1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9 10 11 12 13 14 15 16	AN ACT TO PROVIDE THAT THE MISSISSIPPI DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES SHALL ADVERTISE A CONTRACT FOR PUBLIC BID AND AWARD A CONTRACT TO COLLECT DATA REGARDING TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE FOR NEEDY FAMILIES (TANF) RECIPIENTS IN CERTAIN COUNTIES, AND TO USE THE DATA FROM THOSE COUNTIES IN PREPARING ITS STUDY AND EVALUATION OF THE TANF WORK PROGRAM PURSUANT TO THE CONTRACT; TO REQUIRE THE MISSISSIPPI DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES TO COLLECT CERTAIN DATA REGARDING THE PERSONAL RESPONSIBILITY AND WORK OPPORTUNITY RECONCILIATION ACT OF 1996 AND TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE FOR NEEDY FAMILIES (TANF) AND MAKE SUCH INFORMATION AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC; TO REQUIRE THE MISSISSIPPI DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES TO COOPERATE IN ANY STUDY FUNDED BY A STATE, COUNTY OR MUNICIPAL BODY, AND CONDUCTED BY AN INDEPENDENT EXPERT THAT CONCERNS THE IMPACT UPON MISSISSIPPI RESIDENT ALIENS OF THE DENIAL OR TERMINATION OF ASSISTANCE UNDER CERTAIN FEDERAL WELFARE PROGRAMS; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
17	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
18	SECTION 1. (1) The Mississippi Department of Human Services
19	is hereby authorized to issue requests for proposals, advertise
20	the contract for public bid, and award a contract, subject to the
21	approval of the Personal Service Contract Review Board (Section
22	25-9-120), to study and evaluate the Temporary Assistance for
23	Needy Families (TANF) work program as follows:
24	The contractor shall conduct a longitudinal study of the
25	implementation of TANF and related welfare reforms. The research
26	group shall consist of experienced researchers in welfare policy,
27	social science and other relevant fields. The study shall include
28	the following urban counties: DeSoto, Forrest, Harrison, Hinds,
29	Jackson, Lauderdale, Lee and Washington, and shall include the
30	following rural counties: Bolivar, Clay, Holmes, Jefferson,
31	Jefferson Davis, Marshall, Noxubee, Perry, Quitman, Sharkey and
32	Wilkinson. The study shall select subgroups representing
33	important sectors of the assistance population, including type of

area of residence (city, suburban, small town, rural, region),

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- level of education, literacy, work experience, number of adults in 35 the home, number and age of children in the home, teen parentage, 36 English proficiency, where relevant, and other such subgroups 37 38 chosen by the institution. For each subgroup, the study shall 39 assemble a statistically valid sample of TANF cases enrolled prior to October 1, 1997. The study shall continue until December 31, 40 2005, and in the event this section is reenacted, the study shall 41 continue until December 31, 2007. The Mississippi Department of 42 Human Services and the contractor shall obtain permission to 43 conduct the study from the subjects of the study and guarantee 44 45 their privacy according to applicable privacy laws. To facilitate this permission, the study may be designed to refer to subjects by 46 47 pseudonyms or codes and shall, in any event, guarantee anonymity to the subjects with limited access by outsiders to the data 48 (other than identities) generated by the study. The contractor 49 shall report the interim findings of the study with respect to 50 each subgroup, to the Legislature by August 31 of each year, 51 52 beginning August 31, 2003, and in the event this section is reenacted, shall report the final findings with respect to each 53
- 56 (2) The contractor shall devise the study and identify the 57 factors to be studied by not later than August 31, 2002. The 58 study shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

- (a) The study shall include demographic breakdowns including, but not limited to, race, gender, age and number of children in the household.
- (b) The subjects of the study shall be followed after
 denial or termination of assistance, to the extent feasible. The
 evaluator shall attempt to maintain personal contact with the
 subjects of the study, and employ such methods as meetings,
 telephone contacts, written surveys and computer matches with
 other data bases to accomplish this purpose. The intent of this

- 68 feature of the study is to discover the paths people take after
- 69 leaving welfare and the patterns of return to welfare, including
- 70 the factors that may influence these paths and patterns.
- 71 (c) The study shall examine the influence of various
- 72 employability, education and training programs upon employment,
- 73 earnings, job tenure and cycling between welfare and work
- 74 (repeated application for welfare between periods of employment).
- 75 (d) The study shall examine the influence of various
- 76 supportive services such as child care (including type and cost),
- 77 transportation and payment of initial employment expenses upon
- 78 employment, earnings, job tenure and cycling between welfare and
- 79 work.
- 80 (e) The study shall examine the influence of government
- 81 benefits that are authorized by TANF to be received by subjects
- 82 after they have been employed upon employment, earnings, job
- 83 tenure and cycling between welfare and work.
- (f) The study shall examine the frequency of unplanned
- 85 occurrences in subjects' lives, such as illness or injury, family
- 86 members' illness or injury, car breakdown, strikes, natural
- 87 disasters, evictions, loss of other sources of income, domestic
- 88 violence and crime, and their impact upon employment, earnings,
- 89 job tenure and cycling between welfare and work.
- 90 (g) The study shall examine the wages and other
- 91 compensation, including health benefits and what they cost the
- 92 employee, received by subjects who obtain employment, the type and
- 93 characteristics of jobs, the hours and time of day of work, union
- 94 status and the relationships of such factors to earnings, job
- 95 tenure and cycling between welfare and work.
- 96 (h) The study shall examine the reasons for subjects'
- 97 job loss, the availability of unemployment insurance, the reasons
- 98 for a subject's return to welfare, programs or services utilized
- 99 by subjects in the search for another job, the characteristics of
- 100 the subjects' next job and the relationships of these factors to

- re-employment, earnings, job tenure on the new job and cycling between welfare and work.
- (i) The study shall examine the impact of mandatory
 work requirements, including the types of work activities to which
 the subjects were assigned, and the links between the requirements
 and the activities and sanctions, employment, earnings, job tenure
 and cycling between welfare and work.
- 108 (j) The study shall identify all sources and amounts of 109 reported household nonwage income and examine the influence of the 110 sources and amounts of nonwage, nonwelfare income on employment, 111 earnings, job tenure and cycling between welfare and work.
 - (k) The study shall examine sanctions, including child support enforcement and paternity establishment, the reasons sanctions are threatened, the number threatened, the number imposed and the reasons sanctions are not imposed or are ended, such as cooperation achieved or good cause established.
- The study shall track the subjects' usage of TANF 117 (1)118 benefits over the course of the lifetime sixty-month limit of TANF eligibility, including patterns of usage, relationships between 119 120 consecutive usage of large numbers of months and other factors, status of all study subjects with respect to the time limit as of 121 122 each report, characteristics of subjects exhausting the eligibility limit, types of exceptions granted to the sixty-month 123 limit and numbers of cases within each type of exception. 124
- (m) The study shall track subjects' participation in other public systems, including the public schools, the child welfare system, the criminal justice system, homeless and food services and others, and attempt to identify the positive or negative ripple effects in these systems of welfare policies, systems and procedures.
- 131 (n) The study shall examine the impact of the TANF 132 program on the local economy and on other state agencies.

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- 133 (3) The study authorized by this section shall only be
 134 funded by the Mississippi Department of Human Services from the
 135 TANF program federal block grant not to exceed Three Hundred Fifty
 136 Thousand Dollars (\$350,000.00) annually.
- 137 (4) All data, statistics, computer software and reports made 138 under this section shall be considered public records and the 139 property of the Mississippi Department of Human Services.
- 140 **SECTION 2.** (1) The Mississippi Department of Human Services shall collect and report upon all data in connection with 141 federally funded or assisted welfare programs as federal law may 142 require, including, but not limited to, Section 411 of the 143 144 Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 and its implementing regulations and any amendments thereto 145 146 as may from time to time be enacted. Such data shall be made available to the public within one (1) week after it has been sent 147 to the United States Department of Health and Human Services at 148 each regional office of the Mississippi Department of Human 149 150 Services.
- (2) On the same schedule as the data collection required by federal law and subsection (1) of this section, the Mississippi Department of Human Services shall collect and report additional information with respect to the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program, as follows:
- 156 (a) With respect to denials of applications for
 157 benefits, all of the information about the family as required
 158 under federal law, plus the specific reason or reasons for denial
 159 of the application.
- 160 (b) With respect to all terminations of benefits, all
 161 of the information as required under federal law, plus the
 162 specific reason or reasons for the termination or sanction.
- (3) The Mississippi Department of Human Services shall

 164 collect all of the data as set forth in subsections (1) and (2) of

 165 this section on all cash assistance benefits provided to TANF

recipients that are not funded from the TANF program federal block grant or are not otherwise required to be included in the data collection and reporting provided for in subsections (1) and (2) of this section, and shall report such information on the same schedule as is required for the information collected in subsections (1) and (2) of this section.

- (4) Reports made under this section shall be considered public records and shall promptly be made available to the public upon request at the end of each fiscal year at a reasonable cost directly related to the cost of copying and mailing the reports. The data underlying the reports shall be made available to academic institutions and public policy organizations involved in the study of welfare issues or programs after any reductions made to conform with applicable privacy laws. The data shall be provided by the Mississippi Department of Human Services at a reasonable cost directly related to the cost of copying and mailing the data.
- 183 No later than July 1, 2002, the Mississippi Department of Human Services shall appoint seven (7) persons to an advisory 184 185 panel. Four (4) panel members shall be experienced researchers in welfare policy, social science and other related fields from 186 187 institutions of higher learning located in the Delta, northeast, 188 southwest, southern or urban areas of Mississippi, one (1) member shall be a representative of the business community, one (1) 189 190 member shall be a current or former welfare recipient, and one (1) member shall be a representative of a nonprofit human service 191 organization. The role of the advisory panel is to ensure input 192 from all sectors in the development of the research design and 193 during the research process. Its role is advisory in nature and 194 195 it is not empowered to direct the research effort or to specify The advisory panel shall have the following 196 197 responsibilities:

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198	(a) To advise researchers with regard to availability
199	of data pertaining to elements to be studied according to
200	legislation;

- 201 (b) To play a consulting role in reviewing and reacting 202 to the overall research design of the study;
- 203 (c) To review interim and final reports of the research 204 team; and
- 205 (d) To review and advise researchers on policy 206 recommendations emanating from the research process.
- Analysis and interpretation of data gathered under the
 guidance of the research design and based upon the specifics
 delineated by the legislation shall be solely the responsibility
 of the contractor.
- **SECTION 3.** The Mississippi Department of Human Services 211 shall cooperate in any study funded by a federal, state, county or 212 municipal body, and conducted by an independent expert, concerning 213 the impact upon Mississippi residents of the denial or termination 214 215 of assistance under the Food Stamps, TANF, Medicaid and Title XX social services programs pursuant to the changes enacted in the 216 217 federal Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996. The purpose of such a study must be 218 219 to examine the immediate and long-term effects on this population and on the state of the denial or termination of these forms of 220 assistance, including the impact on the individuals, the alternate 221 222 means they find to obtain support and care, and the impact on
- 223 state and local spending and human services delivery systems.
- 224 Such a study shall select a statistically valid sample of persons
- 225 denied or terminated from each type of benefit and attempt to
- 226 track them at least until July 31, 2003. Any reports from studies
- 227 conducted with the cooperation of the Mississippi Department of
- 228 Human Services shall be made available to the Legislature upon
- 229 request, and a final report shall be submitted upon completion.
- 230 These reports shall be available to the public upon request.

SECTION 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after July 1, 2002; and shall stand repealed from and after December 31, 2005.
