## SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 70

| 1<br>2<br>3<br>4 | A RESOLUTION COMMENDING AND CONGRATULATING FORMER OLE MISS TRACK-AND-FIELD STAR AND OXFORD NATIVE SAM KENDRICKS FOR EARNING A SILVER MEDAL IN THE MEN'S POLE VAULT EVENT AT THE 2024 OLYMPICS IN PARIS AND FOR HIS OUTSTANDING NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP CAREER. |

| 5                | WHEREAS, former Ole Miss track-and-field star and Oxford   |
| 6                | native Sam Kendricks earned a Silver Medal in the men's pole vault   |
| 7                | event on August 5, 2024, at the 2024 Olympics in Paris. Kendricks  |
| 8                | cleared a distance of 5.95 meters, his season's best. His  |
| 9                | personal best is 6.06 meters; and  |
| 10               | WHEREAS, Samuel Hathorn Kendricks is a three-time indoor and   |
| 11               | six-time outdoor National Champion (2014-2019), the 2016 Olympics  |
| 12               | Bronze and 2024 Olympics Silver Medalist, and the 2017 and 2019  |
| 13               | World Champion. In 2019, Kendricks set the American pole vault   |
| 14               | record at 6.06 m, tying with Steve Hooker for fourth all time. He  |
| 15               | later won the Gold Medal at the World Championships in Doha,   |
| 16               | Qatar; and   |
| 17               | WHEREAS, Kendricks vaulted for Oxford High School in his   |

hometown of Oxford, Mississippi, leading his team to the 2009

MHSAA 5A State Championship. He vaulted 17 ft. 0 in. (5.18 m) to

- 20 set the then-state record, later broken in 2023 by his brother
- 21 John Scott with a vault of 17 ft. 1 in. (5.2 m). Sam won the
- 22 state meet outdoors in 2010 and 2011, and indoors in 2011. He
- 23 also lettered in cross country and soccer. In 2011, he was named
- 24 the Gatorade Boys' High School Track-and-Field Athlete of the Year
- 25 for Mississippi; and
- 26 WHEREAS, while vaulting for the University of Mississippi,
- 27 Kendricks won the 2013 and 2014 NCAA Championships. He broke both
- 28 Ole Miss Rebels pole vault records as a freshman. Kendricks
- 29 announced that he would be turning pro in 2014; and
- 30 WHEREAS, Kendricks set his personal best of 5.86 m (19 ft.
- 31 2-1/2 in.) at the indoor 2015 Reno Pole Vault Summit. Kendrick
- 32 uses a hand hold at 15 ft. 5 in. (4.69 m) and from his performance
- 33 in Reno claims the "Push-off" World Record at 4 ft. 6 in. (1.37
- 34 m). He won the men's pole vault at the 2015 U.S. Outdoor
- 35 Championships in 5.75 m (18 ft. 10-1/4 in.). He won the prelims
- 36 of the 2015 World Championships in Athletics Men's Pole Vault,
- 37 and finished 9th in 5.65 m (18 ft. 6-1/4 in.); and
- 38 WHEREAS, after setting a personal best outdoors at the IAAF
- 39 World Challenge in Beijing, at 5.92 m (19 ft. 5 in.), Kendricks
- 40 won the U.S. Olympic Trials at 5.91 m (19 ft. 4-1/2 in.). At the
- 41 2016 Summer Olympics, he won the Bronze Medal. Kendricks also
- 42 garnered attention during the Olympics when he stopped mid run
- 43 during a pole vault attempt to stand at attention while "The
- 44 Star-Spangled Banner" was played; and

- WHEREAS, on June 24, 2017, Kendricks became the 22nd person
- 46 to join the Six Meters Club by vaulting exactly 6.00 m (19 ft. 8
- 47 in.) while winning the 2017 USA Outdoor Track-and-Field
- 48 Championships in Sacramento, California. On July 27, 2019,
- 49 Kendricks set the American pole vault record by jumping 6.06 m.
- 50 Kendricks placed second in the U.S. Olympic trials at 5.91 m (19
- 51 ft. 2-1/4 in.) tied with KC Lightfoot; however, he tested positive
- 52 for COVID-19 in the Olympic Village, and had to withdraw from the
- 53 2020 Summer Olympics as a result, missing the pole vault
- 54 competition; and
- 55 WHEREAS, leading up to the 2024 U.S. Olympic trials final,
- 56 Kendricks stated that he might be inclined to forgo the 2024
- 57 Olympics after his experience from Tokyo 2020 when he claimed that
- 58 his positive COVID-19 test had been a false positive and the USOC
- 59 had done nothing to fight on his behalf. On June 23, 2024, he won
- 60 his 7th outdoor (11th overall) U.S. National Pole Vault
- 61 Championship by clearing 5.92 m (19 ft. 5 in.) and earned an
- 62 automatic bid for the Olympics. After the competition was over,
- 63 he confirmed that he would be going to Paris; and
- 64 WHEREAS, in the 2024 Olympic Men's Pole Vault final, he
- 65 claimed the Silver Medal for Team USA by clearing a height of 5.95
- 66 m (19 ft. 6-1/4 in.). He was defeated by Armand "Mondo" Duplantis
- 67 who set a new world record at 6.25 m (20 ft. 6 in.). With more
- 68 than 77,000 breathless people zeroed in on him every other event
- 69 had finished by 10 p.m., which meant pole vault got all the

- 70 attention. Duplantis' vault set off an eruption in Stade de
- 71 France, led by Sam Kendricks, who went streaking across the track
- 72 to celebrate with his friend. "Pole vault breeds brotherhood,"
- 73 Kendricks said of the celebration with Duplantis. The event went
- 74 on for more than three hours, with vaulters passing time chatting
- 75 with each other between jumps; and
- 76 WHEREAS, it is with great pride that we join the
- 77 track-and-field sports world in recognizing an outstanding
- 78 Mississippi athlete who has brought honor to his family, his
- 79 hometown, his university and to the State of Mississippi:
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
- 81 MISSISSIPPI, That we do hereby commend and congratulate former Ole
- 82 Miss Track-and-Field Star and Oxford native Sam Kendricks for
- 83 earning a Silver Medal in the men's pole vault event at the 2024
- 84 Olympics in Paris and for his outstanding national championship
- 85 career; and extend the best wishes of the Mississippi Senate to
- 86 Sam for future success.
- 87 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution be presented to
- 88 Sam Kendricks, forwarded to the Athletic Director of the
- 89 University of Mississippi and Oxford High School, and be made
- 90 available to the Capitol Press Corps.
