HOUSE BILL NO. 1446

1 AN ACT TO CREATE THE MISSISSIPPI SCHOOL SAFETY TASK FORCE; TO 2 PROVIDE FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF MEMBERS OF THE TASK FORCE; TO 3 PROVIDE THAT THE TASK FORCE WILL CONTINUALLY STUDY ENSURING AND 4 ENHANCING SAFE SCHOOL ENVIRONMENTS FOR STUDENTS, TEACHERS AND 5 STAFF IN MISSISSIPPI, AND THE IMPLEMENTATION OF BEST PRACTICES FOR 6 PREVENTION AND RESPONSE; TO PROVIDE FOR THE TASK FORCE TO CONDUCT ITS BUSINESS; TO REQUIRE THAT THE TASK FORCE WILL REPORT ITS 7 FINDINGS AND ANY RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE LEGISLATURE ON AN ANNUAL 8 9 BASIS; TO BRING FORWARD SECTION 37-3-83, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, FOR THE PURPOSE OF POSSIBLE AMENDMENT; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 10 11 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 12 SECTION 1. (1) There is created the Mississippi School 13 Safety Task Force for the purpose of the continual study of ensuring and enhancing safe school environments for students, 14 15 teachers and staff in Mississippi, and the implementation of best practices for prevention and response. 16 17 (2) The task force shall be composed of the following twenty-five (25) members: 18 19 (a) The Commissioner of the Mississippi Department of 20 Public Safety, who shall serve as the Chairman; 21 The Chairmen of the Education Committees of the (b) 22 House of Representatives and Senate; G1/2 H. 49 (p) A representative of the Mississippi School Board50 Association;

(s) A parent representative, appointed by the State
Superintendent of Public Education, from the state-at-large; and

57 (t) A representative of the Mississippi Association of58 School Superintendents.

59 The members of the task force shall be appointed within (3)60 thirty (30) days of the effective date of this act. Any vacancy in the task force shall not affect its powers, but shall be filled 61 as prescribed in subsection (1) of this section. The task force 62 63 shall hold its first meeting within sixty (60) days of the 64 effective date of this act, on a call of the commissioner, as chairman of the task force. A majority of the membership of the 65 66 task force shall constitute a quorum, and shall meet at the call 67 of the chairman. All members must be notified in writing of all 68 meetings at least five (5) days before the date on which a meeting 69 of the task force is scheduled.

70 (4) Members of the task force shall receive a per diem in 71 the amount provided in Section 25-3-69 for each day engaged in the 72 business of the task force. Members of the task force, other than

(5) The task force shall report its findings and
recommendations to the Legislature annually not later than
December 1 each year.

81 SECTION 2. Section 37-3-83, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 82 brought forward as follows:

37-3-83. (1) There is established within the State
Department of Education, using only existing staff and resources,
a School Safety Grant Program, available to all eligible public
school districts, to assist in financing programs to provide
school safety. However, no monies from the Temporary Assistance
for Needy Families grant may be used for the School Safety Grant
Program.

90 (2) The school board of each school district, with the
91 assistance of the State Department of Education School Safety
92 Center, shall adopt a comprehensive local school district school
93 safety plan and shall update the plan on an annual basis.

94 (3) Subject to the extent of appropriations available, the
95 School Safety Grant Program shall offer any of the following
96 specific preventive services, and other additional services

(a) Metal detectors;

(b) Video surveillance cameras, communications
equipment and monitoring equipment for classrooms, school
buildings, school grounds and school buses;

103 (c) Crisis management/action teams responding to school

105 (d) Violence prevention training, conflict resolution 106 training, behavioral stress training and other appropriate 107 training designated by the State Department of Education for 108 faculty and staff; and

(e) School safety personnel.

110 Each local school district of this state may annually (4)111 apply for school safety grant funds subject to appropriations by 112 the Legislature. School safety grants shall include a base grant 113 amount plus an additional amount per student in average daily attendance in the school or school district. The base grant 114 115 amount and amount per student shall be determined by the State 116 Board of Education, subject to specific appropriation therefor by 117 the Legislature. In order to be eligible for such program, each 118 local school board desiring to participate shall apply to the State Department of Education by May 31 before the beginning of 119 120 the applicable fiscal year on forms provided by the department, and shall be required to establish a local School Safety Task 121

Force to involve members of the community in the school safety effort. The State Department of Education shall determine by July of each succeeding year which local school districts have submitted approved applications for school safety grants.

126 (5) As part of the School Safety Grant Program, the State 127 Department of Education may conduct a pilot program to research 128 the feasibility of using video camera equipment in the classroom 129 to address the following:

130 (a) Determine if video cameras in the classroom reduce131 student disciplinary problems;

(b) Enable teachers to present clear and convincing
evidence of a student's disruptive behavior to the student, the
principal, the superintendent and the student's parents; and

135 (c) Enable teachers to review teaching performance and136 receive diagnostic feedback for developmental purposes.

137 (6) Any local school district may use
138 audio/visual-monitoring equipment in classrooms, hallways,
139 buildings, grounds and buses for the purpose of monitoring school
140 disciplinary problems.

141 (7) As a component of the comprehensive local school 142 district school safety plan required under subsection (2) of this 143 section, the school board of a school district may adopt and 144 implement a policy addressing sexual abuse of children, to be 145 known as "Erin's Law Awareness." Any policy adopted under this

146 subsection may include or address, but need not be limited to, the 147 following:

(a) Methods for increasing teacher, student and
parental awareness of issues regarding sexual abuse of children,
including knowledge of likely warning signs indicating that a
child may be a victim of sexual abuse;

(b) Educational information for parents or guardians,
which may be included in the school handbook, on the warning signs
of a child being abused, along with any needed assistance,
referral or resource information;

156 (c) Training for school personnel on child sexual 157 abuse;

158 (d) Age-appropriate curriculum for students in159 prekindergarten through fifth grade;

160 (e) Actions that a child who is a victim of sexual161 abuse should take to obtain assistance and intervention;

162 (f) Counseling and resources available for students 163 affected by sexual abuse; and

164 Emotional and educational support for a child who (q) 165 has been abused to enable the child to be successful in school. 166 (8) As part of the school safety grant program, the State 167 Department of Education shall establish three (3) pilot programs 168 in six (6) school districts utilizing an evidence-based curriculum 169 to provide students in Grades K-5 with skills to manage stress and anxiety in order for them to be better equipped to handle 170

171 challenges in a healthy way and build resiliency. The Mississippi 172 Department of Mental Health shall be responsible for the selection 173 of the content of the evidence-based curriculum. The results of 174 this pilot program shall be measured and reported, and such 175 results shall be used in consideration of the implementation of 176 this curriculum statewide.

177 (9) As a component of the comprehensive local school 178 district safety plan required under subsection (2) of this 179 section, beginning in the 2019-2020 school year, the State Department of Education shall require local school districts to 180 181 conduct, every two (2) years, refresher training on mental health 182 and suicide prevention for all school employees and personnel, 183 including all cafeteria workers, custodians, teachers and 184 administrators. The Mississippi Department of Mental Health shall 185 be responsible for the development and/or selection of the content 186 of the training, which training shall be provided at no cost to 187 school employees. School districts shall report completion of the 188 training to the State Department of Education.

189 SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from 190 and after July 1, 2024.
