## SENATE BILL NO. 2698

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 43-63-7, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO EXTEND THE OPERATING PERIOD OF THE MISSISSIPPI DEMENTIA CARE PROGRAM; TO BRING FORWARD SECTIONS 43-63-1, 43-63-3 AND 43-63-5, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, FOR THE PURPOSE OF POSSIBLE AMENDMENT; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

- 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 7 **SECTION 1.** Section 43-63-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 8 amended as follows:
- 9 43-63-7. (1) Subject to the appropriation of federal funds
- 10 for that purpose, there is established within the Department of
- 11 Human Services a pilot program known as the "Mississippi Dementia
- 12 Care Program" for the purpose of providing respite care services
- 13 to informal caregivers of persons with Alzheimer's disease or
- 14 related dementia. The pilot program shall use existing respite
- 15 care services infrastructure and selected fiscal agent to carry
- 16 out the operations of the program. The State Department of Mental
- 17 Health, the State Department of Health and the University of
- 18 Mississippi Medical Center shall cooperate with and provide
- 19 assistance to the Department of Human Services in the

- 20 establishment and operation of the program and in seeking to
- 21 obtain federal funds for the program.
- 22 (2) The Mississippi Dementia Care Program shall:
- 23 (a) Be operated for a period \* \* \* beginning on July 1,
- 24 2022, and continuing through July 1, \* \* \* 2029;
- 25 (b) Begin enrolling participating individuals
- 26 immediately upon beginning of the program; and
- 27 (c) Actively serve not more than sixty (60) enrollees
- 28 for the first year of operation, and maintain this number of
- 29 enrollees for the second and third year of operation.
- 30 (3) To receive assistance from the Mississippi Dementia Care
- 31 program, the family unit must be assessed according to the
- 32 guidelines developed by the department to determine the need for
- 33 respite care services. This assessment must determine, at a
- 34 minimum, that:
- 35 (a) The family unit is unable to pay for respite care
- 36 without jeopardizing other basic needs, including, but not limited
- 37 to, food, shelter and medications; and
- 38 (b) The homebound person with Alzheimer's disease or
- 39 related dementia for whom the family unit is caring is sixty (60)
- 40 years of age or older, requires assistance to remain in the home,
- 41 and, without this assistance, would need to move to an assisted
- 42 living facility or a nursing facility.
- 43 (4) The Department of Human Services shall promulgate rules
- 44 and regulations to effectuate the purposes of this chapter.

- 45 (5) The executive director of the department shall submit a
- 46 report to the Legislature on or before January 1, 2023, and on or
- 47 before January 1st of each year thereafter until the end of the
- 48 pilot program period. The report shall include, but is not
- 49 limited to, the following information:
- 50 (a) Total spent on program funding;
- 51 (b) The amount of administrative costs to operate the
- 52 program;
- 53 (c) The number of individuals and informal caregivers
- 54 served by the program;
- 55 (d) The income ranges of the individuals and informal
- 56 caregivers participating in this program; and
- 57 (e) The efficacy of the assistance program.
- 58 (6) This section does not create an entitlement to respite
- 59 care services through the provisions of this program, and the
- 60 services provided and the number of individuals served are subject
- 61 to appropriations of federal funds for that purpose.
- **SECTION 2.** Section 43-63-1, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 63 brought forward as follows:
- 64 43-63-1. This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the
- 65 "Jimmy Kaigler Alzheimer's Support Act." James Street "Jimmy"
- 66 Kaigler was born and raised in Clarksdale, Mississippi, and was a
- 67 graduate of the University of Mississippi. Kaigler served as a
- 68 Captain in the United States Air Force from 1966 to 1972.
- 69 Following his tour in Vietnam, Captain Kaigler was awarded the

- 70 Bronze Star for meritorious service. Kaigler later worked as
- 71 President and CEO of Memorial Hospital in Gulfport. This chapter
- 72 shall serve as testament to Captain Kaigler's life as well as a
- 73 tribute to the loving care provided by his wife and family.
- 74 **SECTION 3.** Section 43-63-3, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 75 brought forward as follows:
- 76 43-63-3. (1) The Legislature finds that:
- 77 (a) Families caring for a loved one with Alzheimer's
- 78 disease or a related dementia at home are often burdened with
- 79 excessive financial or personal costs of providing continuous
- 80 care;
- 81 (b) Medicare does not pay for long-term care or provide
- 82 support to family caregivers;
- 83 (c) Long-term care insurance is costly and may not be
- 84 affordable to low-and-middle income families and may not cover
- 85 essential services for the length of time needed for an
- 86 Alzheimer's patient; and
- 87 (d) Providing respite care services to those with
- 88 Alzheimer's may delay or supplant the need for transfer to a
- 89 long-term skilled nursing facility, allowing for the individual
- 90 with Alzheimer's to remain in his or her home environment.
- 91 **SECTION 4.** Section 43-63-5, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 92 brought forward as follows:
- 93 43-63-5. As used in this chapter, the following terms shall
- 94 be defined as provided in this section:

95 (a) "Alzheimer's disease" or "related dementia"
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- 96 the diseases and conditions characterized by a decline in memory,
- 97 language, problem-solving and other thinking skills that affect a
- 98 person's ability to perform everyday activities.
- 99 (b) "Mississippi Dementia Care Program" means the
- 100 Alzheimer's or related dementia pilot program created in this
- 101 chapter.
- 102 (c) "Informal caregiver" means any spouse, adult child,
- 103 relative or friend who provides unpaid assistance to an individual
- 104 living in the community who suffers from Alzheimer's or other
- 105 related dementia.
- 106 (d) "Respite care" means temporary, substitute support
- 107 or living arrangements to provide a brief period of relief or rest
- 108 for informal caregivers. Respite care may include in-home care by
- 109 appropriately trained individuals, or care in an adult day care or
- 110 assisted living or nursing home setting, for an intermittent,
- 111 occasional or emergency basis.
- 112 **SECTION 5.** This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 113 and after June 30, 2025.
