Lost AMENDMENT NO 1 PROPOSED TO

Senate Bill No. 2768

Amend by striking all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

26 SECTION 1. Section 9-7-1, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 27 reenacted as follows:

9-7-1. A circuit judge shall be elected for and from each 28 29 circuit court district and the listing of individual precincts 30 shall be those precincts as they existed on October 1, 1990. He 31 may hold court in any other district with the consent of the judge thereof, when in their opinion the public interest may require. 32 33 The terms of all circuit judges hereafter elected shall begin on 34 the first day of January 1931 and their terms of office shall 35 continue for four (4) years. A circuit judge shall be a resident

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36 of the district in which he or she serves but shall not be 37 required to be a resident of a subdistrict if the district is 38 divided into subdistricts.

39 SECTION 2. Section 9-7-3, Mississippi Code of 1972, is

Court shall be held in circuit court districts consisting of a single county on 47 48 the same dates state agencies and political subdivisions are open for business excluding legal holidays. The dates upon which terms 49 shall commence and the number of days for which the terms shall 50 51 continue in circuit court districts consisting of more than one 52 (1) county shall be set by order of the circuit court judge in accordance with the provisions of subsection (2) of this section. 53 54 A matter in court may extend past a term if the interest of 55 justice so requires.

(2) An order establishing the commencement and continuation of terms of court for each of the counties within a circuit court district consisting of more than one (1) county shall be entered annually and not later than October 1 of the year immediately preceding the calendar year for which the terms of court are to

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61 become effective. Notice of the dates upon which the terms of 62 court shall commence and the number of days for which the terms 63 shall continue in each of the counties within a circuit court district shall be posted in the office of the circuit clerk of 64 each county within the district and mailed to the office of the 65 66 Secretary of State for publication and distribution to all 67 Mississippi Bar members. If an order is not timely entered, the terms of court for each of the counties within any circuit court 68 69 district shall remain unchanged for the next calendar year. A 70 certified copy of any order entered under the provisions of this 71 subsection shall, immediately upon the entry thereof, be delivered 72 to the clerk of the board of supervisors in each of the counties 73 within the circuit court district.

74 (3) The number of judges in each circuit court district
75 shall be determined by the Legislature based upon the following
76 criteria:

77 The population of the district; (a) 78 The number of cases filed in the district; (b) 79 The case load of each judge in the district; (C) 80 The geographic area of the district; (d) 81 (e) An analysis of the needs of the district by the 82 court personnel of the district; and 83 (f) Any other appropriate criteria.

84 (4) The Judicial College of the University of Mississippi
85 Law Center and the Administrative Office of Courts shall determine
86 the appropriate:

87 (a) Specific data to be collected as a basis for88 applying the above criteria;

89 (b) Method of collecting and maintaining the specified90 data; and

91 (c) Method of assimilating the specified data.

92 In a district having more than one (1) office of circuit (5)93 judge, there shall be no distinction whatsoever in the powers, 94 duties and emoluments of those offices except that the judge who 95 has been for the longest time continuously a judge of that court 96 or, should no judge have served longer in office than the others, 97 the judge who has been for the longest time a member of The Mississippi Bar, shall be the senior judge. The senior judge 98 99 shall have the right to assign causes and dockets and to set terms 100 in districts consisting of more than one (1) county. A circuit 101 court judge shall have the right to assign criminal matters to 102 county court as provided in Section 9-9-21.
