SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 533

2 3 4	MISSISSIPPI METHODIST HOSPITAL AND REHABILITATION CENTER FOR 50 YEARS OF RESTORING ABILITIES AND HOPE TO THOSE WHO HAVE EXPERIENCED DISABLING ILLNESSES AND INJURIES.
5	WHEREAS, Mississippi Methodist Hospital and Rehabilitation
6	Center (Methodist Rehabilitation), a nonprofit freestanding
7	comprehensive rehabilitation hospital located in Jackson,
8	Mississippi, has served the citizens of Mississippi and beyond
9	with unwavering dedication for 50 years, offering hope, healing,
10	and restored independence to hundreds of thousands of patients
11	with brain and spinal injuries, stroke, and other neurological and
12	orthopedic conditions; and
13	WHEREAS, the concept for Methodist Rehabilitation Center and
14	the need for such a facility were first discussed in 1955, 15
15	years before ground was broken on the current facility. After
16	attending a series of vocational rehabilitation seminars, the late
17	Dr. Jesse L. Wofford and Frank Hart began to push for a
18	rehabilitation facility in Mississippi. In 1968, a permanent

board of trustees was named. Authorized by the University of

- 20 Mississippi Medical Center, the Mississippi Methodist Conference
- 21 and the Mississippi Department of Vocational Rehabilitation,
- 22 Methodist Rehabilitation Center would be guided by the board,
- 23 comprised of Chairman Earl R. Wilson, Vice Chairman Hilton Ladner,
- 24 Secretary Dean M. Miller, Dan Breland, Frank E. Hart, Sr., Dr.
- 25 Jesse L. Wofford, the Reverend Robert Kates, William H. Mounger,
- 26 the Reverend Harold Peden and John H. Webb, Jr. When the first
- 27 shovel of dirt was turned on December 8, 1970, and construction of
- 28 the Center began, none present could have imagined the
- 29 accomplishments the facility would amass in its first
- 30 half-century; and
- 31 WHEREAS, recognizing Mississippi's critical lack of
- 32 rehabilitative care facilities for catastrophic injury patients,
- 33 including those with strokes, brain injuries, and spinal cord
- 34 injuries, the founders of Methodist Rehabilitation established the
- 35 institution to fill this void and prevent patients from seeking
- 36 treatment out of state; and
- 37 WHEREAS, since admitting its first patient on May 5, 1975,
- 38 Methodist Rehabilitation stands unparalleled in its field and has
- 39 become a place where miracles happen-where patients who once
- 40 believed they would never walk again are walking, where those who
- 41 thought they would never work again are earning a living, and
- 42 where individuals who once faced a lifetime in a hospital are now
- 43 living independently and thriving in their communities; and

44	WHEREAS, over the past five decades, Methodist Rehabilitation
45	expanded the hospital's capacity from 60 beds to 124 beds, adding
46	four floors and has continually expanded its innovative services
47	to improve access to care, including specialized outpatient
48	therapy clinics and statewide orthotics and prosthetics clinics,
49	which help patients regain function and reclaim their futures; and
50	WHEREAS, in 1998, Methodist Rehabilitation established the
51	Center for Neuroscience and Neurological Recovery, pioneering
52	important research to improve treatment outcomes, producing
53	several hundred publications disseminated worldwide, and advancing
54	the global understanding of rehabilitation medicine; and
55	WHEREAS, in 2004, Methodist Rehabilitation opened the
56	Methodist Specialty Care Center, Mississippi's only facility
57	dedicated to the long-term care of adults with severe
58	disabilities, providing a breathtakingly beautiful and efficient
59	home where residents can thrive, remain active, and enjoy life
60	under the compassionate care of skilled professionals; and
61	WHEREAS, Methodist Rehabilitation was the first hospital in
62	Mississippi to be named one of America's Best Hospitals by $U.S.$
63	News & World Report, and was recognized a second time, a testament
64	to its excellence in rehabilitative medicine; and
65	WHEREAS, Methodist Rehabilitation has provided advanced
66	clinical educational opportunities for thousands of students,
67	including residency training for physicians and physical

- 69 and occupational therapy Capstone Project students; and
- 70 WHEREAS, Methodist Rehabilitation's contributions to
- 71 Mississippi's health care landscape have been truly
- 72 transformational, setting a high standard for rehabilitation
- 73 medicine and ensuring that individuals with disabilities receive
- 74 the care, resources, and support necessary to lead fulfilling
- 75 lives; and
- 76 WHEREAS, Methodist Rehabilitation has upheld its mission as a
- 77 nonprofit hospital, continuously reinvesting in innovative
- 78 technology and clinical programs, ensuring that individuals
- 79 receive the specialized care they need regardless of their
- 80 financial circumstances; and
- WHEREAS, it is with great pride we recognize and commend
- 82 Mississippi Methodist Hospital and Rehabilitation Center for 50
- 83 years of extraordinary contributions to the state of Mississippi
- 84 and for its continued commitment to restoring ability and hope to
- 85 all those it serves:
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
- 87 MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That
- 88 we do hereby recognize and commend Mississippi Methodist Hospital
- 89 and Rehabilitation Center for five decades of restoring
- 90 independence and improving lives, and extend our deepest gratitude
- 91 to the physicians, researchers, health care professionals, staff,

- 92 and volunteers who have made this institution a beacon of hope and
- 93 healing for so many.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution be presented to
- 95 the Director and the Board of Directors of Mississippi Methodist
- 96 Hospital and Rehabilitation Center, and made available to the
- 97 Capitol Press Corps.
