than the
556	amount available in the Working Cash-Stabilization Fund or above
557	the limitations set forth below in this subsection, the executive
558	director shall transfer the amount that is available within the
559	limitations. The maximum amount that may be transferred from the
560	Working Cash-Stabilization Reserve Fund to the trust fund for any
561	disaster or disasters occurrence shall be One Million Dollars
562	(\$1,000,000.00) and the maximum amount that may be transferred
563	during any fiscal year shall be Two Million Dollars
564	(\$2,000,000.00).

(6) Unexpended state funds in the Disaster Assistance Trust

Fund at the end of a fiscal year shall not lapse into the State

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567	General Fund but shall remain in the trust fund for use under this
568	article for as long as the funds are needed for the particular
569	purpose for which they were appropriated, deposited or transferred
570	into the trust fund. After any state funds in the trust fund are
571	no longer needed for the particular purpose for which they were
572	appropriated, deposited or transferred into the trust fund, the
573	director may use those funds for any other purpose under this
574	article for which they currently are needed and for which other
575	funds are not available. If there is no current need for such
576	funds for any purpose under this article, the funds and the income
577	earned from the investment of the funds shall be transferred back
578	to the particular fund or funds in the State Treasury from which
579	they were appropriated or transferred into the trust fund, upon
580	certification of the director to the Executive Director of the
581	Department of Finance and Administration that the funds are not
582	currently needed; however, if such funds are derived from the
583	proceeds of general obligation bonds issued by the state under
584	Section 3 of Chapter 538, Laws of 2006, such excess funds and the
585	income earned from such funds shall be utilized to pay the debt
586	service on such bonds.

587 (7) The Mississippi Emergency Management Agency is

588 authorized to obtain a line of credit through the State Treasury

589 from the Working Cash-Stabilization Fund or any other

590 special-source funds maintained in the State Treasury in an amount

591 not exceeding Ten Million Dollars (\$10,000,000.00) in one (1)

592	fiscal year to fund shortfalls which, from time to time, may occur
593	due to decreases in state match funding cash flow. Loan proceeds
594	shall be received by the State Treasurer and shall be placed in
595	the Disaster Trust Fund account. Loan funds shall be expended
596	following the state match required by FEMA for Other Needs
597	Assistance awarded during federally declared disasters.
598	SECTION 5. This act shall take effect and be in force from
599	and after July 1, 2025, and shall stand repealed on June 30, 2025
