House Amendments to Senate Bill No. 3033

TO THE SECRETARY OF THE SENATE:

THIS IS TO INFORM YOU THAT THE HOUSE HAS ADOPTED THE AMENDMENTS SET OUT BELOW:

AMENDMENT NO. 1

Amend by striking all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

5	SECTION 1. The following sum, or so much thereof as may be
6	necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any money in the State
7	General Fund not otherwise appropriated, for the purpose of
8	defraying the expenses of the State Department of Agriculture and
9	Commerce, including the Divisions of Support, Plant Industry,
10	Farmers Central Market, Fair Commission, Livestock Coliseum,
11	Industrial Showcase, and Trade Mart Building, for the fiscal year
12	beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2026
13	\$ 9,462,604.00.
14	SECTION 2. The following sum, or so much thereof as may be
15	necessary, is hereby authorized for expenditure out of any special

15 necessary, is nereby authorized for expenditure out of any special 16 source funds, which are collected by or otherwise become available 17 for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the State Department 18 of Agriculture and Commerce, including the Divisions of Support 19 and Plant Industry, Farmers Central Market, Fair Commission, 20 Livestock Coliseum, Industrial Showcase, Agriculture Museum, the

27 Agriculture and Forestry Museum.

28 **SECTION 3.** Of the funds appropriated under the provisions of 29 this act, the following positions are authorized:

30 AUTHORIZED HEADCOUNT:

31 Permanent: 226

32 Time-Limited: 13

33 With the funds herein appropriated, it shall be the agency's responsibility to make certain that funds required for Personal 34 Services for Fiscal Year 2027 do not exceed Fiscal Year 2026 funds 35 36 appropriated for that purpose unless programs or positions are 37 added to the agency's Fiscal Year 2026 budget by the Mississippi Legislature. The Legislature shall determine the agency's 38 39 personal services appropriation, which the State Personnel Board 40 shall publish. The agency's personal services appropriation may 41 consist of restricted funds for approved vacancies for Fiscal Year 42 2026 that may be utilized to fill vacant Fiscal Year 2025 43 headcount. It shall be the agency's responsibility to ensure that the funds provided for vacancies are used to increase headcount 44 and not for promotions, title changes, in-range salary adjustments 45 46 or any other mechanism for increasing salaries for current

47 employees. It is the Legislature's intention that no employee 48 salary falls below the minimum salary established by the 49 Mississippi State Personnel Board.

50 Additionally, the State Personnel Board shall determine and 51 publish the projected annualized payroll costs based on current 52 employees. It shall be the responsibility of the agency head to 53 ensure that actual personnel expenditures for Fiscal Year 2026 do 54 not exceed the data provided by the Legislative Budget Office. If 55 the agency's Fiscal Year 2026 projected cost exceeds the 56 annualized costs, no salary actions shall be processed by the 57 State Personnel Board except for new hires determined to be 58 essential for the agency.

59 Any transfers or escalations shall be made in accordance with 60 the terms, conditions, and procedures established by law or allowable under the terms set forth within this act. The State 61 62 Personnel Board shall not escalate positions without written 63 approval from the Department of Finance and Administration. The 64 Department of Finance and Administration shall not provide written 65 approval to escalate any funds for salaries and/or positions 66 without proof of availability of new or additional funds above the 67 appropriated level.

No general funds authorized to be expended herein shall be used to replace federal funds and/or other special funds used for salaries authorized under the provisions of this act and which are withdrawn and no longer available.

None of the funds herein appropriated shall be used in violation of the Internal Revenue Service's Publication 15-A relating to the reporting of income paid to contract employees, as interpreted by the Office of the State Auditor.

76 **SECTION 4.** In addition to all other sums herein 77 appropriated, the following sum, or so much thereof as may be 78 necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any money in the State 79 Treasury to the credit of the Beaver Control Program or from any 80 other special source funds made available to the Beaver Control Program, to the Department of Agriculture and Commerce for the 81 support of the Beaver Control Program for the fiscal year 82 83 beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2026.....\$ 1,100,000.00. 84

85 Of the special funds authorized in this section, Six Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$650,000.00) shall be derived from funds 86 87 received from the Mississippi Department of Transportation and 88 from fees charged private persons/organizations, and Two Hundred 89 Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00) shall be derived from funds 90 received from the State Forestry Commission. A county in order to 91 participate must pay up to Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars 92 (\$7,500.00), and if any county wishes to pay any additional funds 93 than provided, those funds may be used only in said county.

94 SECTION 5. Of the funds appropriated in Section 2 of this 95 act, the following sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary, 96 shall be derived from the Mississippi Department of Agriculture

97 and Commerce - Fruit and Vegetable Revolving Fund, for the purpose 98 of defraying the expenses of the department....\$ 600,000.00.

99 SECTION 6. Of the funds appropriated in Section 2 of this act, Seventy-four Thousand Eight Hundred Five Dollars (\$74,805.00) 100 101 shall be provided for the support of the Mississippi Egg Marketing 102 Board.

103 SECTION 7. In compliance with the "Mississippi Performance 104 Budget and Strategic Planning Act of 1994," it is the intent of 105 the Legislature that the funds provided herein shall be utilized 106 in the most efficient and effective manner possible to achieve the 107 intended mission of this agency. Based on the funding authorized, 108 this agency shall make every effort to attain the targeted 109 performance measures provided below:

195	SECTION 8. The funds appropriated and authorized to be
196	expended under the provisions of this act shall be expended for
197	the purpose of defraying all expenses incurred by the State
198	Department of Agriculture and Commerce in the operation of all
199	programs and activities (except operation of the State Lime

201 Inspection Stations and Fire Ant Program) authorized to be 202 conducted and carried on by said department; including, but not 203 limited to: the administration of the Feed, Fertilizer and Dairy 204 Act; the Weights and Measures Act; the Meat Inspection Act of 205 1968; the Mississippi Pure Seed Law; and the following additional 206 programs and activities: enforcement of the egg law; publication 207 and distribution of the Mississippi Market Bulletin, agricultural 208 statistics, market news service at Stoneville, Mississippi; and 209 inspection, grading and certifying of fruits, vegetables, hay, grain, meat and meat products, milk and dairy products, pecans, 210 211 seed and syrup.

212 The Mississippi Department of Agriculture and SECTION 9. 213 Commerce, with the assistance of the State Department of Audit and 214 the Department of Finance and Administration, shall establish a 215 budgeted enterprise funds for all "for-profit" activities related 216 to the Mississippi Agriculture and Forestry Museum. The funds 217 shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and regulations prescribed by the Department 218 219 of Finance and Administration.

220 SECTION 10. Of the funds provided by the provisions of this 221 act, it is the intent of the Legislature that not more than Thirty 222 Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) shall be expended for the 223 Mississippi Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Pilot Program, which 224 shall be established by the State Department of Agriculture and 225 Commerce to serve senior citizens above sixty (60) years of age 226 who fall within one hundred thirty percent (130%) of the poverty S. 227 level. The Commissioner of Agriculture may promulgate rules and 228 regulations necessary to implement the Mississippi Senior Farmers' 229 Market Nutrition Pilot Program.

SECTION 11. Of the funds appropriated in Section 2 of this act, Four Hundred Thousand (\$400,000.00), is provided for matching funds required for the Mississippi Healthy Food and Families Program as established in Senate Bill No. 2077, 2022 Regular Session.

235 SECTION 12. It is the intention of the Legislature that 236 whenever two (2) or more bids are received by this agency for the 237 purchase of commodities or equipment, and whenever all things 238 stated in such received bids are equal with respect to price, 239 quality and service, the Mississippi Industries for the Blind 240 shall be given preference. A similar preference shall be given to the Mississippi Industries for the Blind whenever purchases are 241 242 made without competitive bids.

243 SECTION 13. It is the intention of the Legislature that the 244 Department of Agriculture and Commerce shall maintain complete 245 accounting and personnel records related to the expenditure of all 246 funds appropriated under this act and that such records shall be 247 in the same format and level of detail as maintained for Fiscal 248 Year 2025. It is further the intention of the Legislature that 249 the agency's budget request for Fiscal Year 2027 shall be 250 submitted to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee in a format 251 and level of detail comparable to the format and level of detail provided during the Fiscal Year 2026 budget request process. 252

253 SECTION 14. Of the funds appropriated in Section 2 of this 254 act, the following sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is 255 appropriated out of any money in the State Treasury to the credit 256 of the Department of Agriculture and Commerce from the proceeds 257 collected from surety bonds posted under the "Mississippi Grain 258 Warehouse Law" as provided by Section 75-44-1 et seq., Mississippi 259 Code of 1972 and the "Mississippi Grain Dealers Law of 1978" as 260 provided by Section 75-45-301 et seq., Mississippi Code of 1972 261 for the purpose of paying claimants under such laws from the 262 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025, and ending

263 June 30, 2026.....\$ 1,100,000.00.

SECTION 15. Of the funds appropriated in Section 2 of this act, Seven Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$750,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is provided for operational expenditures at the Mississippi Agriculture and Forestry Museum. The department may expend these funds for improvements to the museum and for marketing and promotion programs for the museum in a manner consistent with the museum's historical purpose.

271 SECTION 16. The Mississippi Department of Agriculture and 272 Commerce is authorized to accept and expend any grant, donation, 273 or contribution from any individual, public, or private 274 organization, or government entity for purposes of defraying the 275 operational costs of the department. Such grants, donations or 276 contributions shall be received and expended under the rules and 277 regulations of the Department of Finance and Administration in a

278 manner consistent with the escalation of federal funds not to 279 exceed One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00).

280 The Commissioner of Agriculture shall notify, in writing, the 281 Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, 282 the Chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, the Chairman 283 of the House Appropriations A Committee, and the Legislative 284 Budget Office of any escalation. The written notification shall include the justification for the escalation of funds, the amount, 285 286 and how the funds will be used. This written notification shall 287 be sent on or before the fifteenth day of the month prior to the 288 effective date of the escalation.

289 **SECTION 17.** The money herein appropriated shall be paid by 290 the State Treasurer out of any money in the State Treasury to the 291 credit of the proper fund or funds as set forth in this act, upon 292 warrants issued by the State Fiscal Officer; and the State Fiscal 293 Officer shall issue his warrants upon requisitions signed by the 294 proper person, officer or officers in the manner provided by law. 295 SECTION 18. This act shall take effect and be in force from 296 and after July 1, 2025.
