REPORT OF CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

MR. PRESIDENT AND MR. SPEAKER:

We, the undersigned conferees, have had under consideration the amendments to the following entitled BILL:

S.B. No. 2618: Task Force on the Development and Implementation of Comprehensive Early Childhood Services in Mississippi; create.

We, therefore, respectfully submit the following report and recommendation:

- 1. That the House recede from its Amendment No. 1.
- 2. That the Senate and House adopt the following amendment:

Amend by striking all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

- 8 <u>SECTION 1.</u> (1) The Legislature finds that:
- 9 (a) Studies show that children who experience quality
- 10 comprehensive early childhood services have higher academic and
- 11 social ratings by their kindergarten teachers and better
- 12 kindergarten attendance than children who do not;
- 13 (b) Participation in quality comprehensive early
- 14 childhood services helps children develop social and pre-academic
- 15 skills that will help them succeed in kindergarten and throughout
- 16 their educational experiences;
- 17 (c) Other southeastern states have implemented
- 18 pre-kindergarten programs similar to the Georgia Pre-Kindergarten
- 19 Program for four-year-old children, emphasizing growth in language
- 20 and literacy, math concepts, science, arts, physical development,
- 21 and personal and social competence.
- 22 (2) There is hereby created a Task Force to Study the
- 23 Development and Implementation of Comprehensive Early Childhood
- 24 Services in Mississippi. The task force shall make a report of
- 25 its findings and recommendations to the Legislature at least
- 26 thirty (30) days before the beginning of the 2000 Regular Session
- 27 of the Legislature for implementation in the 2000-2001 school
- 28 year.
- 29 (3) The task force shall be composed of twenty-five (25)
- 30 members as follows:

| 33 | (b) Two (2) members of the Senate appointed by the |
| 34 | President of the Senate, or their designees; |
| 35 | (c) The Chairmen of the House Education and |

| 38 | appointed by the Speaker of the House, or their designees; |
| 39 | (e) A representative of the Governor; |
| 40 | (f) The State Superintendent of Education; |
| 41 | (g) The Executive Director of the Department of Health |
| 42 | the state child care licensing agency; |
| 43 | (h) The Executive Director of the Department of Human |
| 44 | Services, the state Child Care Development Fund agency; |
| 45 | (i) Representatives of the early childhood profession: |
| 46 | (i) A Head Start director elected by the |
| 47 | Mississippi Head Start Association; |
| 48 | (ii) A representative from a regulated family |
| 49 | child care home network appointed by the Speaker of the House; |
| 50 | (iii) A representative from a licensed child care |
| 51 | center appointed by the President of the Senate; |
| 52 | (iv) A representative from a public school |
| 53 | pre-kindergarten program appointed by the Speaker of the House; |
| 54 | (v) A representative from a private school |
| 55 | pre-kindergarten program appointed by the President of the Senate |
| 56 | (vi) A representative from a half-day church |
| 57 | sponsored pre-kindergarten program appointed by the Speaker of the |
| 58 | House; |
| 59 | (vii) A representative from a university or |
| 60 | college early childhood teacher preparation program appointed by |
| 61 | the President of the Senate; |
| 62 | (viii) A representative of a tribal early |
| 63 | childhood program appointed by the Speaker of the House; |
| 64 | (ix) A representative of an early childhood |
| 65 | professional organization appointed by the President of the |

- 66 Senate; and
- 67 (x) A representative of an advocacy organization
- 68 appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- 69 (j) A parent of a preschool-age child appointed by the
- 70 President of the Senate;
- 71 (k) A parent of a preschool-age child with special
- 72 needs appointed by the Speaker of the House; and
- 73 (1) A representative of the cooperative extension
- 74 services appointed by the Speaker of the House.
- 75 (4) In the event the Chairman of the Senate or House
- 76 Education or Appropriations Committees is unable to attend any
- 77 meeting of the task force, the vice-chairman of the respective
- 78 committee shall be authorized to attend and vote at such meeting.
- 79 Appointments shall be made within thirty (30) days after passage
- 80 of this act, and, within fifteen (15) days thereafter on a day to
- 81 be designated jointly by the President of the Senate, the Speaker
- 82 of the House and the State Superintendent of Education, the task
- 83 force shall meet. The Chairman of the Senate Education Committee
- 84 shall appoint a chairman of the task force from its membership,
- 85 and the Chairman of the House Education Committee shall appoint a
- 86 vice-chairman of the task force from its membership. The
- 87 vice-chairman also shall serve as secretary and shall be
- 88 responsible for keeping all records of the task force. A majority
- 89 of the members of the task force shall constitute a quorum. In
- 90 the adoption of rules, resolutions and reports, an affirmative
- 91 vote of a majority of the task force shall be required. All
- 92 members shall be notified in writing of all meetings, such notices
- 93 to be mailed at least five (5) days before the date on which a
- 94 meeting is to be held.
- 95 (5) Members of the task force who are not legislators shall
- 96 be compensated at the per diem rate authorized by Section 25-3-69,
- 97 Mississippi Code of 1972, and shall be reimbursed in accordance
- 98 with Section 25-3-41, Mississippi Code of 1972, for mileage and
- 99 actual expense incurred in the performance of their duties. Any
- 100 member who is also a state employee shall not be eligible to

- 101 receive per diem compensation. No task force member may incur per
- 102 diem, travel or other expenses unless previously authorized by
- 103 vote, at a meeting of the task force, which action shall be
- 104 recorded in the official minutes of the meeting. Legislative
- 105 members of the committee shall be paid from the contingent expense
- 106 funds of their respective houses in the same amounts as provided
- 107 for committee meetings when the Legislature is not in session;
- 108 however, no per diem or expense for attending meetings of the task
- 109 force will be paid while the Legislature is in session.
- 110 Non-legislative members shall be paid from any funds made
- 111 available to the task force for that purpose.
- 112 (6) The task force may utilize clerical and legal staff
- 113 employed by the State Department of Education, the Office of the
- 114 Governor, the Legislature and any other staff assistance made
- 115 available to it.
- 116 (7) Funding for the task force may be provided from any
- 117 funds that may be appropriated by the Legislature to the State
- 118 Department of Education for that purpose.
- 119 (8) Upon presentation of its report to the 2000 Regular
- 120 Session, the task force shall be dissolved.
