## COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL NO. 2753

AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO PROVIDE
A VACCINATION PROGRAM FOR FIRST RESPONDERS WHO MAY BE EXPOSED TO
INFECTIOUS DISEASES WHEN SENT TO BIOTERRORISM OR DISASTER
LOCATIONS; TO PROVIDE THAT THIS PROGRAM IS SUBJECT TO THE RECEIPT
OF FEDERAL FUNDS; TO REQUIRE STUDENTS WHO RESIDE IN UNIVERSITY
ON-CAMPUS HOUSING TO BE VACCINATED AGAINST MENINGITIS; TO REQUIRE
STUDENTS WHO ENROLL IN PUBLIC OR PRIVATE TWO-YEAR OR FOUR-YEAR
COLLEGES OR UNIVERSITIES TO BE VACCINATED AGAINST HEPATITIS A AND
B; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

- 10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 11 **SECTION 1.** (1) As used in this section:
- 12 (a) "Department" means the Mississippi State Department
- 13 of Health, Bioterrorism Division;
- 14 (b) "Director" means the Executive Director of the
- 15 State Board of Health.
- 16 (c) "Bioterrorism" means the intentional use of any
- 17 microorganism, virus, infectious substance or biological product
- 18 that may be engineered as a result of biotechnology or any
- 19 naturally occurring or bioengineered component of any
- 20 microorganism, virus, infectious substance or biological product,
- 21 to cause or attempt to cause death, disease or other biological
- 22 malfunction in any living organism;
- 23 (d) "Disaster locations" means any geographical
- 24 location where a bioterrorism attack, terrorist attack,
- 25 catastrophic or natural disaster or emergency occurs; and
- 26 (e) "First responders" means state and local law
- 27 enforcement personnel, fire department personnel and emergency
- 28 medical personnel who may be deployed to bioterrorism attacks,
- 29 terrorist attacks, catastrophic or natural disasters and
- 30 emergencies.

- 31 (2) The department shall offer a vaccination program for
- 32 first responders who may be exposed to infectious diseases when
- 33 deployed to disaster locations. The vaccinations shall include,
- 34 but are not limited to, hepatitis A vaccination, hepatitis B
- 35 vaccination, diptheria-tetanus vaccination, influenza vaccination,
- 36 pneumococcal vaccination and other vaccinations when recommended
- 37 by the United States Public Health Service and in accordance with
- 38 Federal Emergency Management Directors Policy. Immune globulin
- 39 will be made available when necessary.
- 40 (3) Participation in the vaccination program will be
- 41 voluntary by the first responders, except for first responders who
- 42 are classified as having "occupational exposure" to blood borne
- 43 pathogens as defined by the Occupational Safety and Health
- 44 Administration Standard contained at 29 CFR 1910.10300 who shall
- 45 be required to take the designated vaccinations or otherwise
- 46 required by law.
- 47 (4) A first responder shall be exempt from vaccinations when
- 48 a written statement from a licensed physician is presented
- 49 indicating that a vaccine is medically contraindicated for that
- 50 person or the first responder signs a written statement that the
- 51 administration of a vaccination conflicts with their religious
- 52 tenets.
- 53 (5) In the event of a vaccine shortage the director, in
- 54 consultation with the Governor and the Centers for Disease Control
- 55 and Prevention, shall give priority for vaccination to first
- 56 responders.
- 57 (6) The department shall notify first responders to the
- 58 availability of the vaccination program and shall provide
- 59 educational materials on ways to prevent exposure to infectious
- 60 diseases.
- 61 (7) The department may contract with county and local health
- 62 departments, not-for-profit home health care agencies, hospitals

- and physicians to administer a vaccination program for first responders.
- 65 (8) This section shall be effective upon receipt of federal 66 funding and/or federal grants for administering a first responders 67 vaccination program. Upon receipt of such funding, the department 68 shall make available the vaccines to first responders as provided
- 70 **SECTION 2.** (1) Beginning with the 2003-2004 school year, an individual enrolled in an institution of higher learning who 71 resides in on-campus student housing shall be vaccinated against 72 73 meningitis. Provided, however, an individual is exempt from vaccination if, after receiving detailed information from the 74 75 institution of higher learning on the risks associated with meningitis and the availability and effectiveness of available 76 77 vaccine, the individual signs a written waiver stating that he/she has received and reviewed the information and has chosen not to be 78 vaccinated; or, if the individual is a minor, the parent or 79 80 quardian signs such waiver.
- 81 (2) Nothing in this act shall be construed to require any 82 institution of higher learning to provide or pay for vaccinations 83 against meningitis.
- SECTION 3. (1) A person enrolling as a full-time or
  part-time student at a public or private two-year or four-year
  college or university in this state shall present evidence of
  vaccinations against Hepatitis A and B or shall complete
  vaccinations within nine (9) months of attendance as a condition
  of continued attendance at that college or university, except as
  provided in subsection (3) of this section.
- 91 (2) The college or university shall provide enrolling 92 persons with educational information of Hepatitis A and B. The 93 college or university is not required to provide or pay for 94 vaccinations against Hepatitis A and B.

- (3) A student shall not be required to receive a vaccination 95 based upon one of the following: 96
- A written statement submitted to the college or 97 (a) university by a licensed physician indicating that the vaccine is 98
- 99 medically contraindicated shall exempt a person from the
- vaccination; or 100

- 101 (b) A written statement submitted to the college or university by the student, or the student's parent or guardian if 102 the student is a minor, explaining how the administration of the 103 vaccine conflicts with the bona fide religious tenets or practices 104 of the student, or the parent or quardian, as appropriate, except 105 106 that a general philosophical or moral objection to the vaccination shall not be sufficient for an exemption on religious grounds.
- 108 SECTION 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after July 1, 2003. 109
