## SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 27

- A RESOLUTION EXTENDING THE SINCEREST SYMPATHY OF THE MISSISSIPPI SENATE TO THE SURVIVING FAMILY OF NATIONAL REPUBLICAN
- 3 COMMITTEE WOMAN JEANNE CARTER LUCKEY, OF LOUISVILLE, MISSISSIPPI,
- 4 AND COMMENDING HER SERVICE TO HER COMMUNITY AND HER STATE.
- 5 WHEREAS, Jeanne Carter Luckey died November 7, 2024,
- 6 completing a life of unyielding hope, strength, and generosity;
- 7 and
- 8 WHEREAS, Jeanne Carter Luckey was born in Louisville,
- 9 Mississippi. She put down roots on the Mississippi Gulf Coast,
- 10 where she built her life around community and service with her
- 11 husband of 40 years, Alwyn Luckey; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Jeanne attended Biloxi public schools and went on to
- 13 the University of Mississippi, graduating in 1983 with a
- 14 Bachelor's Degree in Education. After graduation, she taught
- 15 teens and young adults with intellectual and developmental
- 16 disabilities in Ocean Springs public schools. She later earned
- 17 her Master's in Special Education at the University of Southern
- 18 Mississippi; and

- 19 WHEREAS, Jeanne married Alwyn, her high school sweetheart and
- 20 the love of her life, at the First Presbyterian Church of Biloxi
- 21 on August 4, 1984. Their family grew to include daughters, Laurel
- 22 Luckey and Taylor, and two adored grandchildren, Cornelius and
- 23 Toxie Ray Brennan; and
- 24 WHEREAS, in 2005, a devastating car accident left her
- 25 paralyzed just days after Hurricane Katrina. Despite the physical
- 26 and emotional challenges of her new reality, she demonstrated time
- 27 and again unwavering faith, determination, and her characteristic
- 28 generosity of spirit. She provided wisdom for others facing
- 29 similar journeys, often logging into support forums to offer
- 30 comfort and direction to people across the country navigating a
- 31 new life with spinal cord injuries; and
- 32 WHEREAS, Jeanne was deeply engaged in her community. She
- 33 served on the boards of the Walter Anderson Museum of Art, Homes
- 34 of Grace, the Salvation Army, the Montessori School of Ocean
- 35 Springs, the Gulf Coast Debutante Society, and the Gulf Coast
- 36 YMCA. She was also a member of the Order of Eastern Star and the
- 37 P.E.O.; and
- 38 WHEREAS, Jeanne served as Mississippi's Republican National
- 39 Committee Woman and President of the Mississippi Federation of
- 40 Republican Women; and
- 41 WHEREAS, Jeanne also served as the vice-chair of the Board of
- 42 Trustees for the Institutions of Higher Learning (IHL). During
- 43 her tenure, she chaired the IHL ADA Compliance Committee, which

44	gave her the opportunity to draw from her own experience to seek
45	equitable access to education for persons with disabilities; and
46	WHEREAS, Jeanne was an expert home decorator, football
47	tailgate hostess, and self-proclaimed Disney World enthusiast; and
48	WHEREAS, she is survived by her loving husband, Alwyn;
49	beloved daughters, Laurel Luckey and Taylor (Luke) Brennan;
50	precious grandchildren, Cornelius and Toxie Ray Brennan; mother,
51	Janice Elaine Carter; siblings, Raymond D. Carter, Michael (Gwen)
52	Carter, and Janice (Greg) Stevens; numerous nieces and nephews;
53	the Bensons, who were like a second family to Jeanne; and
54	countless friends who will carry her memory forward:
