## SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 118

1 A RESOLUTION EXTENDING THE CONDOLENCES OF THE MISSISSIPPI 2 SENATE TO THE SURVIVING FAMILY OF LEGENDARY MERIDIAN TELEVISION 3 NEWS BROADCASTER JOHN WESLEY JOHNSON AND COMMENDING HIS CAREER OF PUBLIC SERVICE. 5 WHEREAS, we join local and state leaders and the citizens of central Mississippi and Alabama in mourning the passing of 6 7 legendary former WTOK News Director John Wesley Johnson. Mr. Johnson was a Meridian, Mississippi, legend who worked at WTOK for 8 9 over 32 years. His last day at the station was December 30, 2016; 10 and WHEREAS, a member of the Class of 1968 at Rust College, John 11 12 Wesley Johnson was a news director at WTOK-TV since 1985; and 13 WHEREAS, he earned a degree in social science from Rust 14 College, where he was initiated as a member of Omega Psi Phi 15 Fraternity, Inc. He then attended graduate school at the 16 University of Iowa, earning a master of fine arts degree in 17 theater; and

WHEREAS, prior to getting into broadcasting, Johnson taught

for nine years at Rust College. He taught speech communications,

- 20 the humanities and stagecraft. He also directed plays for the
- 21 Rust College Theater Guild; and
- 22 WHEREAS, Johnson served on several national, state and local
- 23 boards during his career. He was president of the Board of
- 24 Trustees at Meridian Community College in 2010-11. He was also a
- 25 member of the Community Foundation of East Mississippi and West
- 26 Alabama. In 2006, he was inducted into the Mississippi Associated
- 27 Press Broadcasters Hall of Fame, the direct result of his work in
- 28 leading WTOK-TV's top-rated news department; and
- 29 WHEREAS, for thirty-two years, John Johnson came into our
- 30 living rooms every single night. He was the face of Newscenter
- 31 11, where he was and will always be one of the city's most
- 32 recognizable faces. Local and state leaders proclaimed December
- 33 15th as John Johnson Day in 2016 when the mayor of Meridian gave
- 34 Johnson the key to the city; and
- 35 WHEREAS, John Johnson's influence stretched far beyond the
- 36 people who saw him every night on television, and it went far
- 37 beyond the borders of Mississippi and Alabama. John gave
- 38 countless people their first opportunity in the television news
- 39 business, and many of them have gone on to much larger cities to
- 40 continue their careers; and
- 41 WHEREAS, John stepped away from the anchor desk in 2011, but
- 42 continued to lead the news department as news director with
- 43 integrity, a trait for which he was best known. It was not about
- 44 getting the story first with John; it was always about serving the
