- COMMENDING THE LIFE OF PRIVATE FIRST CLASS BRYAN BARRON OF GULFPORT, MISSISSIPPI, WHO WAS A COMBAT CASUALTY IN IRAQ ON MONDAY, MAY 23, 2005, AND EXPRESSING THE SYMPATHY OF THE 3

- 5 LEGISLATURE.
- 6 WHEREAS, Private First Class Bryan Barron, 26, of Gulfport,
- 7 Mississippi was killed on Monday, May 23, 2005, when a bomb
- exploded near his Humvee in Haswa, 30 miles south of Baghdad, 8
- 9 Iraq, one of four Mississippi members of the 155th Brigade Combat
- 10 Team; and
- WHEREAS, carried by a military honor guard, he came home to 11
- his community and family, and was buried Wednesday, June 1, 2005, 12
- at Biloxi National Cemetery in Biloxi, Mississippi, with full 13
- military honors. A memorial service was also held on Thursday, 14
- June 2, 2005, at the New Covenant United Methodist Church on Terry 15
- 16 Road in Byram, Mississippi; and
- 17 WHEREAS, the 155th Infantry Brigade Combat Team includes
- 3,500 soldiers from Mississippi and others from Vermont and 18
- 19 Arkansas. The 155th, which is attached to the II Marine
- 20 Expeditionary Force, operates in the Karbala, Najaf and Babil
- 21 provinces of Iraq. The soldiers trained at Camp Shelby before
- being deployed to Iraq in January 2004. The deaths of these four 22
- 23 brave guardsmen brings the total in the 155th Brigade to at least
- 24 10 in 2005. Since military operations in Afghanistan and Iraq
- began, 32 soldiers with ties to Mississippi have died. The 25
- 26 Mississippi National Guard has sustained the fourth-highest number
- of casualties of any state; and 27

28 WHEREAS, Private Barron was the father of two young children
```

- 29 who would have celebrated his 27th birthday on June 9, 2005. He
- 30 joined the Army National Guard in December 2003. His wife,
- 31 Amanda, described her husband as a compassionate, outgoing person
- 32 who didn't know a stranger, and who loved his children, 8-year-old
- 33 Hayley West and 11-month-old Jaden. He was expected home in three
- 34 weeks for the baby's first birthday; and
- 35 WHEREAS, during his funeral, Private Barron was awarded the
- 36 Bronze Star, the Mississippi Medal of Valor and the Purple Heart
- 37 posthumously by Major General Harold Cross, Adjutant General of
- 38 Mississippi; and
- 39 WHEREAS, his family received an outpouring of grief and
- 40 support from across the state, demonstrating the community's
- 41 acknowledgment of the sacrifice made by the Mississippi National
- 42 Guard; and
- WHEREAS, he is survived by his wife, Amanda Campbell Barron;
- 44 two daughters, Jaden Barron of Byram, Mississippi, and Hayley West
- 45 of Vancleave, Mississippi; mother, Cindy Barron of Yakima,
- 46 Washington; three brothers, Terry L. Barron of Pineville,
- 47 Louisiana, Terry Barron of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, and Cory Barron
- 48 of Yakima, Washington; six sisters, Cindy Whittington and Cathy
- 49 Barron both of Pineville, Louisiana, Bonita Rachal of Baton Rouge,
- 50 Louisiana, Jodi Daniels, Susie Nolan and Sandy Barron all of
- 51 Gulfport, Mississippi; grandparents, Bessie Robinson of
- 52 Natchitoches, Louisiana, and Mabelyn and Cosimo Liberto of
- 53 Gulfport, Mississippi; and numerous other relatives and close
- 54 friends; and
- 55 WHEREAS, to a country, a fallen soldier means a national
- 1056 loss; to a community, a fallen soldier means a true hero; to a
- 57 parent, a fallen soldier means a son who won't be coming home.
- 58 Mississippians understand the costs of conflict, because we have
- 59 paid them in the past, and it is with great pride and humility
- 60 that we recognize the heroic action of this great American and

- 61 Mississippian, who was the guardian of civilization as we know it
- 62 today:
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
- 64 MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That
- 65 we do hereby remember the gallant service and commend the life of
- 66 Private First Class Bryan Barron of Gulfport, Mississippi, who was
- 67 killed in action on Monday, May 23, 2005, and extend the thoughts
- 68 and prayers of the Legislature to his family and our sorrow on his
- 69 passing.
- 70 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution be presented to
- 71 the surviving family of Private Barron and be made available to
- 72 members of the Capitol Press Corps.
