## SENATE BILL NO. 2621

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 25-3-36, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO
 AUTHORIZE THE TUNICA COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS TO PAY ITS
 JUSTICE COURT JUDGES AN ADDITIONAL \$10,000.00 IN SALARY; AND FOR
 RELATED PURPOSES.
 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
 SECTION 1. Section 25-3-36, Mississippi Code of 1972, is

7 amended as follows:

25-3-36. (1) From and after October 1, 1998, every justice 8 9 court judge shall receive as full compensation for his or her 10 services and in lieu of any and all other fees, costs or compensation heretofore authorized for such justice court judge, 11 an annual salary based upon the population of his or her county 12 according to the 1990 federal decennial census; however, no 13 justice court judge shall be paid less than the salary authorized 14 under this section to be paid the justice court judge based upon 15 16 the population of the county according to the 1980 federal 17 decennial census. The amount of which salary shall be determined as follows: 18

(a) In counties with a population of more than two
hundred thousand (200,000), a salary of Forty-six Thousand Two
Hundred Ninety-nine Dollars (\$46,299.00).

(b) In counties with a population of more than one hundred fifty thousand (150,000) but not more than two hundred thousand (200,000), a salary of Forty-two Thousand Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$42,504.00).

26 (c) In counties with a population of more than27 seventy-five thousand (75,000) but not more than one hundred fifty

28 thousand (150,000), a salary of Thirty-eight Thousand Seven 29 Hundred Nine Dollars (\$38,709.00).

30 (d) In counties with a population of more than
31 forty-nine thousand (49,000) but not more than seventy-five
32 thousand (75,000), a salary of Thirty-three Thousand Three Hundred
33 Ninety-six Dollars (\$33,396.00).

34 (e) In counties with a population of more than
35 thirty-four thousand (34,000) but not more than forty-nine
36 thousand (49,000), a salary of Twenty-eight Thousand Eight Hundred
37 Forty-two Dollars (\$28,842.00).

38 (f) In counties with a population of more than 39 twenty-four thousand five hundred (24,500) but not more than 40 thirty-four thousand (34,000), a salary of Twenty-seven Thousand 41 Three Hundred Twenty-four Dollars (\$27,324.00).

42 (g) In counties with a population of more than
43 twenty-one thousand (21,000) but not more than twenty-four
44 thousand five hundred (24,500), a salary of Twenty-four Thousand
45 Two Hundred Eighty-eight Dollars (\$24,288.00).

(h) In counties with a population of more than sixteen
thousand five hundred (16,500) but not more than twenty-one
thousand (21,000), a salary of Twenty-one Thousand Two Hundred
Fifty-two Dollars (\$21,252.00).

50 (i) In counties with a population of more than twelve 51 thousand (12,000) but not more than sixteen thousand five hundred 52 (16,500), a salary of Eighteen Thousand Two Hundred Sixteen 53 Dollars (\$18,216.00).

(j) In counties with a population of more than eight
thousand (8,000) but not more than twelve thousand (12,000), a
salary of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00).

57 (k) In counties with a population of eight thousand 58 (8,000) or less, a salary of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00). 59 The board of supervisors of any county having two (2) 60 judicial districts and two (2) justice court judges for the county 5. shall pay the justice court judges an amount equal to that 61 62 hereinabove provided for judges in the next higher population 63 category per year, if said justice court judges maintain regular 64 office hours and are personally present in the office they 65 maintain for at least thirty (30) hours per week. In any county 66 having a population greater than eight thousand (8,000) but less than eight thousand five hundred (8,500) according to the 1990 67 federal decennial census and in which U.S. Highway 61 and 68 69 Mississippi Highway 4 intersect, the board of supervisors may, in 70 its discretion, pay such justice court judges an additional amount 71 not to exceed the sum of Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$11,550.00) per year, payable beginning April 1, 1997. 72 73 In any county having a population greater than ten thousand 74 (10,000) but less than ten thousand five hundred (10,500) 75 according to the 1990 federal decennial census and in which Mississippi Highway 3 and Mississippi Highway 6 intersect, the 76 77 board of supervisors may, in its discretion, pay such justice 78 court judges an additional amount not to exceed One Thousand Four Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$1,450.00) per year, payable beginning 79 80 April 1, 1997. In any county having a population greater than twenty-four thousand seven hundred (24,700) and less than 81 82 twenty-four thousand nine hundred (24,900), according to the 1990 federal census, wherein Mississippi Highways 15 and 16 intersect, 83 84 the board of supervisors shall pay such justice court judge an 85 additional amount equal to Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) per year. 86 87

In addition to the salary otherwise authorized in this subsection, the Board of Supervisors of Tunica County, in its 88 89 discretion, may pay an annual supplement to the justice court judges of the county in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand 90 Dollars (\$10,000.00). The Legislature finds and declares that 91 92 such annual supplement is justified because tourism has increased in the county, the caseload handled by the justice court judges in 93 \*SS01/R1003\* S. 94 Tunica County is equal to the number of cases handled by a county

95 with three (3) to five (5) justice court judges, and the county

96 has the third highest volume of cases in the state within its

97 justice court judge system.

98 (2) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (1) of this 99 section, in the event that the number of justice court judges 100 authorized pursuant to Section 9-11-2(1) is exceeded pursuant to 101 the provisions of Section 9-11-2(4), the aggregate of the salaries 102 paid to the justice court judges of such a county shall not exceed 103 the amount sufficient to pay the number of justice court judges 104 authorized pursuant to Section 9-11-2(1) and such amount shall be equally divided among those justice court judges continuing to 105 106 hold office under the provisions of Section 9-11-2(4).

107 From and after January 1, 1984, all fees, costs, fines (3) and penalties charged and collected in the justice court shall be 108 109 paid to the clerk of the justice court for deposit, along with 110 monies from cash bonds and other monies which have been forfeited 111 in criminal cases, into the general fund of the county as provided in Section 9-11-19; and the clerk of the board of supervisors 112 113 shall be authorized and empowered, upon approval by the board of 114 supervisors, to make disbursements and withdrawals from the 115 general fund of the county in order to pay any reasonable and necessary expenses incurred in complying with this section, 116 including payment of the salaries of justice court judges as 117 118 provided by subsection (1) of this section. The provisions of this subsection shall not, except as to cash bonds and other 119 120 monies which have been forfeited in criminal cases, apply to 121 monies required to be deposited in the justice court clerk clearing account as provided in Section 9-11-18, Mississippi Code 122 123 of 1972.

124 (4) The salaries provided for in subsection (1) of this 125 section shall be payable monthly by warrant drawn by the clerk of 126 the board of supervisors on the general fund of the county; S. B. No. 2621 \*SSO1/R1003\* 04/SS01/R1003 PAGE 4 however, the board of supervisors, by resolution duly adopted and entered on its minutes, may provide that such salaries shall be paid semimonthly on the first and fifteenth day of each month. If a pay date falls on a weekend or legal holiday, salary payments shall be made on the workday immediately preceding the weekend or legal holiday.

(5) Provided, that the salary of any justice court judge
shall not be reduced during his term of office as a result of a
population change following a federal decennial census.

(6) Any justice court judge who is unable to attend and hold court by reason of being under suspension by the Commission on Judicial Performance or the Mississippi Supreme Court shall not receive a salary while under such suspension.

140 SECTION 2. The Attorney General of the State of Mississippi 141 shall submit this act, immediately upon approval by the Governor, 142 or upon approval by the Legislature subsequent to a veto, to the 143 Attorney General of the United States or to the United States 144 District Court for the District of Columbia in accordance with the 145 provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and 146 extended.

147 **SECTION 3.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 148 and after the date it is effectuated under Section 5 of the Voting 149 Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended.
