

## REPORT OF CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

**MR. SPEAKER AND MR. PRESIDENT:**

We, the undersigned conferees, have had under consideration the amendments to the following entitled BILL:

H. B. No. 1637: Fetal and Infant Mortality Review Panel; create under State Department of Health.

We, therefore, respectfully submit the following report and recommendation:

1. That the Senate recede from its Amendment No. 1.
2. That the House and Senate adopt the following amendment:

Amend by striking all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

70           **SECTION 1.** (1) There is created the Fetal and Infant  
71 Mortality Review Panel, whose primary purpose is to review fetal  
72 deaths and deaths of infants up to one (1) year of age and  
73 establish strategies to prevent infant deaths. The review panel  
74 shall be multidisciplinary and composed of such members as deemed  
75 appropriate by the State Department of Health. The review panel  
76 may develop subcommittees to carry out the panel's purposes.

77           (2) The chairman of the review panel shall be elected  
78 annually by the review panel membership. The review panel shall  
79 develop and implement such procedures and policies necessary for  
80 its operation, including obtaining and protecting confidential  
81 records from the agencies and officials specified in subsection  
82 (3) of this section to ensure successful completion of the ongoing  
83 review required by this section and procedures for notice,



84 opportunity to cure, and enforcement for lack of compliance. The  
85 review panel shall be assigned to the State Department of Health  
86 for administrative purposes, and the department shall designate  
87 staff to assist the review panel.

88 (3) The review panel shall submit a report annually to the  
89 Chairmen of the House Public Health and Human Services Committee  
90 and the Senate Public Health and Welfare Committee on or before  
91 December 1. The report shall include the numbers, causes and  
92 relevant demographic information on infant mortality deaths in  
93 Mississippi, and appropriate recommendations to the Legislature on  
94 how to most effectively direct state resources to decrease infant  
95 mortality in Mississippi. Data for the review panel's review and  
96 reporting shall be provided to the review panel, upon the request  
97 of the review panel, by the State Medical Examiner's office, State  
98 Department of Health, Department of Human Services, medical  
99 examiners, coroners, health care providers, law enforcement  
100 agencies, and any other agencies or officials having information  
101 that is necessary for the review panel to carry out its duties  
102 under this section. The State Department of Health shall also be  
103 responsible for printing and distributing the annual report(s) on  
104 infant mortality in Mississippi.

105 (4) In the case of an infant or child who dies suddenly and  
106 unexpectedly, including cases of sudden infant death syndrome  
107 (SIDS), sudden unexpected infant death (SUID) or sudden death in  
108 the young (SDY), the review panel shall conduct a comprehensive



109 review of the infant's or child's medical, prenatal, and, where  
110 applicable, maternal health records for the purpose of identifying  
111 potential contributing factors and preventable causes of death.  
112 Such review should include consideration of the infant's or  
113 child's immunization history and any medical treatments or  
114 interventions as part of the overall medical context, without  
115 limitation to a specified time period, as relevant to the review  
116 panel's determination of contributing factors. The review panel  
117 shall conduct its review in accordance with nationally recognized  
118 best practices, including guidelines and standards promulgated by  
119 the National Center for Fatality Review and Prevention (NCFRP).  
120 The State Department of Health shall verify that cases of sudden  
121 and unexpected death of an infant or child were reported to the  
122 SUID and SDY Case Registry and that any adverse vaccine reactions  
123 were reported to the Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System  
124 (VAERS), and shall report to the SUID and SDY Case Registry or to  
125 VAERS any such cases or adverse vaccine reactions that were not  
126 previously reported. Nothing in this subsection shall be  
127 construed to limit or alter any existing reporting obligations  
128 imposed by law on health care providers or other entities  
129 independent of the review panel. The review panel's report and  
130 recommendations shall be made public by the State Department of  
131 Health.

132 (5) Physicians licensed under Section 73-25-1 et seq.,  
133 hospitals licensed under Section 41-9-1 et seq., and pharmacies



134 licensed under Section 73-21-69 et seq., shall provide reasonable  
135 access to the review panel to all relevant medical records,  
136 including, but not limited to, medical records of the decedent and  
137 decedent's birth mother, associated with a case under review by  
138 the review panel.

139 (6) A physician, hospital or pharmacy providing access to  
140 medical records under this section shall not be held liable for  
141 civil damages or be subject to any criminal or disciplinary action  
142 for good faith efforts in providing such records.

143 (7) Information, records, reports, statements, notes,  
144 memoranda or other data collected under this section shall not be  
145 admissible as evidence in any action of any kind in any court or  
146 before any other tribunal, board, agency or person. Such  
147 information, records, reports, statements, notes, memoranda or  
148 other data shall not be exhibited nor their contents disclosed in  
149 any way, in whole or in part, by any officer or representative of  
150 the department or any other person, except as may be necessary for  
151 the purpose of furthering the review of the review panel of the  
152 case to which they relate. No person participating in such review  
153 shall disclose, in any manner, the information obtained except in  
154 strict conformity with such review project.

155 (8) All information, records of interviews, written reports,  
156 statements, notes, memoranda or other data obtained by the  
157 department, the review panel, and other persons, agencies or



158 organizations authorized by the department under this section  
159 shall be confidential.

160 (9) All proceedings and activities of the review panel under  
161 this section, opinions of members of the review panel formed as a  
162 result of those proceedings and activities, and records obtained,  
163 created, or maintained under this section, including, but not  
164 limited to, records of interviews, written reports and statements  
165 procured by the department or any other person, agency or  
166 organization acting jointly or under contract with the department  
167 in connection with the requirements of this section, shall be  
168 confidential and shall not be subject to the Mississippi Open  
169 Meetings Act, Sections 25-41-1 through 25-41-17, relating to open  
170 meetings, the Mississippi Public Records Act of 1983, Sections  
171 25-61-1 through 25-61-17, relating to open records, or subject to  
172 subpoena, discovery or introduction into evidence in any civil or  
173 criminal proceeding; however, nothing in this section shall be  
174 construed to limit or restrict the right to discover or use in any  
175 civil or criminal proceeding anything that is available from  
176 another source and independently of the proceedings of the review  
177 panel.

178 (10) Members of the review panel shall not be questioned in  
179 any civil or criminal proceeding regarding the information  
180 presented in or opinions formed as a result of a meeting or  
181 communication of the review panel; however, nothing in this  
182 section shall be construed to prevent a member of the review panel



183 from testifying to information obtained independently of the  
184 proceedings of the review panel or which is public information.

185 (11) (a) Any agencies or officials specified in subsection  
186 (3) of this section, or any officer, employee, or contractor  
187 acting on their behalf, in possession of records, data, or  
188 information requested by the review panel to carry out its duties  
189 under this section for the purpose of an infant death or  
190 near-death review shall, upon request, provide such information in  
191 a complete and timely manner as prescribed by the review panel.

192 For purposes of this section, "complete and timely" means  
193 production of all responsive records within the timeframe  
194 prescribed by the review panel, unless extended for good cause  
195 shown and documented in writing.

196 (b) Before initiating enforcement action, the review  
197 panel may provide written notice of noncompliance and allow a  
198 reasonable opportunity to cure, not to exceed ten (10) business  
199 days, unless delay would materially impair the review panel's  
200 duties.

201 (c) Failure to comply with a lawful request under this  
202 section within the specified timeframe or cure period, if  
203 applicable, shall subject the noncomplying agency, official, or  
204 entity to enforcement by the review panel or the State Department  
205 of Health through mandamus, injunctive relief, or other  
206 appropriate legal action. In any action brought to compel  
207 compliance, the reviewing court shall award to the prevailing



208 party all reasonable costs incurred in enforcing compliance,  
209 including attorney's fees, court costs, and any other expenses  
210 reasonably related to the action.

211 (12) The State Department of Health may exercise any  
212 enforcement authority otherwise granted to it under Title 41 of  
213 the Mississippi Code, including, but not limited to, the authority  
214 to seek subpoenas, injunctive relief, mandamus, or other  
215 appropriate judicial remedies, to enforce compliance with this  
216 section.

217 (13) Nothing in this section shall be construed to authorize  
218 the review panel to impose licensure sanctions, civil penalties,  
219 or disciplinary action against any person or entity, except as  
220 expressly provided for enforcement of compliance with data  
221 requests under this section.

222 **SECTION 2.** Section 25-41-3, Mississippi Code of 1972, is  
223 amended as follows:

224 25-41-3. For purposes of this chapter, the following words  
225 shall have the meaning ascribed herein, to wit:

226 (a) "Public body" means any executive or administrative  
227 board, commission, authority, council, department, agency, bureau  
228 or any other policymaking entity, or committee thereof, of the  
229 State of Mississippi, or any political subdivision or municipal  
230 corporation of the state, whether the entity be created by statute  
231 or executive order, which is supported wholly or in part by public  
232 funds or expends public funds, and any standing, interim or



233 special committee of the Mississippi Legislature. The term  
234 "public body" includes the governing board of a charter school  
235 authorized by the Mississippi Charter School Authorizer Board and  
236 the board of trustees of a community hospital as defined in  
237 Section 41-13-10. The term "public body" includes the Mississippi  
238 Lottery Corporation. There shall be exempted from the provisions  
239 of this chapter:

240 (i) The judiciary, including all jury  
241 deliberations;

242 (ii) Law enforcement officials;

243 (iii) The military;

244 (iv) The State Probation and Parole Board;

245 (v) The Workers' Compensation Commission;

246 (vi) Legislative subcommittees and legislative  
247 conference committees;

248 (vii) The arbitration council established in  
249 Section 69-3-19;

250 (viii) License revocation, suspension and  
251 disciplinary proceedings held by the Mississippi State Board of  
252 Dental Examiners; \* \* \*

253 (ix) Hearings and meetings of the Board of Tax  
254 Appeals and of the hearing officers and the board of review of the  
255 Department of Revenue as provided in Section 27-77-15 \* \* \*; and

256 (x) The Fetal and Infant Mortality Review Panel  
257 created under Section 1 of this act.



258 (b) "Meeting" means an assemblage of members of a  
259 public body at which official acts may be taken upon a matter over  
260 which the public body has supervision, control, jurisdiction or  
261 advisory power, including an assemblage through the use of video  
262 or teleconference devices that conforms to Section 25-41-5.

263 **SECTION 3.** (1) Records, data, lists, reports, maps,  
264 inventories or other information maintained by the State  
265 Department of Health, including the Division of Radiological  
266 Health, that identify or could reasonably be used to identify:

267 (a) The location, ownership, possession, quantity,  
268 type, form, security features, or transportation of radioactive  
269 material or radiation-producing devices; or

270 (b) The identity or location of persons or entities  
271 licensed or authorized to possess radioactive material or  
272 radiation-producing devices, when disclosure of such information  
273 would reasonably be expected to pose a risk to public health,  
274 public safety, or security, shall be confidential and exempt from  
275 the Mississippi Public Records Act of 1983.

276 (2) Such records shall not be subject to inspection,  
277 copying, disclosure, subpoena, or discovery, except to the extent  
278 disclosure is required by federal law or to another governmental  
279 entity for official regulatory, law enforcement, emergency  
280 response, or public health purposes.

281 (3) Nothing in this section shall be construed to exempt  
282 from disclosure statistical, aggregate, or summary information



283 that does not identify specific licensees, locations, quantities,  
284 or security-sensitive details, or information otherwise required  
285 to be publicly reported by law.

286         **SECTION 4.** Section 25-41-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is  
287 amended as follows:

288             25-41-7. (1) Any public body may enter into executive  
289 session for the transaction of public business; however, all  
290 meetings of any public body shall commence as an open meeting, and  
291 an affirmative vote of three-fifths (3/5) of all members present  
292 shall be required to declare an executive session.

293             (2) The procedure to be followed by any public body in  
294 declaring an executive session shall be as follows: Any member  
295 shall have the right to request by motion a closed determination  
296 upon the issue of whether or not to declare an executive session.  
297 The motion, by majority vote, shall require the meeting to be  
298 closed for a preliminary determination of the necessity for  
299 executive session. No other business shall be transacted until  
300 the discussion of the nature of the matter requiring executive  
301 session has been completed and a vote, as required in subsection  
302 (1) hereof, has been taken on the issue.

303             (3) An executive session shall be limited to matters allowed  
304 to be exempted from open meetings by subsection (4) of this  
305 section. The reason for holding an executive session shall be  
306 stated in an open meeting, and the reason so stated shall be  
307 recorded in the minutes of the meeting. Nothing in this section



308 shall be construed to require that any meeting be closed to the  
309 public, nor shall any executive session be used to circumvent or  
310 to defeat the purposes of this chapter.

311 (4) A public body may hold an executive session pursuant to  
312 this section for one or more of the following reasons:

313 (a) Transaction of business and discussion of personnel  
314 matters relating to the job performance, character, professional  
315 competence, or physical or mental health of a person holding a  
316 specific position, or matters relating to the terms of any  
317 potential or current employment or services agreement with any  
318 physicians or other employees of public hospitals, including any  
319 discussion of any person applying for medical staff privileges or  
320 membership with a public hospital.

321 (b) Strategy sessions or negotiations with respect to  
322 prospective litigation, litigation or issuance of an appealable  
323 order when an open meeting would have a detrimental effect on the  
324 litigating position of the public body.

325 (c) Transaction of business and discussion regarding  
326 the report, development or course of action regarding security  
327 personnel, plans or devices.

328 (d) Investigative proceedings by any public body  
329 regarding allegations of misconduct or violation of law.

330 (e) Any body of the Legislature which is meeting on  
331 matters within the jurisdiction of that body.



332 (f) Cases of extraordinary emergency which would pose  
333 immediate or irrevocable harm or damage to persons or property, or  
334 both, within the jurisdiction of the public body.

335 (g) Transaction of business and discussion regarding  
336 the prospective purchase, sale or leasing of lands.

337 (h) Discussions between a school board and individual  
338 students who attend a school within the jurisdiction of the school  
339 board or the parents or teachers of the students regarding  
340 problems of the students or their parents or teachers.

341 (i) Transaction of business and discussion concerning  
342 the preparation of tests for admission to practice in recognized  
343 professions.

344 (j) Transaction of business and discussions or  
345 negotiations regarding the location, relocation or expansion of a  
346 business, medical service or an industry.

347 (k) Transaction of business and discussions regarding  
348 employment or job performance of a person in a specific position  
349 or termination of an employee holding a specific position. The  
350 exemption provided by this paragraph includes transaction of  
351 business and discussion in executive session by the board of  
352 trustees of a public hospital regarding any employee or medical  
353 staff member or applicant for medical staff privileges and any  
354 such individual's credentialing, health, performance, salary,  
355 raises or disciplinary action. The exemption provided by this  
356 paragraph includes the right to enter into executive session



357 concerning a line item in a budget which might affect the  
358 termination of an employee or employees. All other budget items  
359 shall be considered in open meetings and final budgetary adoption  
360 shall not be taken in executive session.

361 (l) Discussions regarding material or data exempt from  
362 the Mississippi Public Records Act of 1983 pursuant to Section  
363 25-11-121.

364 (m) Transaction of business and discussion regarding  
365 prospective strategic business decisions of public hospitals,  
366 including without limitation, decisions to open a new service  
367 line, implement capital improvements, or file applications for  
368 certificates of need or determinations of nonreviewability with  
369 the State Department of Health.

370 (n) Transaction of business of the boards of trustees  
371 of public hospitals that would require discussion of any  
372 identifiable patient information, including without limitation,  
373 patient complaints, patients' accounts, patients receiving charity  
374 care, or treatment that could be identified to a patient.

375 (o) Investigative discussions, investigative  
376 strategies, probative strategies related to identifiable instances  
377 of human trafficking or commercial sexual exploitation, and  
378 discussions involving locations of shelters or safe-houses for  
379 victims of human trafficking or commercial sexual exploitation.

380 (p) Transaction of business of committees,  
381 subcommittees or boards that would require discussion of any



382 identifiable information of victims of human trafficking or  
383 children under eighteen years old who are victims of commercial  
384 sexual exploitation.

385       (5) (a) The Mississippi State Department of Health may  
386 enter executive session or otherwise conduct a closed meeting  
387 during morbidity or mortality review committee work mandated by  
388 statute or regulation, such as the Child Death Review Panel, the  
389 Maternal Mortality Review Committee, and the Fetal and Infant  
390 Mortality Review Panel.

391       (b) Any meeting, or portion of a meeting, closed under  
392 this subsection shall be limited to the discussion of confidential  
393 or exempt quality assurance, quality improvement, performance  
394 improvement, peer review, patient safety, morbidity review,  
395 mortality review or system evaluation matters. Any final action  
396 or vote to adopt a policy, rule, or regulation of general  
397 applicability shall be taken in an open meeting, unless otherwise  
398 authorized by this chapter.

399       (c) Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to  
400 permit a closed meeting for the purpose of avoiding the  
401 requirements of this chapter for matters not otherwise  
402 confidential or exempt under law, nor to restrict any public  
403 reporting otherwise required by law.

404       ( \* \* \*6) The total vote on the question of entering into an  
405 executive session shall be recorded and spread upon the minutes of  
406 the public body.



407 ( \* \* \*7) Any vote whereby an executive session is declared  
408 shall be applicable only to that particular meeting on that  
409 particular day.

410 **SECTION 5.** The following shall be codified as Section  
411 25-61-11.3, Mississippi Code of 1972:

412 25-61-11.3. Documents and records used by the Mississippi  
413 State Department of Health during morbidity or mortality review  
414 committee work mandated by statute or regulation, such as the  
415 Child Death Review Panel, the Maternal Mortality Review Committee,  
416 and the Fetal and Infant Mortality Review Panel, shall be  
417 confidential and exempt from the Mississippi Public Records Act of  
418 1983.

419 **SECTION 6.** This act shall take effect and be in force from  
420 and after July 1, 2026.

**Further, amend by striking the title in its entirety and  
inserting in lieu thereof the following:**

1 AN ACT TO CREATE THE FETAL AND INFANT MORTALITY REVIEW PANEL  
2 TO REVIEW FETAL DEATHS AND DEATHS OF INFANTS UP TO ONE YEAR OF AGE  
3 AND ESTABLISH STRATEGIES TO PREVENT INFANT DEATHS; TO PROVIDE THAT  
4 THE REVIEW PANEL SHALL BE MULTIDISCIPLINARY AND COMPOSED OF SUCH  
5 MEMBERS AS DEEMED APPROPRIATE BY THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH;  
6 TO REQUIRE THE REVIEW PANEL TO SUBMIT A REPORT ANNUALLY TO THE  
7 HOUSE AND SENATE PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEES THAT INCLUDE THE  
8 NUMBERS, CAUSES AND RELEVANT DEMOGRAPHIC INFORMATION ON INFANT  
9 MORTALITY DEATHS IN MISSISSIPPI, AND APPROPRIATE RECOMMENDATIONS  
10 TO THE LEGISLATURE ON HOW TO MOST EFFECTIVELY DIRECT STATE  
11 RESOURCES TO DECREASE INFANT MORTALITY IN THE STATE; TO REQUIRE  
12 THAT DATA SHALL BE PROVIDED TO THE REVIEW PANEL BY THE STATE  
13 MEDICAL EXAMINER'S OFFICE, STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, DEPARTMENT  
14 OF HUMAN SERVICES, MEDICAL EXAMINERS, CORONERS, HEALTH CARE  
15 PROVIDERS, LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES, AND ANY OTHER AGENCIES OR  
16 OFFICIALS HAVING INFORMATION THAT IS NECESSARY FOR THE REVIEW



17 PANEL TO CARRY OUT ITS DUTIES; TO PROVIDE THAT IN THE CASE OF AN  
18 INFANT OR CHILD WHO DIES SUDDENLY AND UNEXPECTEDLY, INCLUDING  
19 CASES OF SUDDEN INFANT DEATH SYNDROME (SIDS), SUDDEN UNEXPECTED  
20 INFANT DEATH (SUID) OR SUDDEN DEATH IN THE YOUNG (SDY), THE REVIEW  
21 PANEL SHALL CONDUCT A COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW OF THE INFANT'S OR  
22 CHILD'S MEDICAL, PRENATAL, AND, WHERE APPLICABLE, MATERNAL HEALTH  
23 RECORDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF IDENTIFYING POTENTIAL CONTRIBUTING  
24 FACTORS AND PREVENTABLE CAUSES OF DEATH; TO PROVIDE THAT SUCH  
25 REVIEW SHALL BE CONDUCTED IN ACCORDANCE WITH NATIONALLY RECOGNIZED  
26 BEST PRACTICES AND SHOULD INCLUDE CONSIDERATION OF THE INFANT'S OR  
27 CHILD'S IMMUNIZATION HISTORY AND ANY MEDICAL TREATMENTS OR  
28 INTERVENTIONS AS PART OF THE OVERALL MEDICAL CONTEXT, WITHOUT  
29 LIMITATION TO A SPECIFIED TIME PERIOD, AS RELEVANT TO THE PANEL'S  
30 DETERMINATION OF CONTRIBUTING FACTORS; TO DIRECT THE STATE  
31 DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO VERIFY THAT CASES OF SUDDEN AND UNEXPECTED  
32 DEATH OF AN INFANT OR CHILD WERE REPORTED TO THE SUID AND SDY CASE  
33 REGISTRY AND THAT ANY ADVERSE VACCINE REACTIONS WERE REPORTED TO  
34 THE VACCINE ADVERSE EVENT REPORTING SYSTEM (VAERS), AND TO REPORT  
35 TO THE SUID AND SDY CASE REGISTRY OR TO VAERS ANY SUCH CASES OR  
36 ADVERSE VACCINE REACTIONS THAT WERE NOT PREVIOUSLY REPORTED; TO  
37 PROVIDE THAT THE REVIEW PANEL'S REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS SHALL  
38 BE MADE PUBLIC BY THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH; TO REQUIRE  
39 PHYSICIANS, HOSPITALS AND PHARMACIES TO PROVIDE REASONABLE ACCESS  
40 TO THE REVIEW PANEL TO ALL RELEVANT MEDICAL RECORDS ASSOCIATED  
41 WITH A CASE UNDER REVIEW BY THE REVIEW PANEL; TO PROVIDE THAT  
42 CERTAIN RECORDS MAINTAINED BY THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SHALL  
43 BE CONFIDENTIAL AND NOT SUBJECT TO THE PUBLIC RECORDS ACT OR  
44 SUBPOENA, DISCOVERY OR INTRODUCTION INTO EVIDENCE; TO AUTHORIZE  
45 THE REVIEW PANEL TO INITIATE ENFORCEMENT ACTIONS AGAINST AGENCIES  
46 OR OFFICIALS THAT DO NOT PROVIDE INFORMATION TO THE PANEL IN A  
47 COMPLETE AND TIMELY MANNER; TO AMEND SECTION 25-41-3, MISSISSIPPI  
48 CODE OF 1972, TO CONFORM TO THE PRECEDING PROVISIONS; TO EXEMPT  
49 CERTAIN QUALITY ASSURANCE, QUALITY IMPROVEMENT, PERFORMANCE  
50 IMPROVEMENT, AND REVIEW RECORDS OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH  
51 FROM THE PUBLIC RECORDS ACT; TO PROVIDE THAT SUCH RECORDS SHALL BE  
52 CONFIDENTIAL AND NOT SUBJECT TO DISCLOSURE, SUBPOENA, OR  
53 DISCOVERY; TO EXEMPT CERTAIN RADIOLOGICAL HEALTH AND RADIOACTIVE  
54 MATERIAL LICENSING INFORMATION FROM THE PUBLIC RECORDS ACT WHEN  
55 DISCLOSURE WOULD POSE A RISK TO PUBLIC HEALTH OR SECURITY; TO  
56 AMEND SECTION 25-41-7, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO AUTHORIZE THE  
57 STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO ENTER EXECUTIVE SESSION OR OTHERWISE  
58 CONDUCT A CLOSED MEETING DURING MORBIDITY OR MORTALITY REVIEW  
59 COMMITTEE WORK MANDATED BY STATUTE OR REGULATION, SUCH AS THE  
60 CHILD DEATH REVIEW PANEL, THE MATERNAL MORTALITY REVIEW COMMITTEE,  
61 AND THE FETAL AND INFANT MORTALITY REVIEW PANEL; TO CREATE NEW
