1 2 3 4 5	AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 25-3-31, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO INCREASE THE SALARIES OF CERTAIN ELECTED STATE AND DISTRICT OFFICIALS; TO BRING FORWARD SECTION 25-3-25, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, WHICH ESTABLISHES THE SALARIES OF SHERIFFS; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
6	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
7	SECTION 1. Section 25-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
8	amended as follows:
9	25-3-31. The annual salaries of the following elected state
10	and district officers are fixed as follows:
11	Governor\$101,800.00
12	Attorney General90,800.00
13	Secretary of State81,200.00
14	Commissioner of Insurance81,200.00
15	State Treasurer81,200.00
16	State Auditor of Public Accounts81,200.00
17	Commissioner of Agriculture and Commerce81,200.00
18	Transportation Commissioners
19	Public Service Commissioners
20	The above fixed salary of the Governor shall be the reference
21	amount utilized in computing average compensation and earned
22	compensation pursuant to Section 25-11-103(f) and Section
23	25-11-103(k) and to related sections which require such
24	computations.
25	SECTION 2. Section 25-3-25, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
26	brought forward as follows:
27	25-3-25. (1) Except as otherwise provided in subsections

- 28 (2) through (9), the salaries of sheriffs of the various counties
- 29 are hereby fixed as full compensation for their services.
- From and after October 1, 1998, the annual salary for each
- 31 sheriff shall be based upon the total population of his county
- 32 according to the latest federal decennial census in the following
- 33 categories and for the following amounts; however, no sheriff
- 34 shall be paid less than the salary authorized under this section
- 35 to be paid the sheriff based upon the population of the county
- 36 according to the 1980 federal decennial census:
- 37 (a) For counties with a total population of more than
- 38 two hundred thousand (200,000), a salary of Seventy-five Thousand
- 39 Dollars (\$75,000.00).
- 40 (b) For counties with a total population of more than
- 41 one hundred thousand (100,000) and not more than two hundred
- 42 thousand (200,000), a salary of Seventy Thousand Dollars
- 43 (\$70,000.00).
- 44 (c) For counties with a total population of more than
- 45 forty-five thousand (45,000) and not more than one hundred
- 46 thousand (100,000), a salary of Sixty-five Thousand Dollars
- 47 (\$65,000.00).
- 48 (d) For counties with a total population of more than
- 49 thirty-four thousand (34,000) and not more than forty-five
- 50 thousand (45,000), a salary of Sixty Thousand Dollars
- 51 (\$60,000.00).
- (e) For counties with a total population of more than
- 53 twenty-five thousand (25,000) and not more than thirty-four
- 54 thousand (34,000), a salary of Fifty-two Thousand Dollars
- 55 (\$52,000.00).
- (f) For counties with a total population of more than
- 57 fifteen thousand (15,000) and not more than twenty-five thousand
- 58 (25,000), a salary of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00).
- 59 (g) For counties with a total population of more than
- 60 nine thousand five hundred (9,500) and not more than fifteen

- 61 thousand (15,000), a salary of Forty-seven Thousand Dollars
- 62 (\$47,000.00).
- (h) For counties with a total population of more than
- 64 seven thousand five hundred (7,500) and not more than nine
- 65 thousand five hundred (9,500), a salary of Forty-five Thousand
- 66 Dollars (\$45,000.00).
- (i) For counties with a total population of not more
- 68 than seven thousand five hundred (7,500), a salary of Forty-two
- 69 Thousand Dollars (\$42,000.00).
- 70 (2) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 71 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Leflore County may,
- 72 in its discretion, pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 73 county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 74 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 75 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 76 county for the following reasons:
- 77 (a) The Mississippi Department of Corrections operates
- 78 and maintains a restitution center within the county;
- 79 (b) The Mississippi Department of Corrections operates
- 80 and maintains a community work center within the county;
- 81 (c) There is a resident circuit court judge in the
- 82 county whose office is located at the Leflore County Courthouse;
- 83 (d) There is a resident chancery court judge in the
- 84 county whose office is located at the Leflore County Courthouse;
- 85 (e) The Magistrate for the Fourth Circuit Court
- 86 District is located in the county and maintains his office at the
- 87 Leflore County Courthouse;
- 88 (f) The Region VI Mental Health-Mental Retardation
- 89 Center, which serves a multicounty area, calls upon the sheriff to
- 90 provide security for out-of-town mental patients, as well as
- 91 patients from within the county;
- 92 (g) The increased activity of the Child Support
- 93 Division of the Department of Human Services in enforcing in the

- 94 courts parental obligations has imposed additional duties on the
- 95 sheriff; and
- 96 (h) The dispatchers of the enhanced E-911 system in
- 97 place in Leflore County has been placed under the direction and
- 98 control of the sheriff.
- 99 (3) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 100 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Rankin County may, in
- 101 its discretion, pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 102 county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 103 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 104 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 105 county for the following reasons:
- 106 (a) The Mississippi Department of Corrections operates
- 107 and maintains the Central Mississippi Correctional Facility within
- 108 the county;
- 109 (b) The State Hospital is operated and maintained
- 110 within the county at Whitfield;
- 111 (c) Hudspeth Regional Center, a facility maintained for
- 112 the care and treatment of the mentally retarded, is located within
- 113 the county;
- 114 (d) The Mississippi Law Enforcement Officers Training
- 115 Academy is operated and maintained within the county;
- 116 (e) The State Fire Academy is operated and maintained
- 117 within the county;
- 118 (f) The Pearl River Valley Water Supply District,
- 119 ordinarily known as the "Reservoir District," is located within
- 120 the county;
- 121 (g) The Jackson International Airport is located within
- 122 the county;
- 123 (h) The patrolling of the state properties located
- 124 within the county has imposed additional duties on the sheriff;
- 125 and
- 126 (i) The sheriff, in addition to providing security to

- 127 the nearly one hundred thousand (100,000) residents of the county,
- 128 has the duty to investigate, solve and assist in the prosecution
- 129 of any misdemeanor or felony committed upon any state property
- 130 located in Rankin County.
- 131 (4) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 132 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Neshoba County shall
- 133 pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the county an amount
- 134 equal to Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00).
- 135 (5) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 136 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Tunica County may, in
- 137 their discretion, pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 138 county an amount equal to Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00),
- 139 payable beginning April 1, 1997.
- 140 (6) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 141 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Hinds County shall
- 142 pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the county in an amount
- 143 equal to Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00). The Legislature
- 144 finds and declares that the annual supplement authorized by this
- 145 subsection is justified in such county for the following reasons:
- 146 (a) Hinds County has the greatest population of any
- 147 county, two hundred fifty-four thousand four hundred forty-one
- 148 (254,441) by the 1990 census, being almost one hundred thousand
- 149 (100,000) more than the next most populous county;
- 150 (b) Hinds County is home to the state capitol and the
- 151 seat of all state government offices;
- 152 (c) Hinds County is the third largest county in
- 153 geographic area, containing eight hundred seventy-five (875)
- 154 square miles;
- (d) Hinds County is comprised of two (2) judicial
- 156 districts, each having a courthouse and county office buildings;
- 157 (e) There are four (4) resident circuit judges, four
- 158 (4) resident chancery judges, and three (3) resident county judges
- 159 in Hinds County, the most of any county, with the sheriff acting

- 160 as chief executive officer and provider of bailiff services for
- 161 all;
- 162 (f) The main offices for the clerk and most of the
- 163 judges and magistrates for the United States District Court for
- 164 the Southern District of Mississippi are located within the
- 165 county;
- 166 (g) The state's only urban university, Jackson State
- 167 University, is located within the county;
- (h) The University of Mississippi Medical Center,
- 169 combining the medical school, dental school, nursing school and
- 170 hospital, is located within the county;
- 171 (i) Mississippi Veterans Memorial Stadium, the state's
- 172 largest sports arena, is located within the county;
- 173 (j) The Mississippi State Fairgrounds, including the
- 174 Coliseum and Trade Mart, are located within the county;
- 175 (k) Hinds County has the largest criminal population in
- 176 the state, such that the Hinds County Sheriff's Department
- 177 operates the largest county jail system in the state, housing
- 178 almost one thousand (1,000) inmates in three (3) separate
- 179 detention facilities;
- 180 (1) The Hinds County Sheriff's Department handles more
- 181 mental and drug and alcohol commitments cases than any other
- 182 sheriff's department in the state;
- 183 (m) The Mississippi Department of Corrections maintains
- 184 a restitution center within the county;
- 185 (n) The Mississippi Department of Corrections regularly
- 186 houses as many as one hundred (100) state convicts within the
- 187 Hinds County jail system; and
- 188 (o) The Hinds County Sheriff's Department is regularly
- 189 asked to provide security services not only at the Fairgrounds and
- 190 Memorial Stadium, but also for events at the Mississippi Museum of
- 191 Art and Jackson City Auditorium.
- 192 (7) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)

- 193 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Wilkinson County, in
- 194 its discretion, may pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 195 county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 196 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 197 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 198 county because the Mississippi Department of Corrections contracts
- 199 for the private incarceration of state inmates at a private
- 200 correctional facility within the county.
- 201 (8) In addition to the salary provided for in subsection (1)
- 202 of this section, the Board of Supervisors of Marshall County, in
- 203 its discretion, may pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 204 county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 205 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 206 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 207 county because the Mississippi Department of Corrections contracts
- 208 for the private incarceration of state inmates at a private
- 209 correctional facility within the county.
- 210 (9) In addition to the salary provided in subsection (1) of
- 211 this section, the Board of Supervisors of Greene County, in its
- 212 discretion, may pay an annual supplement to the sheriff of the
- 213 county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars
- 214 (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that the annual
- 215 supplement authorized by this subsection is justified in such
- 216 county for the following reasons:
- 217 (a) The Mississippi Department of Corrections operates
- 218 and maintains the South Mississippi Correctional Facility within
- 219 the county;
- (b) In 1996, additional facilities to house another one
- 221 thousand four hundred sixteen (1,416) male offenders were
- 222 constructed at the South Mississippi Correctional Facility within
- 223 the county; and
- 224 (c) The patrolling of the state properties located
- 225 within the county has imposed additional duties on the sheriff

226 justifying additional compensation.

(10) The salaries herein provided shall be payable monthly 227 228 on the first day of each calendar month by chancery clerk's warrant drawn on the general fund of the county; however, the 229 230 board of supervisors, by resolution duly adopted and entered on 231 its minutes, may provide that such salaries shall be paid semimonthly on the first and fifteenth day of each month. 232 If a pay date falls on a weekend or legal holiday, salary payments 233 234 shall be made on the workday immediately preceding the weekend or 235 legal holiday. The Attorney General of the State of Mississippi 236 SECTION 3. 237 shall submit this act, immediately upon approval by the Governor, 238 or upon approval by the Legislature subsequent to a veto, to the Attorney General of the United States or to the United States 239 240 District Court for the District of Columbia in accordance with the 241 provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and 242 extended. SECTION 4. Section 1 of this act shall take effect and be in 243 244 force from and after July 1, 2000, if it is effectuated on or before that date under Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, 245 246 as amended and extended. If Section 1 of this act is effectuated 247 under Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended, after July 1, 2000, this act shall take effect and be in 248 249 force from and after the date it is effectuated under Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended. Section 2 250 251 of this act shall take effect and be in force from and after October 1, 2000, if it is effectuated on or before that date under 252 253 Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and 254 If Section 2 of this act is effectuated under Section 5 extended. of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended, after 255 256 October 1, 2000, this act shall take effect and be in force from and after the date it is effectuated under Section 5 of the Voting

Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended.
