SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 52

A RESOLUTION COMMEMORATING AND CELEBRATING THE 155TH

2 ANNIVERSARY OF THE HONORABLE HIRAM RHODES REVELS' MONUMENTAL ACHIEVEMENT AS THE FIRST AFRICAN AMERICAN ELECTED TO, SWORN IN, AND SEATED IN THE UNITED STATES SENATE, ELECTION TO THE 5 MISSISSIPPI STATE SENATE, NINETEENTH MISSISSIPPI SECRETARY OF 6 STATE, AND FIRST PRESIDENT OF ALCORN STATE UNIVERSITY AND 7 ACKNOWLEDGING THE HISTORICAL LEGACY OF HIS LIFETIME OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND SERVICE TO THE GREAT STATE OF MISSISSIPPI AND 8 9 THE ENTIRE NATION. 10 WHEREAS, this year marks the 155th Anniversary of the 11 election of the Honorable Hiram Rhodes Revels, Mississippian and 12 the first African American to serve in the United States Senate from February 1870 to March 1871; and 13 14 WHEREAS, he was born a free man on September 27, 1827, in Fayetteville, North Carolina, the son of a Baptist preacher; and 15 WHEREAS, early in his career, he worked as a skilled barber, 16 17 until he was moved to teach the masses the great word of the Lord, 18 which motivated him to attend seminary and become a prominent 19 pastor ordained within the African Methodist Episcopal Church

(A.M.E.); and

21	WHEREAS, Revel's natural leadership qualities became more
22	apparent when he organized two black regiments for the Union Army
23	during the onset of the Civil War and served as Chaplain during
24	the siege and ensuing Battle of Vicksburg in 1863; and
25	WHEREAS, after the war, he continued his career in the clergy
26	and settled in Natchez in 1866 with his wife and daughters, and
27	became an alderman for the City of Natchez in 1868, gaining a
28	reputation as a respected member of the community due to his keen
29	intellect and eloquent oratorical skills; and
30	WHEREAS, in 1869, he won a seat in the Mississippi State
31	Senate as a Republican representing Adams County and was known to
32	be very influential with his fellow legislators, especially after
33	he gave a powerful prayer during the opening session of the Senate
34	on January 11, 1870; and
35	WHEREAS, impressed by Hiram's great natural ability and
36	superior attainments, Republicans in the Mississippi Legislature
37	overwhelmingly voted 81 to 15 to elect Hiram Revels to the state's
38	United States Senate to fill the remainder of the term of former
39	United States Senator Albert Gallatin Brown; and
40	WHEREAS, despite many attempts over three days to block his
41	installment, the U.S. Senate voted 48 to 8 to seat him, and Revels
42	was sworn into office on February 25, 1870, breaking the glass
43	ceiling for African Americans in the United States Congress; and
44	WHEREAS, after his Senate term ended March 3, 1871, Revels
45	achieved another first when he became the first president of

46	Alcorn University (now Alcorn State University) in Claiborne
47	County, Mississippi, the first land-grant institution for African
48	Americans in the nation; and
49	WHEREAS, during a leave of absence from his university
50	duties, he served a temporary appointment as the first African
51	American and 19th Secretary of State of Mississippi in 1873; and
52	WHEREAS, having traveled an uncommon path to reach the
53	pinnacle of sustained success that garnered him a reputation of
54	excellence and historic prominence, Senator Revels' rise ushered
55	in a new era of political activism for African American
56	legislators; and
57	WHEREAS, his uncanny skill and ability to master the
58	mechanics of brokering relationships with both his political
59	allies and antagonists is a blueprint used by those who desire to
60	serve their constituency during modern political times; and
61	WHEREAS, Senator Hiram Rhodes Revels' service on Capitol Hill
62	in 1870 still ranks among the greatest landmarks in American
63	political history, even though politics and Capitol Hill have
64	undergone extensive changes during the past 155 years; and
65	WHEREAS, recognized for his years of service in the
66	governmental arena, Senator Revels' successes are undoubtedly
67	attributable to his immense talent and consummate professionalism,
68	which are further highlighted by the praise he received from the
69	press for his well-crafted speeches and diplomatic approach to a

71 WHEREAS, Revels retired from Alcorn A&M College and his 72 political life in 1882, but continued his religious works by 73 ministering at local A.M.E. churches and teaching Theology at Shaw 74 University (now Rust College) in Holly Springs until his death on 75 January 16, 1901; and 76 WHEREAS, we pay homage to an individual of Senator Revels' 77 caliber, who served as a trailblazing pioneer, and whose historic 78 contributions merit honor and respect: 79 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF 80 MISSISSIPPI, That we do hereby commemorate and celebrate the life 81 and legacy of the Honorable Hiram Rhodes Revels on the occasion of the 155th Anniversary of his monumental 1870 election to the 82 United States Senate as the first African American to serve in 83 Congress, election to the Mississippi State Senate, nineteenth 84 Mississippi Secretary of State, and first President of Alcorn 85 86 State University, and acknowledge the historical legacy of his 87 lifetime of accomplishments and service to the great State of Mississippi and the entire nation. 88 89 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution be presented to the descendants of Hiram Rhodes Revels, forwarded to the Board of 90

Trustees of the Mississippi Department of Archives and History,

and made available to the members of the Capitol Press Corps.
