SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 528

- A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION TO MEMORIALIZE THE INFLUENTIAL LIFE AND CAREER OF MISSISSIPPI POLITICAL PIONEER AND LONGTIME CHAIRMAN
- 3 OF THE MISSISSIPPI REPUBLICAN PARTY, CLARKE THOMAS REED OF
- 4 GREENVILLE, MISSISSIPPI, AND EXTENDING THE SINCEREST CONDOLENCES
- 5 OF THE LEGISLATURE ON HIS PASSING.
- 6 WHEREAS, it is with sadness that we extend the sincerest
- 7 condolences of the Legislature on the passing of Clarke Thomas
- 8 Reed; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Clarke T. Reed, businessman, Mississippi civic
- 10 leader, and a key architect of post-World War II Southern politics
- 11 passed away on December 8, 2024, at his home in Greenville,
- 12 Mississippi. He was 96; and
- 13 WHEREAS, longtime Chairman of the Mississippi Republican
- 14 Party and informal power broker whose reach extended to the
- 15 highest levels of national and state government, "Clarke Reed was
- 16 not only present at the creation of a Republican South, he was one
- 17 of its creators" recalled historian Jon Meacham; and
- 18 WHEREAS, "When Clarke got involved in Mississippi politics,
- 19 it was a one-party state controlled by conservative Democrats,"

- 20 recalled Curtis Wilkie, a Mississippian who covered national
- 21 politics for The Boston Globe and became a professor of journalism
- 22 at the University of Mississippi. "Clarke was good friends with
- 23 Hodding Carter III, a young Greenville newspaperman and ardent
- 24 Democrat. They worked quietly together to encourage a two-party
- 25 system"; and
- 26 WHEREAS, born in Alliance, Ohio, on August 4, 1928, Clarke
- 27 Thomas Reed was the son of Lyman and Kathryn Reynolds Reed.
- 28 Raised in Caruthersville, Missouri, from the age of six months,
- 29 Reed was educated in local public schools before attending the
- 30 Columbia Military Academy in Middle Tennessee, graduating in 1946.
- 31 Fascinated by flight, one of his great regrets was being too young
- 32 to fly combat missions in World War II. He joined the Air Force
- 33 ROTC at the University of Missouri, where he earned a degree in
- 34 economics in 1950; and
- 35 WHEREAS, Reed moved to Greenville, in the Mississippi Delta,
- 36 where he became, in the words of The New York Times, "one of the
- 37 ablest businessmen in the South." With boarding-school classmate,
- 38 Barthell Joseph, he founded the firm of Reed-Joseph International,
- 39 an innovative agricultural equipment business that also pioneered
- 40 the American use of Belgian deterrence technology to keep
- 41 predatory and dangerous birds away from farms and airports,
- 42 an enterprise Reed brought to the United States after reading
- 43 about the business in Belgium and then flying to Europe to buy the
- 44 company; and

- WHEREAS, in 1957 he married Julia Brooks, known as Judy, a
- 46 native of Nashville and the child of the Belle Meade family. The
- 47 couple had three children: the writer Julia Evans Reed
- 48 (1960-2020); Reynolds Crews Reed (1968-2019); and Clarke Thomas
- 49 Reed, Jr., who, with Mrs. Reed, survives his father. Reed is also
- 50 survived by granddaughters Brooks Henke (Bryan) and Evans Reed;
- 51 nephew Brooks Corzine (Frannie); and two great grandchildren. The
- 52 family wishes to acknowledge with deep gratitude Frank Liger, a
- 53 faithful employee of forty years, and also Tara Stewart for the
- 54 past four years; and
- 55 WHEREAS, the Reeds' house on Bayou Road in Greenville became
- 56 a kind of conservative salon, a stopping-off point for visiting
- 57 politicians and journalists; and
- 58 WHEREAS, Reed loved history, politics, the Presbyterian
- 59 Church, Doe's steaks, the telephone, lunches at Greenville's Jim's
- 60 Café, good whiskey, National Review, Mississippi wildlife-he was
- 61 an ardent conservationist-a well-cut suit, and the market
- 62 philosophy of Adam Smith; and
- WHEREAS, in many ways he willed the Mississippi GOP into
- 64 being, helping to deliver a unified Southern vote for Richard
- 65 Nixon over Nelson Rockefeller of New York in 1968-an achievement
- 66 Nixon rewarded by reportedly directing aides to "clear it with
- 67 Clarke" when matters of Southern politics and patronage came up;
- 68 and



- 69 WHEREAS, Reed's most notable hour upon the national stage
- 70 came in 1976, the year Ronald Reagan challenged the incumbent
- 71 President Gerald R. Ford for the Republican presidential
- 72 nomination. It was a closely fought contest, and the Mississippi
- 73 delegation, led by Reed, was in the balance as the GOP convention
- 74 met in Kansas City. Heavily courted by the White House, the Reeds
- 75 were among the guests at the Fords' state dinner for Queen
- 76 Elizabeth II during the bicentennial celebrations leading up to
- 77 the convention. Reed chose to support the president rather than
- 78 the more conservative Reagan, a move that was among the factors
- 79 that enabled Ford to prevail; and
- 80 WHEREAS, he was friends with Mississippi's first Republican
- 81 Governor since Reconstruction, Kirk Fordice, who was elected in
- 82 1991. Fordice had served on the state GOP committee with Clarke.
- 83 He kept trying to build the party and elect Republicans, starting
- 84 in 1968 when there were virtually none in office through the
- 85 Reagan years, through the Bush presidents, and on to Donald Trump.
- 86 He saw the GOP in Mississippi go from virtually no elected offices
- 87 to majorities at every level. He persisted right to the end, ever
- 88 the optimist; and
- 89 WHEREAS, "President, senators, congressmen, and governors
- 90 depended on this political pioneer for counsel and leadership,"
- 91 Karl Rove said. "He had a broad smile, a twinkle in his eye and a
- 92 talent for friendship. He made politics not only consequential

93 but interesting and fun. The light that brightened man

- 94 political backroom and convention hall is gone."
- 95 WHEREAS, Clarke Reed's life honored both the Republican Party
- 96 and this great state that he loved and served:
- 97 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
- 98 MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That
- 99 we do hereby memorialize the influential life and career of
- 100 Mississippi political pioneer and longtime Chairman of the
- 101 Mississippi Republican Party, Clarke Thomas Reed of Greenville,
- 102 Mississippi, and extend the sincerest condolences of the
- 103 Legislature on his passing and commend his service to his nation
- 104 and his state.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution be presented to
- 106 the surviving family of Clarke Thomas Reed, forwarded to the
- 107 President of the United States, the Governor of the State of
- 108 Mississippi and to members of Mississippi's Congressional
- 109 delegation and be made available to the Capitol Press Corps.
