SENATE BILL NO. 2731

- 1 AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 73-31-31, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, 2 TO EXTEND THE DATE OF THE REPEALER ON SECTIONS 73-31-1 THROUGH 3 73-31-29, WHICH PROVIDE FOR THE LICENSURE OF PSYCHOLOGISTS; TO BRING FORWARD SECTIONS 73-31-1 THROUGH 73-31-29, MISSISSIPPI CODE 4 5 OF 1972, FOR THE PURPOSE OF POSSIBLE AMENDMENT; AND FOR RELATED 6 PURPOSES.
- 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 8 SECTION 1. Section 73-31-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- amended as follows: 9
- 10 73-31-31. Sections 73-31-1 through 73-31-29 shall stand
- 11 repealed on July 1, * * * 2029.
- 12 SECTION 2. Section 73-31-1, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 13 brought forward as follows:
- 73-31-1. It is declared to be the policy of the State of 14
- 15 Mississippi that, in order to safeguard life, health, property and
- the public welfare of this state, and in order to protect the 16
- people of this state against unauthorized, unqualified and 17
- 18 improper application of psychology, it is necessary that a proper
- 19 regulatory authority be established and adequately provided for.

20	SECTION 3.	Section	73-31-3,	Mississippi	Code	of	1972,	is
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- 21 brought forward as follows:
- 73-31-3. When used in this article, the word or term:
- 23 (a) "Board" means the Mississippi Board of Psychology.
- 24 (b) "Institution of higher education" means any
- 25 regionally accredited institution of higher education in the
- 26 United States, accredited by an accrediting body recognized by the
- 27 U.S. Department of Education, including a professional school,
- 28 that offers a full-time doctoral course of study in psychology
- 29 that is acceptable to the board; for Canadian universities, this
- 30 term means an institution of higher education that is provincially
- 31 or territorially chartered to grant doctoral degrees.
- 32 (c) "Person" includes an individual, firm, partnership,
- 33 association or corporation.
- 34 (d) (i) "Practice of psychology" means the
- 35 observation, description, evaluation, interpretation, prediction
- 36 and modification of human behavior through the application of
- 37 psychological principles, methods and procedures, for the purposes
- 38 of:
- Preventing, eliminating, evaluating,
- 40 assessing, or predicting symptomatic, maladaptive, or undesirable
- 41 behavior;
- 42 2. Evaluating, assessing and/or facilitating
- 43 the enhancement of individual, group and/or organizational
- 44 effectiveness including personal effectiveness, adaptive behavior,

45 interpersonal relationships, work and life adjustment, health,	45	interpersonal	relationships,	work and	life	adjustment,	health,	and
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- 46 individual, group and/or organizational performance; or
- 47 3. Assisting in legal decision-making.
- 48 (ii) The practice of psychology includes, but is
- 49 not limited to:
- 50 1. Psychological testing and the evaluation
- 51 or assessment of personal characteristics, such as intelligence;
- 52 personality; cognitive, behavioral, physical and/or emotional
- 53 abilities; skills; interests; aptitudes; and neuropsychological
- 54 functioning;
- 55 2. Counseling, psychoanalysis, psychotherapy,
- 56 hypnosis, biofeedback, and behavior analysis and therapy;
- 57 3. Diagnosis, treatment, and management of
- 58 mental and emotional disorder or disability, alcoholism and
- 59 substance abuse, disorders of habit or conduct, as well as of the
- 60 psychological aspects of physical illness, accident, injury, or
- 61 disability;
- 62 4. Psychoeducational evaluation, therapy and
- 63 remediation;
- 64 5. Consultation with physicians, other health
- 65 care professionals and patients regarding all available treatment
- 66 options, as well as consultation with attorneys, judges, business,
- 67 and industry;
- 6. Provision of direct services to
- 69 individuals and/or groups for the purpose of enhancing individual

- 70 and thereby organizational effectiveness, using principles,
- 71 methods and/or procedures to assess and evaluate individuals on
- 72 personal characteristics for individual development and/or
- 73 behavior change or for making decisions about the individual, such
- 74 as selection; and
- 75 The supervision of any of the above.
- 76 (iii) Psychological services are provided to
- 77 individuals, families, groups, systems, organizations, and the
- 78 public. The practice of psychology shall be construed within the
- 79 meaning of this definition without regard to whether payment is
- 80 received for services rendered and without regard to the means of
- 81 service provision (e.g., face-to-face, telephone, Internet, or
- 82 telehealth).
- 83 (e) A "psychologist" is any person licensed under this
- 84 article, and includes a person who represents himself or herself
- 85 to be a psychologist by using any title or description of services
- 86 incorporating the words "psychological," "psychologist,"
- 87 "psychology," or who represents that he or she possesses expert
- 88 qualification in any area of psychology, or offers to the public,
- 89 or renders to individuals or to groups of individuals services
- 90 defined as the practice of psychology by this article.
- 91 **SECTION 4.** Section 73-31-5, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 92 brought forward as follows:
- 93 73-31-5. (1) There is created a Mississippi Board of
- 94 Psychology consisting of seven (7) members who are citizens of the

United States and residing in the State of Mississippi. One (1) member of the board shall be a person who is not a psychologist or a mental health professional but who has expressed a continuing interest in the field of psychology. Each board member shall otherwise be licensed under this article. The composition of the board shall at all times include psychologists engaged in the professional practice of psychology and psychologists who are faculty at institutions of higher learning that grant doctoral degrees or staff or faculty of an American Psychological Association accredited doctoral level internship or postdoctoral

(2) When the term of each psychologist member ends, the Governor shall, within thirty (30) days, appoint as his or her successor, for a term of five (5) years, a psychologist who holds a doctoral degree from an institution of higher education and who has been licensed under this article. When the term of the member who is not a psychologist ends, the Governor shall, within thirty (30) days, appoint a qualified person as his or her successor for a term of five (5) years. Any board member whose term has expired may continue to holdover and serve with all rights and responsibilities until the new appointment occurs. No board member shall serve for more than two (2) consecutive terms. Any vacancy occurring in the board membership other than by expiration of term shall be filled by the Governor by appointment for the unexpired term of the member. All appointments of psychologist

- 120 members of the board shall be made from a list containing the 121 names of at least three (3) eligible nominees for each vacancy 122 submitted by the Mississippi Psychological Association. 123 board member shall receive a certificate of appointment from the 124 Governor before entering on the discharge of his or her duties, 125 and within thirty (30) days from the effective date of his 126 appointment shall subscribe an oath for the faithful performance 127 of his or her official duty before any officer authorized to 128 administer oaths in this state, and shall file the same with the 129 Secretary of State.
- 130 (3) The Governor may remove any board member for misconduct, 131 incompetency, or neglect of duty after giving the board member a 132 written statement of the charges and an opportunity to be heard 133 thereon.
- (4) Each board member shall serve without compensation, but shall receive actual traveling and incidental expenses necessarily incurred while engaged in the discharge of official duties.
- SECTION 5. Section 73-31-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is brought forward as follows:
- 139 73-31-7. (1) The board shall annually elect officers from 140 its membership. The board shall meet at any other times as it 141 deems necessary or advisable, or as deemed necessary and advisable 142 by the chairman or a majority of its members or the Governor. 143 Reasonable notice of all meetings shall be given in the manner
- prescribed by the board. A majority of the board shall constitute

- (2) The board is authorized and empowered to:
- 148 (a) Adopt and, from time to time, revise any rules and 149 regulations not inconsistent with, and as may be necessary to 150 carry into effect the provisions of this article.
- (b) Within the funds available, employ and/or contract with a stenographer and other personnel, and contract for services, as are necessary for the proper performance of its work under this article.
- 155 (c) Adopt a seal, and the executive secretary or board 156 administrator shall have the care and custody thereof.
- 157 (d) Examine, license, and renew the license of duly
 158 qualified applicants.
- 159 (e) Conduct hearings upon complaints concerning the 160 disciplining or licensing of applicants and psychologists.
- 161 (f) Deny, approve, withhold, revoke, suspend and/or 162 otherwise discipline applicants and licensed psychologists.
- 163 (g) Issue an educational letter to a licensee in order
 164 to assist that individual in his or her practice as a
 165 psychologist. Such a letter will not be considered to be
 166 disciplinary action.
- 167 (h) Cause the prosecution and enjoinder of all persons
 168 violating this article, and incur necessary expenses therefor.

169	(i)	Charge a fee of not more than Seven Hundred De	ollars
170	(\$700.00) to a	qualified psychologist as determined by the be	oard
171	who is applying	for certification by the board to conduct	
172	examinations in	civil commitment proceedings.	

- 173 Purchase general liability insurance coverage, (🖯) 174 including errors and omissions insurance, to cover the official actions of the board members and contract personnel and suits 175 176 against them in their individual capacity. That coverage shall be 177 in an amount determined by the board to be adequate, and the costs of the insurance shall be paid out of any funds available to the 178 179 board.
- 180 As additional responsibilities, effective July 1, (k) 181 2018, the board shall administer and support the function of the 182 Mississippi Autism Board under Sections 73-75-1 through 73-75-25, relating to the licensure of licensed behavior analysts and 183 184 licensed assistant behavior analysts.
- 185 Grant to persons who are licensed in another state (1)or jurisdiction the authority to practice interjurisdictional 186 187 telepsychology or the temporary authorization to practice, and 188 regulate the practice of those persons in Mississippi, in 189 accordance with the Psychology Interjurisdictional Compact provided for in Section 73-31-51 and this article. 190
- 191 Within thirty (30) days after the close of each fiscal 192 year ending June 30, the board shall submit an official report, reviewed and signed by all board members, to the Governor 193

- 194 concerning the work of the board during the preceding fiscal year.
- 195 The report shall include the names of all psychologists to whom
- 196 licenses have been granted; any cases heard and decisions rendered
- 197 in relation to the work of the board; the names, remuneration and
- 198 duties of any employees of the board; and an account of all monies
- 199 received and expended by the board.
- 200 SECTION 6. Section 73-31-9, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 201 brought forward as follows:
- 202 73-31-9. (1) All fees from applicants seeking licensing
- 203 under this article and all license renewal fees received under
- 204 this article shall be nonrefundable. The board may charge a late
- 205 fee for nonrenewal by June 30 of each year.
- 206 The board shall charge an application fee to be
- 207 determined by the board, but not to exceed Seven Hundred Dollars
- 208 (\$700.00), to applicants for licensing, and shall charge the
- 209 applicant for the expenses incurred by the board for examination
- 210 of the applicant. The board may increase the application fee as
- 211 necessary, but may not increase the fee by more than Fifty Dollars
- 212 (\$50.00) above the amount of the previous year's fee.
- 213 Except as provided in Section 33-1-39, every licensed
- 214 psychologist in this state shall annually pay to the board a fee
- 215 determined by the board, but not to exceed Seven Hundred Dollars
- 216 (\$700.00); and the credentialing coordinator shall thereupon issue
- 217 a renewal of the license for a term of one (1) year. The board
- may increase the license renewal fee as necessary, but may not 218

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- 219 increase the fee by more than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) above the 220 amount of the previous year's fee. The license of any 221 psychologist who fails to renew during the month of June in each 222 and every year shall lapse; the failure to renew the license, 223 however, shall not deprive the psychologist of the right of 224 renewal thereafter. The lapsed license may be renewed within a 225 period of two (2) years after the lapse upon payment of all fees 226 in arrears. A psychologist wishing to renew a license that has 227 been lapsed for more than two (2) years shall be required to
- 229 Every odd-numbered year, no psychologist license shall 230 be renewed unless the psychologist shows evidence of a minimum of 231 twenty (20) clock hours of continuing education activities 232 approved by the board.
- 233 All fees and any other monies received by the board 234 shall be deposited in a special fund that is created in the State 235 Treasury and shall be used for the implementation and 236 administration of this article when appropriated by the 237 Legislature for that purpose. The monies in the special fund 238 shall be subject to all provisions of the state budget laws that are applicable to special fund agencies, and disbursements from 239 240 the special fund shall be made by the State Treasurer only upon warrants issued by the State Fiscal Officer upon requisitions 241 242 signed by the chairman or executive secretary of the board. Any interest earned on this special fund shall be credited by the 243

245	General Fund. Any unexpended monies remaining in the special fund
246	at the end of a fiscal year shall not lapse into the State General
247	Fund. The State Auditor shall audit the financial affairs of the
248	board and the transactions involving the special fund at least
249	once a year in the same manner as for other special fund agencies.
250	SECTION 7. Section 73-31-11, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
251	brought forward as follows:
252	73-31-11. The board shall keep a record of its proceedings
253	and a register of all applications for licenses, which shall show:
254	(a) The name, age and residence of each applicant;
255	(b) The date of the application;
256	(c) The place of professional practice of the
257	applicant;
258	(d) A summary of the educational and other
259	qualifications of the applicant;
260	(e) Whether or not an examination was required;
261	(f) Whether or not a license was granted;
262	(g) The date of the action of the board;
263	(h) Any other information as may be deemed necessary or
264	advisable by the board in aid of the above requirements.
265	The records of the board shall be public records and evidence
266	of the proceedings of the board set forth in the records; and a
267	transcript thereof, duly certified by the executive secretary of

the board, bearing the seal of the board, shall be admissible in

State Treasurer to the fund and shall not be paid into the State

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- evidence with the same force and effect as if the original were produced.
- 271 **SECTION 8.** Section 73-31-13, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 272 brought forward as follows:
- 73-31-13. The board shall issue a license as a psychologist to each applicant who files an application upon a form and in the manner as the board prescribes, accompanied by the fee as is required by this article; and who furnishes evidence satisfactory to the board that he or she:
- 278 (a) Is at least twenty-one (21) years of age; and
- (b) Is of good moral character. The applicant must
- 280 have successfully been cleared for licensure through an
- 281 investigation that consists of a determination as to good moral
- 282 character and verification that the prospective licensee is not
- 283 guilty of or in violation of any statutory ground for denial of
- 284 licensure. For the purposes of this article, good moral character
- 285 includes an absence of felony convictions or misdemeanor
- 286 convictions involving moral turpitude as established by a criminal
- 287 background check. Applicants shall undergo a fingerprint-based
- 288 criminal history records check of the Mississippi central criminal
- 289 database and the Federal Bureau of Investigation criminal history
- 290 database. Each applicant shall submit a full set of the
- 291 applicant's fingerprints in a form and manner prescribed by the
- 292 board, which shall be forwarded to the Mississippi Department of

293	Public	Safety	(department)	and	the	Federal	Bureau	of	Investigation

294 Identification Division for this purpose; and

295	(c) Is not in violation of any of the provisions of
296	this article and the rules and regulations adopted under this
297	article, and is not currently under investigation by another

298 licensure board; and

299	(d) Holds a doctoral degree in psychology from an
300	institution of higher education that is: regionally accredited by
301	an accrediting body recognized by the United States Department of
302	Education, or authorized by Provincial statute or Royal Charter to
303	grant doctoral degrees. From a program accredited by the American
304	Psychological Association, or the Canadian Psychological
305	Association, and from a program that requires at least one (1)
306	year of continuous, full-time residence at the educational
307	institution granting the doctoral degree. For graduates from
308	newly established programs seeking accreditation or in areas where
309	no accreditation exists, applicants for licensure shall have
310	completed a doctoral program in psychology that meets recognized
311	acceptable professional standards as determined by the board. For
312	applicants graduating from doctoral level psychology training
313	programs outside of the United States of America or Canada,
314	applicants for licensure shall have completed a doctoral program
315	in psychology that meets recognized acceptable professional
316	standards as determined by the board; and

317	(e) Has completed a supervised internship from a
318	program accredited by the American Psychological Association or
319	the Canadian Psychological Association that meet the standards of
320	training as defined by the board. The internship shall be
321	comprised of at least one thousand eight hundred (1,800) hours of
322	actual work, to include direct service, training and supervisory
323	time; and

written (as used in this paragraph, the term "written" means either paper and pencil or computer-administered or computerized testing) and oral examinations in psychology prescribed by the board; except that upon examination of credentials, the board may, by unanimous consent, consider these credentials adequate evidence of professional knowledge.

Upon investigation of the application and other evidence submitted, the board shall, not less than thirty (30) days before the examination, notify each applicant that the application and evidence submitted is satisfactory and accepted or unsatisfactory and rejected; if rejected, the notice shall state the reasons for the rejection.

The place of examination shall be designated in advance by the board, and the examination shall be given at such time and place and under such supervision as the board may determine. The examination used by the board shall consist of written tests and

341	oral tests, and shall fairly test the applicant's knowledge and
342	application thereof in those areas deemed relevant by the
343	board. All examinations serve the purpose of verifying that a
344	candidate for licensure has acquired a basic core of knowledge in
345	the discipline of psychology and can apply that knowledge to the
346	problems confronted in the practice of psychology within the
347	applicant's area of practice.

The board shall evaluate the results from both the written and oral examinations. The passing scores for the written and oral examinations shall be established by the board in its rules and regulations. If an applicant fails to receive a passing score on the entire examination, he or she may reapply and shall be allowed to take a later examination. An applicant who has failed two (2) successive examinations by the board may not reapply until after two (2) years from the date of the last examination failed. The board shall keep the written examination scores, and an accurate transcript of the questions and answers relating to the oral examinations, and the grade assigned to each answer thereof, as part of its records for at least two (2) years after the date of examination.

Persons licensed in another state or jurisdiction applying
for the authority to practice interjurisdictional telepsychology
must meet the requirements set out in the Psychology
Interjurisdictional Compact provided for in Section 73-31-51.

368	SECTION 9. Section 73-31-14, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
369	brought forward as follows:
370	73-31-14. (1) Psychologists who are duly licensed in other
371	jurisdictions and not currently under investigation by another
372	licensure board may, upon application for licensure, apply for a
373	temporary license, which shall be valid until the next
374	administration of the oral examination. The temporary license
375	shall be issued upon the applicant's passage of the Examination
376	for Professional Practice of Psychology (EPPP) at the level
377	established by the board in its rules and regulations and
378	equivalent to that required for permanent licensure. Each
379	applicant for a temporary license shall file an application upon a
380	form and in the manner as the board prescribes, accompanied by a
381	fee equal to the amount required for permanent licensure. A
382	temporary license will lapse for any person who has failed the
383	oral examination or has had his or her license suspended or
384	revoked by the board. Procedures for the issuance of temporary
385	licenses shall be established by the board in its rules and
386	regulations. The issuance of a temporary license to a
387	military-trained applicant, military spouse or person who
388	establishes residence in this state shall be subject to the
389	provisions of Section 73-50-1 or 73-50-2, as applicable.

Each application or filing made under this section shall

390	(2) Psychologists who are duly licensed in other
391	jurisdictions may apply for a temporary practice certificate that
392	allows them to practice psychology on a temporary basis in the
393	State of Mississippi. That practice must be limited in scope and
394	duration, not exceeding thirty (30) days during a consecutive
395	twelve-month period. Applicants for a temporary practice
396	certificate shall provide to the board the nature of the practice
397	before providing that service, and shall make available to the
398	board a current copy of his or her license or verification of a
399	valid license in good standing. Psychologists who receive
400	temporary practice certificates are subject to a jurisprudence
401	examination at the request of the board. This authority for a
402	temporary practice certificate does not apply to a psychologist
403	who has been denied licensure in Mississippi, is a legal resident
404	of Mississippi, or intends to practice full-time or a major
405	portion of their time in Mississippi. Each applicant for a
406	temporary practice certificate shall file an application upon a
407	form and in the manner as the board prescribes, accompanied by a
408	fee in an amount determined by the board, but not to exceed Three
409	Hundred Dollars (\$300.00).

(3) Applicants awaiting licensure in Mississippi are prohibited from the practice of psychology without a temporary license issued by the board. For the purposes of this subsection, the practice of psychology shall be construed without regard to

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- 414 the means of service provision (e.g., face-to-face, telephone,
- 415 internet, telehealth).
- 416 (4) Persons licensed in another state or jurisdiction
- 417 applying for the temporary authorization to practice must meet the
- 418 requirements set out in the Psychology Interjurisdictional Compact
- 419 provided for in Section 73-31-51.
- 420 **SECTION 10.** Section 73-31-15, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 421 brought forward as follows:
- 422 73-31-15. (1) Upon application accompanied by the proper
- 423 fee, the board may issue a license to any psychologist who
- 424 furnishes, upon a form and in the manner as the board prescribes,
- 425 evidence satisfactory to the board that he or she is a diplomate
- 426 in good standing of the American Board of Examiners in
- 427 Professional Psychology; or possesses a valid Certificate of
- 428 Professional Qualification (CPQ) granted by the Association of
- 429 State and Provincial Psychology Boards; or has at least twenty
- 430 (20) years of licensure to practice in another state, territorial
- 431 possession of the United States, District of Columbia, or
- 432 Commonwealth of Puerto Rico or Canadian Province when that license
- 433 was based on a doctoral degree; and
- 434 (a) Has had no disciplinary sanction during the entire
- 435 period of licensure; and
- 436 (b) Is not currently under investigation by another
- 437 licensure board; and

- 441 (2) The issuance of a license by reciprocity to a
 442 military-trained applicant, military spouse or person who
 443 establishes residence in this state shall be subject to the
 444 provisions of Section 73-50-1 or 73-50-2, as applicable.
- 445 (3) The board may grant the authority to practice 446 interjurisdictional telepsychology to persons who are licensed in 447 another state or jurisdiction who meet the requirements set out in 448 the Psychology Interjurisdictional Compact provided for in Section 449 73-31-51.
- 450 **SECTION 11.** Section 73-31-17, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 451 brought forward as follows:
- 452 73-31-17. The status of psychologist emeritus is created. 453 To qualify for status as psychologist emeritus, a psychologist 454 must apply for psychologist emeritus status with the board upon a 455 form and in the manner as the board prescribes, accompanied by a 456 fee equal to one-half (1/2) of the amount of the permanent 457 licensure renewal fee as determined by the board. The applicant 458 shall be required to make a satisfactory showing to the board, in 459 a manner to be determined by the board, that the applicant (a) is 460 sixty-five (65) years old or older, (b) has held continuous 461 licensure as a psychologist in the State of Mississippi for at 462 least twenty (20) years, and (c) at the time of application is

- 463 retired from the full-time practice of psychology and is not
- 464 practicing more than eighty (80) hours per month in any capacity
- 465 in the State of Mississippi. For the purposes of this section,
- 466 the practice of psychology shall be construed without regard to
- 467 the means of service provision (e.g., face-to-face, telephone,
- 468 Internet, telehealth). The applicant must renew his or her
- 469 psychologist emeritus status annually on the same renewal schedule
- 470 as permanent licensure. Renewal shall include confirmation of the
- 471 psychologist's eligibility and attestation, at the time of
- 472 renewal, of his or her continued "retired" status.
- 473 **SECTION 12.** Section 73-31-19, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 474 brought forward as follows:
- 475 73-31-19. The board shall issue a license signed by the
- 476 chairman and executive secretary of the board whenever an
- 477 applicant has been successfully qualified as provided in this
- 478 article. A copy of the license, so certified by the executive
- 479 secretary as a true copy, shall be filed by the licensee in the
- 480 office of the clerk of the circuit court in the county in which
- 481 the licensee resides.
- 482 **SECTION 13.** Section 73-31-21, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 483 brought forward as follows:
- 484 73-31-21. (1) The board, by an affirmative vote of at least
- 485 four (4) of its seven (7) members, shall withhold, deny, revoke or
- 486 suspend any license issued or applied for in accordance with the
- 487 provisions of this article, or otherwise discipline a licensed

488	psychologist,	upon	proof	that	the	applicant	or	licensed
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- 489 psychologist:
- 490 (a) Has violated the current code of ethics of the
- 491 American Psychological Association or other codes of ethical
- 492 standards adopted by the board; or
- 493 (b) Has been convicted of a felony or any offense
- 494 involving moral turpitude, the record of conviction being
- 495 conclusive evidence thereof; or
- 496 (c) Is using any substance or any alcoholic beverage to
- 497 an extent or in a manner dangerous to any other person or the
- 498 public, or to an extent that the use impairs his or her ability to
- 499 perform the work of a professional psychologist with safety to the
- 500 public; or
- 501 (d) Has impersonated another person holding a
- 502 psychologist license or allowed another person to use his or her
- 503 license; or
- 504 (e) Has used fraud or deception in applying for a
- 505 license or in taking an examination provided for in this article;
- 506 or
- 507 (f) Has accepted commissions or rebates or other forms
- 508 of remuneration for referring clients to other professional
- 509 persons; or
- 510 (g) Has performed psychological services outside of the
- 511 area of his or her training, experience or competence; or

512	(h) Has allowed his or her name or license issued under
513	this article to be used in connection with any person or persons
514	who perform psychological services outside of the area of their
515	training, experience or competence; or

- 516 (i) Is legally adjudicated mentally incompetent, the 517 record of that adjudication being conclusive evidence thereof; or
- 518 Has willfully or negligently violated any of the (j) 519 provisions of this article. The board may recover from any person 520 disciplined under this article, the costs of investigation, prosecution, and adjudication of the disciplinary action. 521
 - Notice shall be effected by registered mail or personal service setting forth the particular reasons for the proposed action and fixing a date not less than thirty (30) days nor more than sixty (60) days from the date of the mailing or that service, at which time the applicant or licensee shall be given an opportunity for a prompt and fair hearing. For the purpose of the hearing, the board, acting by and through its executive secretary, may subpoena persons and papers on its own behalf and on behalf of the applicant or licensee, may administer oaths and may take testimony. That testimony, when properly transcribed, together with the papers and exhibits, shall be admissible in evidence for or against the applicant or licensee. At the hearing, the applicant or licensee may appear by counsel and personally in his or her own behalf. Any person sworn and examined by a witness in the hearing shall not be held to answer criminally, nor shall any

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537 papers or documents produced by the witness be competent evidence 538 in any criminal proceedings against the witness other than for perjury in delivering his or her evidence. On the basis of any 539 such hearing, or upon default of applicant or licensee, the board 540 541 shall make a determination specifying its findings of fact and 542 conclusions of law. A copy of that determination shall be sent by 543 registered mail or served personally upon the applicant or 544 licensee. The decision of the board denying, revoking or 545 suspending the license shall become final thirty (30) days after 546 so mailed or served, unless within that period the applicant or 547 licensee appeals the decision to the chancery court, under the 548 provisions hereof, and the proceedings in chancery shall be 549 conducted as other matters coming before the court. All 550 proceedings and evidence, together with exhibits, presented at the 551 hearing before the board shall be admissible in evidence in court 552 in the appeal.

(3) The board may subpoen persons and papers on its own behalf and on behalf of the respondent, may administer oaths and may compel the testimony of witnesses. It may issue commissions to take testimony, and testimony so taken and sworn to shall be admissible in evidence for and against the respondent. The board shall be entitled to the assistance of the chancery court or the chancellor in vacation, which, on petition by the board, shall issue ancillary subpoenas and petitions and may punish as for contempt of court in the event of noncompliance therewith.

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562	(4) Every order and judgment of the board shall take effect
563	immediately on its promulgation unless the board in the order or
564	judgment fixes a probationary period for the applicant or
565	licensee. The order and judgment shall continue in effect unless
566	upon appeal the court by proper order or decree terminates it
567	earlier. The board may make public its order and judgments in
568	any manner and form as it deems proper. It shall, in event of the
569	suspension or revocation of a license, direct the clerk of the
570	circuit court of the county in which that license was recorded to
571	cancel that record.

- (5) Nothing in this section shall be construed as limiting or revoking the authority of any court or of any licensing or registering officer or board, other than the Mississippi Board of Psychology, to suspend, revoke and reinstate licenses and to cancel registrations under the provisions of Section 41-29-311.
- (6) Suspension by the board of the license of a psychologist shall be for a period not exceeding one (1) year. At the end of this period the board shall reevaluate the suspension, and shall either reinstate or revoke the license. A person whose license has been revoked under the provisions of this section may reapply for a license after more than two (2) years have elapsed from the date that the denial or revocation is legally effective.
- (7) In addition to the reasons specified in subsection (1)
 585 of this section, the board shall be authorized to suspend the
 586 license of any licensee for being out of compliance with an order

587 for support, as defined in Section 93-11-153. The procedure for 588 suspension of a license for being out of compliance with an order 589 for support, and the procedure for the reissuance or reinstatement 590 of a license suspended for that purpose, and the payment of any 591 fees for the reissuance or reinstatement of a license suspended 592 for that purpose, shall be governed by Section 93-11-157. Actions 593 taken by the board in suspending a license when required by 594 Section 93-11-157 or 93-11-163 are not actions from which an 595 appeal may be taken under this section. Any appeal of a license 596 suspension that is required by Section 93-11-157 or 93-11-163 597 shall be taken in accordance with the appeal procedure specified 598 in Section 93-11-157 or 93-11-163, as the case may be, rather than 599 the procedure specified in this section. If there is any conflict 600 between any provision of Section 93-11-157 or 93-11-163 and any 601 provision of this article, the provisions of Section 93-11-157 or 602 93-11-163, as the case may be, shall control.

603 The board may issue a nondisciplinary, educational 604 letter to licensees as provided in Section 73-31-7(2)(g). The 605 board may also direct a psychologist to obtain a formal assessment 606 of ability to practice safely if there is reason to believe there 607 may be impairment due to substance abuse or mental incapacity. Licensees who may be impaired, but who are able to practice 608 609 safely, may be required by the board to seek appropriate treatment 610 and/or supervision. That action by the board in itself will not 611 be considered disciplinary.

612	(9) The board may discipline any person who has been granted
613	the authority to practice interjurisdictional telepsychology or
614	the temporary authorization to practice under the Psychology
615	Interjurisdictional Compact provided for under Section 73-31-51,
616	for any of the grounds specified in subsection (1) of this section
617	in the same manner as the board disciplines a licensed
618	psychologist under this section.

- SECTION 14. Section 73-31-23, Mississippi Code of 1972, is brought forward as follows:
- 73-31-23. (1) It shall be a misdemeanor:
- 622 (a) For any person not licensed under this article to 623 represent himself or herself as a psychologist or practice 624 psychology in the manner described in Section 73-31-3, except as 625 otherwise authorized under the Psychology Interjurisdictional 626 Compact provided for under Section 73-31-51; or
- 627 (b) For any person to represent himself or herself as a
 628 psychologist or practice psychology in the manner described in
 629 Section 73-31-3 during the time that his or her license as a
 630 psychologist is suspended or revoked or lapsed; or
- 631 (c) For any person to otherwise violate the provisions 632 of this article.
- That misdemeanor shall be punishable, upon conviction, by
 imprisonment for not more than sixty (60) days or by a fine of not
 more than Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00), or by both that fine
 and imprisonment. Each violation shall be deemed a separate

637	offense.	The misdemeanor shall be prosecuted by the district
638	attorney	of the judicial district in which the offense was
639	committed	in the name of the people of the State of Mississippi.

- Any entity, organization or person, including the board, 640 (2) 641 any member of the board, and its agents or employees, acting in 642 good faith and without malice, who makes any report or information 643 available to the board regarding violation of any of the 644 provisions of this article, or who assists in the organization, 645 investigation or preparation of any such report or information or assists the board in carrying out any of its duties or functions 646 647 provided by law, shall be immune from civil or criminal liability 648 for those acts.
- The immunity granted under the provisions of this subsection shall not apply to and shall not be available to any psychologist who is the subject of any report or information relating to a violation by the psychologist of the provisions of this article.
- 653 **SECTION 15.** Section 73-31-25, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 654 brought forward as follows:
 - 73-31-25. The board may, in the name of the people of the State of Mississippi, through the Attorney General, except as otherwise authorized in Section 7-5-39, apply for an injunction in any court of competent jurisdiction to enjoin any person from committing any act declared to be a misdemeanor by this article.
- If it is established that the defendant has been or is committing an act declared to be a misdemeanor by this article,

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662	the court, or any judge thereof, shall enter a decree perpetually
663	enjoining the defendant from further committing that act. In case
664	of violation of any injunction issued under the provisions of this
665	section, the court, or any judge thereof, may summarily try and
666	punish the offender for contempt of court. Those injunctive
667	proceedings shall be in addition to, and not in lieu of, all
668	penalties and other remedies provided for in this article.

- SECTION 16. Section 73-31-27, Mississippi Code of 1972, is brought forward as follows:
- 73-31-27. (1) Nothing in this article shall be construed to limit:
- 673 (a) The activities and services of a student, intern or 674 trainee in psychology pursuing a course of study in psychology at 675 an institution of higher education, if these activities and 676 services constitute a part of his or her supervised course of 677 study; or
- 678 The services and activities of members of other (b) professional groups licensed or certified by the State of 679 680 Mississippi who perform work of a psychological nature consistent 681 with their training, work experience history, and with any code of 682 ethics of their respective professions, provided they do not hold 683 themselves out to be psychologists. Portions of the practice of 684 psychology as defined by this article overlap with the activities 685 of other professional groups and it is not the intent of this article to regulate the activities of those professional groups. 686

687	(2) Individuals certified by the Mississippi State
688	Department of Education may use appropriate titles such as "school
689	psychologist," "certified school psychologist," "educational
690	psychologist" or "psychometrist" only when they are employed by or
691	under contract with a school district and practicing in school or
692	educational settings.

- (3) A lecturer employed by an institution of higher learning may use an appropriate academic or research title, provided he or she does not represent himself or herself as a psychologist or practice psychology in the manner described in Section 73-31-3.
- SECTION 17. Section 73-31-29, Mississippi Code of 1972, is brought forward as follows:
- 73-31-29. A psychologist shall not be examined without the consent of his or her client as to any communication made by the client to the psychologist or the psychologist's advice given thereon in the course of professional employment; nor shall a psychologist's secretary, stenographer or clerk be examined without the consent of his or her employer concerning any fact, the knowledge of which he or she has acquired in that capacity.
- 706 **SECTION 18.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 707 and after June 30, 2025.

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
