## SENATE BILL NO. 2837 (As Passed the Senate)

- AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 25-3-25, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO
- AUTHORIZE THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF FRANKLIN COUNTY,
- MISSISSIPPI, TO PAY AN ANNUAL SUPPLEMENT TO THE SHERIFF OF THE 3
- 4 COUNTY; TO AUTHORIZE THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF ALCORN COUNTY,
- MISSISSIPPI, TO PAY AN ANNUAL SUPPLEMENT TO THE SHERIFF OF THE 5
- COUNTY; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
- 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 8 SECTION 1. Section 25-3-25, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 9 amended as follows:
- 25-3-25. (1) Except as otherwise provided in subsections 10
- (2) through (9), the salaries of sheriffs of the various counties 11
- are hereby fixed as full compensation for their services. 12
- 13 From and after October 1, 1998, the annual salary for each
- 14 sheriff shall be based upon the total population of his county
- 15 according to the latest federal decennial census in the following
- 16 categories and for the following amounts; however, no sheriff
- shall be paid less than the salary authorized under this section 17
- to be paid the sheriff based upon the population of the county 18
- according to the 1980 federal decennial census: 19
- 20 (a) For counties with a total population of more than
- 21 two hundred thousand (200,000), a salary of Seventy-five Thousand
- Dollars (\$75,000.00). 22
- 23 (b) For counties with a total population of more than

- one hundred thousand (100,000) and not more than two hundred
- 25 thousand (200,000), a salary of Seventy Thousand Dollars
- 26 (\$70,000.00).
- 27 (c) For counties with a total population of more than
- 28 forty-five thousand (45,000) and not more than one hundred
- 29 thousand (100,000), a salary of Sixty-five Thousand Dollars
- 30 (\$65,000.00).
- 31 (d) For counties with a total population of more than
- 32 thirty-four thousand (34,000) and not more than forty-five
- 33 thousand (45,000), a salary of Sixty Thousand Dollars
- 34 (\$60,000.00).
- 35 (e) For counties with a total population of more than
- 36 twenty-five thousand (25,000) and not more than thirty-four
- 37 thousand (34,000), a salary of Fifty-two Thousand Dollars
- 38 (\$52,000.00).
- 39 (f) For counties with a total population of more than
- 40 fifteen thousand (15,000) and not more than twenty-five thousand
- 41 (25,000), a salary of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00).
- 42 (g) For counties with a total population of more than
- 43 nine thousand five hundred (9,500) and not more than fifteen
- 44 thousand (15,000), a salary of Forty-seven Thousand Dollars
- 45 (\$47,000.00).
- 46 (h) For counties with a total population of more than
- 47 seven thousand five hundred (7,500) and not more than nine
- 48 thousand five hundred (9,500), a salary of Forty-five Thousand
- 49 Dollars (\$45,000.00).
- 50 (i) For counties with a total population of not more
- 51 than seven thousand five hundred (7,500), a salary of Forty-two
- 52 Thousand Dollars (\$42,000.00).
- 53 (2) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Leflore County may,
- 55 in its discretion, pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the

- 56 county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 57 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 58 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 59 county for the following reasons:
- 60 (a) The Mississippi Department of Corrections operates
- 61 and maintains a restitution center within the county;
- 62 (b) The Mississippi Department of Corrections operates
- 63 and maintains a community work center within the county;
- (c) There is a resident circuit court judge in the
- 65 county whose office is located at the Leflore County Courthouse;
- (d) There is a resident chancery court judge in the
- 67 county whose office is located at the Leflore County Courthouse;
- (e) The Magistrate for the Fourth Circuit Court
- 69 District is located in the county and maintains his office at the
- 70 Leflore County Courthouse;
- 71 (f) The Region VI Mental Health-Mental Retardation
- 72 Center, which serves a multicounty area, calls upon the sheriff to
- 73 provide security for out-of-town mental patients, as well as
- 74 patients from within the county;
- 75 (g) The increased activity of the Child Support
- 76 Division of the Department of Human Services in enforcing in the
- 77 courts parental obligations has imposed additional duties on the
- 78 sheriff; and
- 79 (h) The dispatchers of the enhanced E-911 system in
- 80 place in Leflore County has been placed under the direction and
- 81 control of the sheriff.
- 82 (3) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 83 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Rankin County may, in
- 84 its discretion, pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the

- 85 county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 86 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 87 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 88 county for the following reasons:
- 89 (a) The Mississippi Department of Corrections operates
- 90 and maintains the Central Mississippi Correctional Facility within
- 91 the county;
- 92 (b) The State Hospital is operated and maintained
- 93 within the county at Whitfield;
- 94 (c) Hudspeth Regional Center, a facility maintained for
- 95 the care and treatment of the mentally retarded, is located within
- 96 the county;
- 97 (d) The Mississippi Law Enforcement Officers Training
- 98 Academy is operated and maintained within the county;
- 99 (e) The State Fire Academy is operated and maintained
- 100 within the county;
- 101 (f) The Pearl River Valley Water Supply District,
- 102 ordinarily known as the "Reservoir District," is located within
- 103 the county;
- 104 (g) The Jackson International Airport is located within
- 105 the county;
- 106 (h) The patrolling of the state properties located
- 107 within the county has imposed additional duties on the sheriff;
- 108 and
- 109 (i) The sheriff, in addition to providing security to
- 110 the nearly one hundred thousand (100,000) residents of the county,
- 111 has the duty to investigate, solve and assist in the prosecution
- 112 of any misdemeanor or felony committed upon any state property
- 113 located in Rankin County.

- 114 (4) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
  115 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Neshoba County shall
  116 pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the county an amount
- 116 pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the county an amount
- 117 equal to Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00).
- 118 (5) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 119 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Tunica County may, in
- 120 their discretion, pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 121 county an amount equal to Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00),
- 122 payable beginning April 1, 1997.
- 123 (6) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 124 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Hinds County shall
- 125 pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the county in an amount
- 126 equal to Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00). The Legislature
- 127 finds and declares that the annual supplement authorized by this
- 128 subsection is justified in such county for the following reasons:
- 129 (a) Hinds County has the greatest population of any
- 130 county, two hundred fifty-four thousand four hundred forty-one
- 131 (254,441) by the 1990 census, being almost one hundred thousand
- 132 (100,000) more than the next most populous county;
- 133 (b) Hinds County is home to the state capitol and the
- 134 seat of all state government offices;
- 135 (c) Hinds County is the third largest county in
- 136 geographic area, containing eight hundred seventy-five (875)
- 137 square miles;
- (d) Hinds County is comprised of two (2) judicial
- 139 districts, each having a courthouse and county office buildings;
- (e) There are four (4) resident circuit judges, four
- 141 (4) resident chancery judges, and three (3) resident county judges
- 142 in Hinds County, the most of any county, with the sheriff acting

- 143 as chief executive officer and provider of bailiff services for
- 144 all;
- 145 (f) The main offices for the clerk and most of the
- 146 judges and magistrates for the United States District Court for
- 147 the Southern District of Mississippi are located within the
- 148 county;
- 149 (g) The state's only urban university, Jackson State
- 150 University, is located within the county;
- 151 (h) The University of Mississippi Medical Center,
- 152 combining the medical school, dental school, nursing school and
- 153 hospital, is located within the county;
- 154 (i) Mississippi Veterans Memorial Stadium, the state's
- 155 largest sports arena, is located within the county;
- 156 (j) The Mississippi State Fairgrounds, including the
- 157 Coliseum and Trade Mart, are located within the county;
- 158 (k) Hinds County has the largest criminal population in
- 159 the state, such that the Hinds County Sheriff's Department
- 160 operates the largest county jail system in the state, housing
- 161 almost one thousand (1,000) inmates in three (3) separate
- 162 detention facilities;
- 163 (1) The Hinds County Sheriff's Department handles more
- 164 mental and drug and alcohol commitments cases than any other
- 165 sheriff's department in the state;
- 166 (m) The Mississippi Department of Corrections maintains
- 167 a restitution center within the county;
- 168 (n) The Mississippi Department of Corrections regularly
- 169 houses as many as one hundred (100) state convicts within the
- 170 Hinds County jail system; and
- 171 (o) The Hinds County Sheriff's Department is regularly

- 172 asked to provide security services not only at the Fairgrounds and
- 173 Memorial Stadium, but also for events at the Mississippi Museum of
- 174 Art and Jackson City Auditorium.
- 175 (7) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 176 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Wilkinson County, in
- 177 its discretion, may pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 178 county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 179 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 180 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 181 county because the Mississippi Department of Corrections contracts
- 182 for the private incarceration of state inmates at a private
- 183 correctional facility within the county.
- 184 (8) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 185 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Marshall County, in
- 186 its discretion, may pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 187 county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 188 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 189 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 190 county because the Mississippi Department of Corrections contracts
- 191 for the private incarceration of state inmates at a private
- 192 correctional facility within the county.
- 193 (9) In addition to the salary provided in subsection (1) of
- 194 this section, the Board of Supervisors of Greene County, in its
- 195 discretion, may pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 196 county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 197 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 198 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 199 county for the following reasons:
- 200 (a) The Mississippi Department of Corrections operates

- 201 and maintains the South Mississippi Correctional Facility within
- 202 the county;
- 203 (b) In 1996, additional facilities to house another one
- 204 thousand four hundred sixteen (1,416) male offenders were
- 205 constructed at the South Mississippi Correctional Facility within
- 206 the county; and
- 207 (c) The patrolling of the state properties located
- 208 within the county has imposed additional duties on the sheriff
- 209 justifying additional compensation.
- 210 (10) <u>In addition to the salary provided for in subsection</u>
- 211 (1) of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Franklin County,
- 212 <u>in its discretion, may pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of</u>
- 213 the county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 214 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 215 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 216 <u>county because the sheriff has certain contractual duties</u>
- 217 regarding a regional correctional facility within Jefferson County
- 218 <u>used for the private incarceration of state inmates.</u>
- 219 (11) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection
- 220 (1) of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Alcorn County, in
- 221 <u>its discretion, may pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the</u>
- 222 <u>county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars</u>
- 223 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 224 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 225 county because a regional correctional facility used for the
- 226 <u>incarceration of state inmates is located within Alcorn County.</u>
- 227 (12) The salaries herein provided shall be payable monthly
- 228 on the first day of each calendar month by chancery clerk's
- 229 warrant drawn on the general fund of the county; however, the

- 230 board of supervisors, by resolution duly adopted and entered on
- 231 its minutes, may provide that such salaries shall be paid
- 232 semimonthly on the first and fifteenth day of each month. If a
- 233 pay date falls on a weekend or legal holiday, salary payments
- 234 shall be made on the workday immediately preceding the weekend or
- 235 legal holiday.
- 236 SECTION 2. The Attorney General of the State of Mississippi
- 237 is directed to submit this act, immediately upon approval by the
- 238 Governor, or upon approval by the Legislature subsequent to a
- 239 veto, to the Attorney General of the United States or to the
- 240 United States District Court for the District of Columbia in
- 241 accordance with the provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965,
- 242 as amended and extended.
- 243 SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 244 and after the date it is effectuated under Section 5 of the Voting
- 245 Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended, or October 1, 1999,
- 246 whichever occurs later.
