## SENATE BILL NO. 2618 (As Passed the Senate)

1 AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A TASK FORCE TO STUDY THE DEVELOPMENT AND 3 IMPLEMENTATION OF COMPREHENSIVE EARLY CHILDHOOD SERVICES IN MISSISSIPPI; TO PROVIDE FOR A REPORT OF ITS FINDINGS AND 5 RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE 2000 REGULAR SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 6 7

- BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- <u>SECTION 1.</u> (1) The Legislature finds that: 8
- 9 (a) Studies show that children who experience quality
- comprehensive early childhood services have higher academic and 10
- 11 social ratings by their kindergarten teachers and better
- kindergarten attendance than children who do not; 12
- 13 (b) Participation in quality comprehensive early
- 14 childhood services helps children develop social and pre-academic
- skills that will help them succeed in kindergarten and throughout 15
- 16 their educational experiences;
- (c) Other southeastern states have implemented 17
- 18 pre-kindergarten programs similar to the Georgia Pre-Kindergarten
- Program for four-year-old children, emphasizing growth in language 19
- 20 and literacy, math concepts, science, arts, physical development,
- 21 and personal and social competence.
- (2) There is hereby created a Task Force to Study the 22
- 23 Development and Implementation of Comprehensive Early Childhood
- Services in Mississippi. The task force shall make a report of 2.4
- 25 its findings and recommendations to the Legislature at least
- 26 thirty (30) days prior to the beginning of the 2000 Regular
- 27 Session of the Legislature for implementation in the 2000-2001
- 2.8 school year.

- 70 (4) In the event the Chairman of the Senate or House
- 71 Education or Appropriations Committees is unable to attend any
- 72 meeting of the task force, the vice-chairman of the respective
- 73 committee shall be authorized to attend and vote at such meeting.
- 74 Appointments shall be made within thirty (30) days after passage
- 75 of this act, and, within fifteen (15) days thereafter on a day to
- 76 be designated jointly by the President of the Senate, the Speaker
- 77 of the House and the State Superintendent of Education, the task
- 78 force shall meet and organize by selecting from its membership a
- 79 chairman and a vice-chairmen. The vice-chairmen shall also serve
- 80 as secretary and shall be responsible for keeping all records of
- 81 the task force. A majority of the members of the task force shall
- 82 constitute a quorum. In the selection of its officers and the
- 83 adoption of rules, resolutions and reports, an affirmative vote of
- 84 a majority of the task force shall be required. All members shall
- 85 be notified in writing of all meetings, such notices to be mailed
- 86 at least five (5) days prior to the date on which a meeting is to
- 87 be held.
- 88 (5) Members of the task force who are not legislators shall
- 89 be compensated at the per diem rate authorized by Section 25-3-69,
- 90 Mississippi Code of 1972, and shall be reimbursed in accordance
- 91 with Section 25-3-41, Mississippi Code of 1972, for mileage and
- 92 actual expense incurred in the performance of their duties. Any
- 93 member who is also a state employee shall not be eligible to
- 94 receive per diem compensation. No task force member may incur per

- 95 diem, travel or other expenses unless previously authorized by
- 96 vote, at a meeting of the task force, which action shall be
- 97 recorded in the official minutes of said meeting. Legislative
- 98 members of the committee shall be paid from the contingent expense
- 99 funds of their respective houses in the same amounts as provided
- 100 for committee meetings when the Legislature is not in session;
- 101 however, no per diem or expense for attending meetings of the task
- 102 force will be paid while the Legislature is in session.
- 103 Non-legislative members shall be paid from any funds made
- 104 available to the task force for that purpose.
- 105 (6) The task force is empowered to hire staff independent of
- 106 any agency represented, as well as to utilize clerical and legal
- 107 staff already employed by the State Department of Education, the
- 108 Office of the Governor and the Legislature and any other staff
- 109 assistance made available to it.
- 110 (7) Funding for the task force may be provided from any
- 111 funds that may be appropriated by the Legislature to the State
- 112 Department of Education for that purpose.
- 113 (8) Upon presentation of its report to the 2000 Regular
- 114 Session, the task force shall be dissolved.
- 115 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 116 and after its passage.
